My wife and I attended Disaster Response Conferences earlier this month (October). We listened to various speakers talk about the many disasters that our church body



(LCMS) responded to this past year. We also had speakers tell us how be prepared in our own homes for disasters. Here is a list of items for you all to think about.

- 1. Check your smoke and CO detectors once a month and change the batteries twice a year.
- 2. Check your fire extinguisher monthly and shake it up to keep the powder loose.
- 3. Keep three days of food on hand.
- 4. Keep one gallon of water per person per day on hand for three days.
- 5. Keep at least one half of tank of gas in your car at all times.
- 6. Keep a "go bag" ready to go if you have to leave in 15 minutes. Included should be:
- 7. Photocopies of important papers, credit cards, IDs, and the like.
- 8. Copies of prescriptions for your medications.
- 9. List of out-of-area contact people with their emails and phone numbers.

This list is not complete but is presented here to get you thinking. Your local governments, the Red Cross, the Salvation Army, and other local entities do offer programs and presentations on local disaster preparedness that you can attend for free. I would encourage everyone to check them out.

My wife attended her conference as a caregiver for the Comfort Dogs based out of Addison, Illinois. These golden retrievers are specially trained to be attentive to people and their emotional needs. They have been to the majority of the disasters reported in the news this year. A local LCMS Lutheran congregation can request the Comfort Dogs though our national church's offices and the dogs can be on their way within hours of the request.

Stan has recently made some mods on his antenna so we are receiving him much better. Mike has also recently upgraded to a new G5RV antenna which brings him in nicely now all the way from W. Montana. We need to pray for Marilyn, Chuck's wife, who is dealing with some serious health issues.

I'm sure many will be interested in the reports I've asked Wayne to send on his recent activities in connection with missionary radio in South America. I'm including those reports. Please let me know if you receive all this.

George, not sure how far back but will start in January of 2013. In January ARMS members Wayne Borthwick (VA7GF) and Paul Wyse (W4PFM) met in Lima, Peru with components for repairing SW radio station Radio

Logos in Chazuta, Peru and installing an antenna matching network for a medium wave radio station in Huancayo, Peru. Both stations are projects of Ethnic Radio (see www. ethnicradio.org ) and broadcast Christian programming in native languages. Praise the Lord both stations were put on the air despite loss by the airline on the way down of the R. Logos transmitter modulator modules from HCJB engineering. Wayne's XYL Dianna and a couple from their church joined him later in Chazuta to work on a construction project for the Central Evangelical Church of Chazuta, that church that administers R. Logos. In August, Wayne was privileged to be at the dedication of R. Logos along with Ray Rising (K4LWJ) and other dignitaries. What a blessing to meet and fellowship with many of the leaders in ministry from the native language groups across the Peruvian Amazon basin who were there for an audio production course plus the dedication. It was agreed by the leaders that the radio station was the most effective project to date for the native people in the Peruvian Amazon and signals were even strong down in the south where a minor antenna lobe occurs.

A side project was teaching several local young men how to install a loop antenna amplifier in the Galcom fixed tuned radios to improve sensitivity. Thank you all who that prayed for us and the ministries here.

Here is a brief summary of my next trip and Radio Mosoj Chaski. On Nov. 18 to 28, VA7GF, Wayne Borthwick, will be travelling to Cochabamba, Bolivia to install a new 950MHz STL, check out the 14 year old transmitter/antenna plant and help local engineer Irineo with maintenance. Radio Mosoj Chaski (see www.mosojchaski.com for more info) that is a Quechua language tropical band SW station that has been broadcasting the Good News on 3310KHz since April 1999. For the technically inclined, their 10Kw all solid state Omnitronix transmitter feeds a 50 to 200 ohm transmission line BALUN, followed by a balanced 200 to 600 ohm matching network, to a 600 ohm open wire transmission line, feeding the center of a 1.2 by 0.6 wave length lazy H antenna at 40 feet high. This NVIS system with a vertical gain of about 12db over isotropic, covers all of Bolivia as well as being heard by short wave listeners all over the world. The STL carries the audio 12km from the studio to the remote transmitter site

Pray for all necessary equipment to arrive in time as well as wisdom in recommendations for replacing or backing up older equipment. A recent failure in the STL put the station off the air for several weeks.

#### October 2013

Many times on a journey, the traveler will keep a journal along the way. Travel along with us through this journal during **2013**:

**January:** We completed and turned in the final paperwork for our retirement on February 1. Don started preparing income taxes. Sharon wound down her responsibilities in the Mailroom. Don resigned his position as branch Treasurer.

**February:** On February 1, we retired from Wycliffe. Don had 42 years of service and Sharon had 10. Don did income tax preparation under his own business name. Sharon enjoyed being at home full time. After a required 2 months off, we planned to return to SIL as volunteers.

**March:** God sent a volunteer from OR, John, to train with Don and help him with income tax preparation. Sharon tackled projects around the house that she never seemed to have time to do before. On Saturday, March 30, after a normal morning, Don suddenly became unresponsive. A MRI in the ER revealed a massive brain hemorrhage. He would not survive. I called David (son) in New York and he said goodbye to his dad over the phone. Johanna (daughter) and her family came to the ER, along with our pastors. We sang songs, read scripture and prayed. We said our goodbyes. It was a peaceful time as Don entered Heaven on Easter Saturday. Easter was his favorite holy day and how he must have rejoiced spending it with Jesus this year! The path I was walking changed forever.

**April:** Don's memorial service was held at the church on Sunday afternoon, April 7. The family and many friends came to honor and remember his life spent in service for the Lord. As part of the service, Don's grandson Hunter (2) was baptized. It was a very special time, spiritual life from physical death. Praise the Lord, John was able to return to finished all the income tax returns. I went to my granddaughter Hanna's senior family softball weekend for 4 days at Drexel University in Philadelphia. She had been there on a four-year softball scholarship. I enjoyed seeing Hanna honored and play softball. I went on to Silver Springs, MD, to spend 3 days with my younger brother, Eric, and his family. A visit to the National Cathedral was one of the highlights of that trip. Several unexpected financial and legal issues came up, which took a lot of my time and energy. I am thankful for many understanding people and to the Lord for helping all of them to be resolved.

**May:** I organized all the income tax files to be ready for John for the 2013 tax year. I began clearing out Don's office at the Center. After many years in that office, this was not an easy task. Everything had to go. May 15 would have been our 9th anniversary. I praise the Lord daily for the honor and privilege of being Don's wife. He was such a blessing to me! I attended my granddaughter Heather's high school graduation. Don donated his body to Science Care for medical research. The family received a letter detailing 5 ways Don's donation had benefited medical research. Don was also an Arizona Network organ donor. His corneas were transplanted into two men in Arizona. Even in death, Don was caring and giving.

**June:** Helping at VBS with the 4's & 5's was fun. Granddaughter Lily asked Jesus to come into her heart at VBS. Granddaughter Tayler went to church teen camp for the first time and there she also accepted Jesus as her Savior. Hanna graduated from Drexel University with a degree in Criminal Justice. I finished clearing out Don's office. I filled in at the Reception Desk, in the Mailroom, and attended Catalina Center staff meetings. I read several books.

**July:** I continued filling in at the Reception Desk and attending Catalina Center staff meetings. The end of the month I went to Vallejo, CA, and on Friday, July 26, Don's remains were buried there with his parents as he had requested. A small group of family and friends gathered for the graveside service. Don's sister and husband in Orangevale, CA, graciously hosted the family during this time.

**August:** I began volunteering at the Center on a permanent basis at the Reception Desk on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons. It's good to be back! Attending a grief group twice a month has been very helpful. Grandson Garett, a junior, plays varsity football at his high school. Granddaughter Coryn, a freshman, is a cheerleader on the junior varsity squad at her high school. Between Thursday night cheer for Coryn and Friday night football for Garett, I've had a busy fall sport's season. Great-granddaughter Pixie started kindergarten. Kids grow up too quickly!

**September:** A trip to visit David and his family in Hampton, NY, for 6 days was fantastic! Drives to see the changing leaves wound through the Green Mountains in Vermont and the Adirondack Mountains in New York. David and Sarah were gracious hosts. I enjoyed babysitting for Hunter (3 in Dec.) Logan plays flag football and it was exciting to go to a game and a practice. He had his 6th birthday while I was there. David is the operations manager for two large sheep farms. He is an elected town council member. (Just like his dad! Don was always on a board of some kind.) Sarah is a large animal veterinarian and a partner in the vet clinic. I praise the Lord for a loving, caring couple He used to provide the money for this trip. The Lord does more than we can ask or think!

**October:** I continue to volunteer at the Center, workout at Curves, attend the grief group, teach Children's Church during the Sunday morning worship service, read, journal, and spend time with family and friends. There is never a lack of things to do at home. Sometimes I just need to be still in God's presence.

**Bible Translation (Mexico):** Three New Testaments have been dedicated and are being distributed. Seven more are in some stage of the publication process. Another seven will be ready for publication in the next two years. Nine new language programs have been started in Mexico. Forty languages are in the main phases of translation. Bible translation takes a whole team of people with different skills. You are part of the team. Thank you.

**Storms:** Sometimes God **calms the storm**. Sometimes God lets the storm rage and **calms His child**. That's where I am. The storm of Don's death rages on the outside, but inside I am calm. I miss Don so very much, not only his physical presence but also his spiritual presence. I have many tears because I have lost my most precious husband, and I'm sad. God gave us a very special love and I am so very thankful for the almost 9 years we had together. I don't know what the Lord has planned for my life. I do know His Word promises that He does have plans for me, and I am excited to see what they will be. Thank You: I appreciate your partnership in prayers and financial gifts. Please keep in touch.
