## INTERESTING CONTRIBUTIONS:

Field Day: Don t forget ARRL Field Day starts the morning of June 25 at the Hagevig Fire Training Center. We would like to see all Juneau hams and any Juneau visitors stop by. We ask that attendees be aware that that Capitol City Fire Rescue will be holding a class there, try to avoid getting in their way. For anyone interested there will be FCC exams given for anyone wanting to upgrade. Listen to Capitol Chat on KINY on June 21 at 10.00 pm when we will be interviewed by Sharon Gaiptman.

• Contests: Pat Moore, AL7L, remains king of the Juneau contesters. No one seems ready to take him on. Surely, there is someone out there that will give him a run for his money. Anyone who takes him on and beats him will be awarded a pound of superb coffee. Go for it guys.

• FEMA supports Amateur Radio: Amateur radio clearly has a friend at the top of the Federal Emergency Management Agency. In a speech at an FCC forum on earthquake communications preparedness in early May, FEMA Administrator Craig Fugate listed amateur radio as one of four broad areas, "all equally important," that are critical to the mission of meeting the needs of disaster survivors. The other three are public safety communications, broadcast radio and TV, and personal wireless communications.

• Ultimate Backups: Calling hams "the ultimate backups" and "our last line of defense," Fugate noted how amateur radio often provides the first communications out of stricken areas, "getting the word out in the critical first hours and first days as the rest of the systems come back up." There is a tendency, he said, to

dismiss hams because our other communication systems generally are very reliable and "that we can never fathom that they'll fail. They do. They have. They will." He urged including "a strong amateur radio community" in emergency planning because, "when you need amateur radio, you really need 'em."

• QRZ.com: When you have a chance it would be good to go into QRZ.com and check the information on yourself. I recently checked mine and found an error. It is easy to make corrections. After bringing up the QRZ.com screen simply type in your call sign, that will go directly to your file. After that follow the instructions.

Upgrade Your License: The March issue of CQ Amateur Radio lists a number of free online practice exams you can use. The questions are from the FCC pool of questions. They are: www.hamtestonline.com, www.hamexam.org, http://www.eham.netWww.eham.net/exams, www.aa9pw.com, www.qrz.com/testing.html . Each responds a little differently. If you aren t comfortable with one site try another. For the Tech and General license you need to get 26 of 35 questions correct and for the Extra the passing score is 37. Get out there and upgrade that license! If you want to schedule an exam contact Jerry Prindle, KL7HFI, phone 907 789 7291. He is the Juneau Volunteer Exam Coordinator. For those that like to use flash cards the ARRL has them available. Go to www.arrl.org.shop, and look for licensing materials. In buying any licensing material remember the General question pool will be changing after June 30 2011.

World Radio Online: Sometime back CQ Magazine purchased the periodical World Radio, a paper publication and converted it to an online magazine. It has many interesting articles and is quite easy to use. To visit the site go to WWW.worldradiomagazine.com . If you scroll down, on the left side you will see information on how to sign up. • Alaska Amateur Mauled by Bear: Friends Use Ham Radio to Summon Help TAGS: grizzly bear, handheld transceiver

Wes Perkins, KL0FM, of Nome, Alaska, was seriously mauled by a grizzly bear during a hunting trip on Sunday, May 14. According to the Alaska State Troopers, Perkins and two friends had been tracking the bear east of Nome -- located on the Seward Peninsula -- when the big grizzly charged the group. Perkins companions shot and killed the animal during the attack. Perkins was badly hurt, including severe injuries to his face. The hunters called for help using a handheld transceiver.

According to the Anchorage Daily News, Bering Air helicopter pilot Ben Rowe landed a Robinson R44 at a snowy creek about two-thirds of the way between Nome and Council; Council is about 57 miles east-northeast of Nome. Wes has had a [hunting] camp down in Council for probably 30 years, said Matt Johnson, Nome s volunteer fire chief. Perkins is a 32 year veteran of the Nome Volunteer Fire Department, serving as Chief from 2000-2007.

Perkins is also is the president of Seward Peninsula Amateur Radio Club (SPARC), which operates the repeater system that his partners used to report the bear attack, said Colby Carter, KL0CR, a longtime friend of Perkins. For anybody that needed help, [Perkins] would do his utmost to help you any way that he could. Rescuers shuttled Perkins to a hospital in Nome, but them was airlifted to Harborview Medical Center in Seattle. Perkins -- a lifelong Nome resident -- underwent emergency surgery Monday morning, May 16. Doctors told the family that the care Perkins received as medics rushed him from flight to flight saved his life, son Casey Perkins, KL2KW, told the Anchorage Daily News. He s fighting hard and they re trying hard to help him.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, the bear lay in the deep snow beside a creek. Perkins, riding ahead of his partners, passed the animal. He drove another 70 feet and turned around. The grizzly charged and Perkins -- still on his snowmachine and handling gear -- wasn t able to get out of the way. "My understanding is that it was a very large bear. One of the biggest that people have seen around here, Johnson told the Anchorage Daily News. The other hunters shot the animal, which wandered away and died. The hunters skinned and salvaged it, said Alaska State Troopers spokeswoman Megan Peters. We have no indication that it was anything other than a tragic hunting accident, she said. -- Thanks to the Anchorage Daily News and ARRL Alaska Section Manager Jim Larsen, AL7FS, for the information
