

From "The ARRL Letter" November 20: The FCC has notified four individuals that it is setting aside their recent Extra Class license grants and privileges while it investigates alleged irregularities in the volunteer examination process. Letters from the FCC went out November 10 to Elmer J Smith, N3UNR, of Effort, Pennsylvania; Philip DiGenova, N3UNS, of Bartonsville, Pennsylvania; Wayne S Bowden, AA3RT, of Millsboro, Delaware; and Kenneth L Sharp, AA3RU, of Boyertown, Pennsylvania, that the Commission was setting aside their Extra Class grants. All four individuals were requested to return their Extra Class license documents and Certificates of Successful Completion of Examination (CSCEs) to the FCC's Gettysburg office.

"This letter is not a finding that you have engaged in misconduct," the letter said, adding that if the FCC's investigation concludes that it should grant the Extra Class license applications, it will reinstate the grants.

An FCC official said the investigation was looking into testing irregularities including allegations that examinees might have been coached or given test answers. "They are bumped back for now while we investigate, since we had enough evidence at the outset to do that," he said.

For the time being at least, Smith and DiGenova have been bumped back to Technician class licensees, while Sharp will revert to Advanced class and his former N3TPN call sign. All three took their examinations October 6 at a W5YI-VEC session in Warminster, Pennsylvania. Bowden apparently never held a ham ticket

prior to taking the examination elements for Extra Class at Spring City, Pennsylvania, on October 4 during a W5YI-VEC testing session. The call sign AA3RT no longer appears in the FCC database. The records of the other three amateurs involved were modified November 10.

FCC and ARRL/VEC Nov. 10, 1998

The FCC has announced its volunteer examiner expense reimbursement maximum as \$6.49 for calendar year 1999. Accordingly, the ARRL/VEC has set its 1999 test fee at \$6.45.

This increase, up from a 1998 maximum of \$6.39, is based on a 1.5% increase in the Department of Labor Consumer Price Index (CPI) over the period September 1997 to September 1998.

As an ARRL/VEC policy, examinations which include only Elements 1A (5 WPM) and/or Element 2 (Novice written examination) will not be charged the standard fee in 1999. Morse code exemption applicants will be charged the standard \$6.45 fee in 1999.

For 1999, ARRL VEs may retain up to \$4 for each applicant they serve in order to offset their necessary and prudently-incurred expenses. ARRL VEs who retain such expense reimbursements are required by the ARRL/VEC to retain income and expense records for three years.

#### HF on a Budget

By Richard H. Arland, K7SZ Here's an overview of what to expect on the various HF bands

- **160 and 80 meters (1.8-2.0 MHz; 3.5-4.0 MHz):** These "nighttime" bands require big antennas to produce a big signal, but you can get creative with smaller radiators too. 160--called "Top Band" by old timers--and 80 can produce DX contacts, especially during the winter months when band noise is at a minimum. (By convention, the 80-meter SSB, or phone, band is referred to as 75 meters.)
- **40 meters (7.0-7.3 MHz):** Propagation on 40 covers all of North America during various hours of the day and can produce some exotic DX. Antennas are very manageable, since a 40-meter dipole is about 66 feet end-to-end. Less than full-size antennas also still work pretty well. Much of the rest of the world only enjoys an allocation at 7.0-7.1 MHz, and overseas broadcasters can dominate the upper portions of the band at night.
- **30 meters (10.1-10.15 MHz):** Propagation is a cross between 40 and 20 meters. Long-haul DX is possible on 30. You can only operate CW, and there is a 200 W PEP output maximum power limit on this band, so the you don't need a lot of power to be heard. Many low-power (QRP) operators find 30 meters a nice place to hang out.
- **20 meters (14.0-14.35 MHz):** The DX band! When conditions are right, the band is open for DX all day and occasionally well into the nighttime hours. Antennas are comparatively small. A 20-meter dipole measures only about 33 feet end-to-end.
- **17, 15 and 12 meters (18.068-18.168; 21.0-21.45; 24.89-24.99 MHz):** These are three great daytime (and sometimes nighttime) DX bands, but they require increased sunspot activity to produce reliable communications paths. Now that the sunspot cycle is on the upswing, these bands will be open more frequently. Antennas can be pretty compact, too.
- **10 meters (28.0-29.7):** This band, our largest HF allocation, really hops during the sunspot maximum, yielding exotic DX from just after sunrise well into the hours of darkness. A simple dipole or shortened CB vertical antenna and a few watts of power will net lots of contacts. The upper portion of the band is home to some FM repeaters.
