



Originally launched in the 1950s to serve overseas missionaries with their communication needs, ARMS has become a national and international Christian fellowship group. It meets Monday-Saturday mornings on 14.3075 on the 20M band at 1500Z (ST); 1400Z (DT). Net Control will assign numbers to those who check-in and give them opportunity to share a Scripture verse, prayer requests and personal happenings. Other regional ARMS Nets also take place. There is also an ARMS virtual net on CQ-100. This virtual computer net meets on Mondays at 2300Z on 14.307MHz on the virtual dial. A round-table format is used and may include overseas Christian ham check-ins as well as those stateside. You are invited to participate.

2014 Spring Report for the Central Section



Missionary Report:

There are several organizations that do Radio broadcasting for the name of Christ. I would like to highlight one of them.

Voice For Christ Ministries [VFCM]

Bob & Dolores Eldridge came to Alaska in 1964 and began their ministry serving with Victory Bible Camp in Sutton. They then began an itinerant flying ministry to interior Alaska villages with Arctic Missions (now <u>InterAct Ministries</u>). Weather often prevented flying into villages to share the Good News of Christ. Bob felt led of the Lord to consider radio as a more consistent way to send the Gospel message to the interior Alaska villages and homesteaders.

The Eldridges began the development of a Christian radio station in 1980, and thus, the I AM Radio Network was born. Voice For Christ Ministries was incorporated on September 7, 1983 in Nenana, Alaska as the non profit entity. The Lord showed His involvement by the immediate receipt of the building permit - a process that often takes two years.

KIAM Nenana, went on the air on June 28, 1985 at 1270 AM kHz - the last day allowed by the construction permit. During November 1986, KIAM changed frequencies to 630 AM kHz and raised the transmission tower to 250 feet to increase the listening area. Another 50 feet was added in August 1990, raising the tower to 300 feet. On May 1, 1995 KIAM raised the power to 10 kW during the day and 3.1 kW at night, again increasing the listening area.

KYKD in Bethel, Alaska, was purchased by VFCM in November 1996. KYKD went on the air at 3 KWs of power. In July 2006 VFCM was able to increase the power to 12 KW with a new transmitter.

<u>KAGV</u> is the newest radio station owned by VFCM. Built by numerous volunteers, KAGV went on the air in Houston/Big Lake, Alaska during December 2004. KAGV provides Christian radio to the Matanuska and Susitna valleys with a 10KW AM transmitter. Voice For Christ Ministries is always looking for a few good announcers.

SOUTHWEST ARMS Spring 2014

On March 14, several members and XYL's of the ARMS fellowship met together in the Tucson (Catalina) AZ area for a tour of the Wycliffe Summer Institute of Linguistics Mexico Branch translation center., and learned about some of the difficulties of Bible translation. After the tour, we all joined for lunch and later for fellowship at Sharon Jensen's (KA7DAC) lovely home for the afternoon. Mike, K7PTL, brought a short devotional message. Pictures attached.

April 9 brought a beautiful clear day to Wickenburg AZ, and the dedication of a new Kodiak airplane for Missionary Air Fellowship. This Kodiak is airframe number 95 and the tenth Kodiak airplane to go into service with MAF. This airplane is scheduled to be assigned into the Indonesian area in the near future. Approximately 500 people attended the service and a number of short sightseeing rides were given in the Kodiak.

Of interest to the ARMS hams, there was also the dedication of a GATR ball (see www.GATR.com for detailed information). The GATR ball is a portable satellite communication system that can be packed into two small suitcases, weighing approximately 65 pounds and 95 pounds, for easy transport in small airplanes. The system can be set up and operational is less than 30 minutes, and was operational on the Internet at the dedication for those that wanted to use their personal WiFi equipment for Skype or text. MAF was able to borrow a GATR during the recent Philippine disaster , and provided much needed communication in the remote areas of the Islands.

The Lord provided a remarkable fund raising through the local Wickenburg Bible Fellowship to purchase this VERY expensive tool for MAF to use in their ministry, and will be ready for rapid deployment when the need arises. We give HIM the praise for HIS bountiful provision.
