He graduated from Brunswick High School in Brunswick, Maine, as the valedictorian and won a scholarship to attend Bowdoin College. He joined the Navy in 1948, where he was a radio specialist. He later graduated from Moody Bible Institute in Chicago. Illinois in the radio technical course. He met his wife. Bible Translators. 
Midwest Section Report:


Missionary Report: Leon Winter, WX6I

In our October letter, we shared with you about the dedication of a Pilatus Porter turbo-prop PC-6 and a bit about its mission. This airplane was sent to the field shortly after the dedication ceremony at the JAARS Center. We joyfully praise the Lord for this new tool to speed Bible translation for the waiting language groups.

Today all the information technology, IT, departments gathered to pray for a team that will be leading out to Guinea-Bissau in West Africa next week to install solar power, fiber optic, and communication equipment enabling computer networking. which includes internet access via the VSAT satellite system. The Evangelical Church of Guinea-Bissau, in partnership with SIL and other organizations, currently has translation programs in seven languages. At the current rate we are entering new languages; the number is expected to be fourteen by the end of next year. This advance has brought into existence the Lendem Bible Translation Center where Bill (Leon's boss) and Galen will set up the new technology.

Philippine Branch news.

We knew this was coming someday, but now it is here. The news is the closing of the Nasuli Center on Mindanao, Philippines. This is where, in the late 70s, Leon and Lola first

served and from where Sally and Kathy worked to translate the Koronadal Blaan Scriptures. The New Testament was dedicated in 1996. Now, in just a few short months, the Nasuli Center will close forever and everything will have to be moved elsewhere. How does this closure affect us? Until this month we had 3,500 New Testaments left in the Nasuli Book Depository. (The original printing was for 10,000, so you can see that Rev. Cuma Saya has been doing a great work of distribution). These remaining books must be removed from Nasuli and sent to Cuma and Lydia's home, where there is a room prepared for just this purpose. In fact as we write this letter, the New Testaments have been trucked to Cuma's place in General Santos City. This was through the kindness of another translation team who are moving there permanently. You might think that all is well, since the NTs have been shipped. Well, yes and no. Yes, in that they are now where they need to be for Pastor Cuma to continue his distribution work. No, in that we owe the Branch \$2,800 in subsidy fees that are still outstanding. The Branch accountant has kindly agreed to delay placing this charge against the Koronadal Blaan Project Account, for a short time. At present, the project account will not stand such a large charge placed against it, without going (Continued on page 8)



into the red. We are thankful for this delay, but also feel the responsibility to let our partners know of this serious need.

How can you help?

If the Lord has placed this on your heart, then there are some things you can do. Pray God will lay this need on more hearts. You can also make a financial gift by sending your check, made out to Wycliffe Bible Translators, to the WBT address below. Please do not write on the check memo line, but rather include a separate note—yellow sticky, etc. On the note write, "For the Koronadal Blaan Project Account, SIL Philippines Accounting Dept". This will ensure that the funds arrive in the Philippines and are placed into the correct project account. When enough funding arrives, we will give the Accounting Dept. permission to place the charge. Please remember to pray regularly for Rev. Saya and his faithful work in distributing the New Testaments to Koronadal Blaan speakers. Pray too that the Blaans will read this precious gift of God's Word in their own language—that they will see Jesus.

News from the home front.

Since our last letter in December, we have seen the Lord's blessing in our personal lives just as in our work. Largely this

March 27-28 I was in Popayan, Colombia for what turned out to be an exciting meeting with government leaders. One was the next ranking official to the President. This was an historic event and I was delightfully surprised that the meeting was attended by Paez Indians. One introduced himself to me and said, "Greetings brother." From that point on it was a revelation to me that these were representatives of the Alliance church and other evangelicals.

The meeting in the Coliseum was attended by 4000 Paez. A drama was presented in the Paez (Nasa) language about how the first missionaries were badly treated by the early Paez leaders. Everyone applauded the drama vigorously. Russell Stendal and I were thrilled to find that the leaders of the new

Indian Association are vibrant Christians. (Russ has a radio station at our old Wycliffe Center Lomalinda).

One leader called me a few days later about putting Paez programs on the new FM station that Russ has been asked by the government to install. This will take some planning and training and I am here to facilitate in projects like this in anyway I can..

I was scheduled to travel with the Guambianos to their reserve

Introducing the New Editor:

I really should introduce myself since I am the new Beam and Directory Editor. I first became aware of ARMS in 1984 during a 20 meter QSO with Bill Berntsen, NW0G and Jay Sudenga, K0GAZ. Bill and I met much earlier when he was the choir director at Powderhorn Park Baptist Church (PPBC) in Minneapolis starting around 1960 and lasting several years. He and I occasionally had lunch together and complained about our academic challenges at the University of Minnesota. I was baptized in PPBC and I met and married Sharon Austin. We have been married 45 years this August and we have four grown children scattered in MN, OR, Iceland, and NE.

Sharon earned a BS in education and taught elementary school one year when we started our family and she didn't work for many years. Meanwhile Mike finished grad school at the University of Nebraska with a PhD in chemistry. We have moved to MN, NE, RI, OK, TX, MN, WI, NJ, and finally NC. 
Pray for the 2-day Medical Mission that will serve up to 1000+ people at Hope Mt. May 21-22.

but because of security problems they came to meet with me in Popayan. Wycliffe translators have translated the New Testaments in Guambiano and Paez and we want to help them so they can hear the scriptures by radio. We call it "Scripture In Use." Russ and I returned to Bogota on Saturday afternoon in his Cessna 180 still amazed at what we had just witnessed. I was reminded of this scripture:

Rev.7:9, "...a great multitude...., from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne ..."

GALCOM of Canada has promised a budget to improve the Guambiano radio station coverage. This I will have to engineer and facilitate. They have also promised one thousand fixed frequency radios for the Guambianos. The budget will involve 3 training courses in radio production and programming by our trainer, Francisco Garcia.

PRAYER REQUESTS:

- Wisdom as we work with the Guambiano and Paez Christians to help them with technology to expand their ministry.
- That God will provide the funds to reach the Amazon Basin by radio to broadcast in Indian languages. At present the only way to obtain a short wave license is by purchasing an existing AM station. There is an AM station for sale for \$120,000 dollars but no funds available. **YET!**
- For time to facilitate the 4 radio station projects pending in Peru. On March 24 we received another request for radio help from the President of the Fraternity of Peruvian Pastors of 4 denominations. They are asking me to come and advise them. Pray for time and resources to cover that travel.
- We have recently lost several hundred dollars support that we need to send Colombian co-labors to areas where we can't go because of security concerns. These are areas where Christian radio can make a big difference. Pray that we can continue to help get the message to these areas.
- March 31 was the 15th anniversary of my kidnapping and by the active grace of God we are still working for the Master to reach isolated ethnic groups (like the guerrillas) by radio. I only have 4 copies of the 3000 books we have distributed of my story, "Guerrilla Hostage" in Spanish. One of the ex-guerrillas who does the distribution is pleading for more. So far we have received \$726 to print 1000 more copies. <u>The balance needed is \$1000.</u>

PRAISE:

- February 28 we moved into another furnished apartment that is warmer, has light, a view of a park from the kitchen window, grocery store within walking distance and we just pay utilities!
- I attended an Amazonian Consultation conference April 1-4 in Orlando, Florida. There was 135 missionaries present plus 13 Indigenous leaders from several South American countries. I was able to establish good contacts for radio and media projects.

We are so thankful for your standing with us in prayer and/or support in what appears to be the last days endeavor to reach these isolated groups by radio and media.
