#### SATELLITE PROGRAM IS GREAT SUCCESS

Jack, W3GY, presented a great program on how to work the satellites. Jack uses an arrow antenna and a camera tripod to support the antenna. He also uses a small Kenwood rig that is capable of transmitting and receiving at the same time. Jack tape records all his satellite QSOs and plays them back in order to verify the QSOs. The satellite QSOs are very short, and involve exchanging locator grids. Jack's program was interesting and informative. Well done, Jack!

# SIX METERS – The Magic Band

At a club meeting recently, Jere, W3JLV, told me that he found his tuner was able to tune his G5RV antenna to six meters. I tried it, and it works for me, too! Now, granted, a G5RV is not the best antenna for six meters, but it does indeed work. I did some research, and found that the six-meter band is divided into five sections:

50.000 - 50.080 Beacons

50.080 - 50.100 CW (my favorite section of the band)

50.100 – 50.125 DX window

50.125 - 50.200 USB

50.200 - 50.300 Meteor Scatter and other modes

The Beacons section of the band is very interesting. Tuning through this section of six meters, you listen for the CW beacons: most of the time you won't hear anything. But, when the band opens, you will be able to hear the beacons! Perhaps you will only hear one, but if there is a really good band opening, you may hear many of the beacons. The beacons transmit callsign/B then give the grid locator of the beacon. The beacons transmit all the time. So by listening for the beacons, you can tell if there is a band opening, and also if it is a really good opening to a large area (many beacons heard), and you can also tell the area to which the band is open. But you might just tell me you don't know CW. Not to worry! If you can hear signals, the band is open.

The CW section of the band (for actual QSOs) is only 20 kHz wide, but there is considerable activity in that wonderful section when the band opens.

The DX window section is reserved for very long distance communication. No stateside QSOs should be carried on in this band segment.

In the USB section of the band, when there is an opening, this section is really hopping! At least that is what I have been told; when the band is open, I am hanging out in the CW portion.

In the Meteor Scatter section of the band, meteor scatter QSOs are made. For this very interesting mode, you can check out the Ping Jockey Central website at:

Lots of great info about meteor scatter QSOs on this website. You can make skeds there, too.

Now, a postscript! I thought I might try putting up an actual six-meter antenna, so I home-brewed a six-meter ground plane, and installed it on my roof. To my great surprise, during band openings, the G5RV was much better than the ground plane for receiving, and also for transmitting. I could be heard better using the G5RV! Go figure! Of course it is better to have a six-meter directional antenna, like a yagi or a quad. So far, I have worked 95 stations in 28 states in the past three months on six meters using only my G5RV (102 feet long).

There are several other amateurs I would like to mention here. Randy, N3JPV, has a lot more experience than I with six meters, and Tony, KA3BPN, has a lot of experience with meteor scatter QSOs.

The group of amateurs taking part in the DXpedition will be operating from Swains Island in the South Pacific Ocean using the callsign NH8S. You give a serial number and your county; stations in PA will give you a serial number and their county. Stations outside Pennsylvania will give their ARRL section. If you work DX, those QSOs count, too! You can work any stations in this fun on-the-air activity. Just keep an accurate log, and send in your entry form after the contest. Be sure to state Columbia-Montour ARC as your club affiliation.

Please send me your results, so I can tabulate them with the other club members. We usually have a good showing in this event, so please plan to give it a try! It is fun!

## **NET CONTROL STATIONS NEEDED**

In order to be prepared to carry on emergency communications when needed, we have an ARES Net on our CMARC repeater, 147.225 +, tone 203.5. The net is activated every Tuesday

evening at 7:00 p.m. local time. We need amateurs who will act as net control stations, and you do not need to be a member of CMARC to be a net control station. Jack is an Assistant ARES Emergency Coordinator, and he is our Net Coordinator who schedules the net control stations. He will provide a script for you to read when you act as net control. Please keep on checking into the net, and encourage others to check in, too!

Jack has about ten people who act as net control stations, so the job of actually being a net control only comes around every ten weeks or so. The more people we have, the less frequently each person has to be net control, and the more people we can involve in emergency communications.

Our VE team is now a "Field Stocked Team". This is a higher level of VE team since we will now automatically receive all testing materials and updates without making a request. This status was achieved due to our monthly testing schedule and hamfest activities. We are currently the only ARRL VE testing team in our immediate area and have tested Hams from as far away as Lock Haven. Thanks to a dedicated group of volunteers, we have maintained a monthly testing schedule and give tests almost every month before our club meetings.

#### ARRL DX QSL SERVICE

If you are a member of both CMARC and ARRL, we will forward your DX QSL cards to the ARRL Outgoing QSL Bureau. Just make sure I get the cards (you can give them to me at a meeting or drop your cards at my home), and as soon as I accumulate a pound of cards (about 155 cards), I will forward the cards to the bureau. There is no charge to you for this service, but I must have your ARRL membership number in order to forward your cards. CMARC collects and sends to the bureau about eight shipments of one pound each of DX QSL cards per year. About ten club members use this service at present.
