

FROM THE DX LISTENERS' CLUB WEBPAGE... Graphical Comparisons of Solar Cycles... or, How Things Will Get M-u-c-h Worse Before They Get Better!

While there have been frequent band HF openings, many HF operators have noticed the continued decline of propagation conditions on 20 through 10 meters.


We have a long way to go before we hit the bottom of this cycle... in fact another two to four years! So get used to worsening conditions, tweak up your antenna systems and listen more often to the lower bands (160 to 40 meters). In the current Cycle 23 we hit the first peak Sunspot Number, SSN, of about 120 some

LEFT: Cycles 21 & 22 spoiled us by providing GREAT conditions. **RIGHT**: The current cycle is thought to be more like Cycles 20, 17, 13, 10 & 2... all with much lower SSN peaks. **Comments from the DX LISTENERS CLUB:** Note... the start date for each cycle is calculated using the 13-month smoothed monthly mean sunspot number. One advantage of using this three years ago and current SSNs are averaging around 60. At its worst, we should see SSNs of between 5 and 10 before we'll see gradual improvement that marks the start of Cycle 24.

The charts below and the accompanying explanatory note are found at *www.dxlisteners.com*. They help give you a feeling for how Solar Cycles vary and, unfortunately, what you can look forward to.

On the positive side, you have plenty to time to get up low band antennas!



statistical (numerical) approach is that the start month of a solar cycle is the same as the month of the solar minimum. It is possible to use other criteria to separate solar minimum and the start of a solar sunspot cycle, however, which criteria to use & how much importance each is given, unfortunately leaves room for individual opinion.
