The world has lost one of its foremost and unique amateur radio leaders... Shrikant VU2SJA, at age 49. He

led a distinguished political and academic career serving as a Member of Parliament, Minister of State and university Chancellor. Shrikant is being called a "Gentle Politician" by the Indian media. That is most appropriate for a ham that has lived by the spirit of the Amateurs Code.

He was also scholarly...spoke 18 languages, authored three books and had a personal library of 15,000+ books. The press reported that he has the Guinness World Record for a politican holding university degrees... 24!

Shrikant had been a strong, steady guiding force for the rapidly growing Indian radio amateur population. Many of his achievements can be found in the NIAR Annual Report reprinted in the November WRC Update.

We are certain he will serve as a role model and that his contributions to India and its ham community will be long remembered.

# FOUR MEN OF PRINCIPLE REMEMBERED FOR THEIR GOVERNMENT SERVICE... WILL THOSE SERVING AT THE FCC BE **REMEMBERED FOR THEIR PRINCIPLES?**

Many Hams believe that the principles that have guided the development of communications in the US have been pushed aside. Hopefully, we will see history repeat itself... revealing that men of principle do indeed still work for the government.

History shows that men of principle have had a far more profound impact on our country than politicians and appointees... some that may want to bend the laws of physics and ignore the lessons learned from applying unproven technology.

We are reminded every so often that such men exist. This week the names Cox, Nash. Richardson and Ruckelshaus surfaced

in the news... all considered men of principle and heroes to a great many. Harvard Law Professor Archibald Cox, 92, and Georgetown Law Professor Sam Nash, 79, both passed away on the same day.

The four remind us of an ugly period of US history, 31 years ago, when these men of principle stood

> firm. Under tremendous pressure, Chief Counsel Nash headed the Senate legal team that resulted in President Nixon's resignation.

As Special Prosecutor, Cox doggedly led the effort to obtain the then secret Nixon tapes and was ordered to be fired by the President. During the "Saturday Night Massacre", Attorney General Elliot Richardson and his deputy, William Ruckelshaus, both refused to carry out Nixon's orders and resigned instead.

At his firing, Cox issued a one-sentence statement: "Whether ours shall be a government of laws and not of men is now for Congress and ultimately the American people."

I thank Leo for sending me this Wish. It serves to remind us that in situations where neither logic, science, goodwill nor men of principle appear to prevail, a simple wish, or prayer, may accomplish wonders!

So when I yearn for freedom, peace or simpler things like a radio spectrum free of BPL pollution, I can consider the following wish:

*May there always be work for your hands to do;* May your purse always hold a coin or two; May the sun always shine on your windowpane; May a rainbow be certain to follow each rain; May the hand of a friend always be near you; May God fill your heart with gladness to cheer you.

We should all be able to relate to this Friendship Wish. If its metaphors are interpreted correctly, this Wish could have been written by a ham or perhaps the author of the Amateurs Code.

Work to earn money to buy equipment ... Sunshine on the ionosphere for good skip conditions... An answer to each CQ...

The operator's hand on a key or PTT switch ...

A wholesome spirit with heartfelt friendship...

Few would argue that the Irish haven't had extensive experience with wishes over the mellenia. There may have been people through the ages, such as Monks in monasteries, recording the granting of wishes. So there is little reason to doubt the information stated in Leo's email. It says once you've made your wish, if you send the Irish Friendship Wish to:

1 person --- your wish will be granted in 1 year!

3 people 6 months	9 people 5 days
5 people 3 months	10 people 3 days
6 people 1 month	12 people 2 days
7 people 2 weeks	15 people 1 day
8 people 1 week	20 people 3 hours

Wow... even those who have studied for the Florida FCAT can recognize the pattern. Judging by the progression from 5:10:20 people, the wish granting time shrinks from 3 months to 3 days to 3 hours.

Aha! If you double the number of people, the next smaller unit of time is reached! So, it appears that your wish would be granted in only 3 minutes when you send it to just 40 people. But, if you really need almost instant gratification...send the Irish Wish wish to 80 people. Your wish should materialize in an amazing 3 seconds! Thank G-d for computers when you need a wish granted in a hurry.

### From Lizz KG4RQC & Lindy KG4PQG: Another Facet of Their Public Service, the...



#### The Chinese Shar-Pei, what is it?

This is one of the questions Lizz and I hear from people who are curious about these "wrinkly little cuties". We tell people that the puppies have more wrinkles than a box of prunes and in most cases it's true.

The history of the Shar-Pei has been fraught with peril and they were driven very close to the edge of extinction just a few short decades ago in China. Following the establishment of the People's Republic of China as a communist nation, the dog population of China was essentially eliminated. During this period a few Shar-Pei were bred in Hong Kong and in the Republic of China (Taiwan).

In the United States, the documented history of the breed goes back to 1966 when a few dogs were imported from stock registered with the Hong Kong Kennel Club. Strong interest in the breed increased in 1973 when Matgo Law of Down-Homes Kennels, Hong Kong, appealed to dog fanciers in the United States to "Save the Chinese Shar-Pei". The response was enthusiastic, and because of their rarity, a limited number of Shar-Pei arrived in the United States in the fall of 1973. This may be the only reason the Chinese Shar-Pei exists today.

The Chinese Shar-Pei is an ancient and unique breed, first thought to have been in existence since the Han dynasty in China around 200 B.C. More recent genetic investigation has confirmed that even this may not be accurate. In a recent study in the journal "Science" it was discovered that:

While dogs have about 99 percent of their genes in common, a few very distinct genetic differences separate them into some 400 breeds known worldwide.

Comparing dog genes to wolves, researchers found that a group of ancient dog types split off first. Two branches of the canine family tree were the earliest to diverge from the wolves. One branch includes the oriental breeds Shar-Pei, Shiba Inu, Chow Chow and Akita; the other the seemingly diverse breeds of African Basenji, Siberian Husky, Alaskan Malamute, Afghan Hound and Saluki.

In addition to these ancient dogs three other groups were developed later including canines for guarding, herding and hunting - largely as a result of breeding programs developed over the last several hundred years.

#### Why do we love them so?

As for our love of the "Pei", we fell in love with one we adopted from a family that was leaving the country and couldn't take her with them. Her name was Loo Loo. Her AKC registered name was almost unpronounceable.

When Loo Loo had gotten very old and we knew her time was short, we contacted "North American Shar-Pei Rescue". We had decided that if we were going to get another dog, it was going to be a Pei. Well, we looked at what NASPR was doing to help abandoned and stray Pei and sent in our volunteer application. We volunteered to provide a temporary foster home for Pei in need until a permanent loving home could be found for them. Of course we never counted on Schnuffles!

Schnuffles was our first foster. She had spent most of her 4-5 years of life in a "Puppy Mill" where they just used her to breed one litter of puppies after another for the owners to sell in their stores. Palm Beach County Animal Control and the law finally caught up with these people in March 2003. Schnuffles was seized, along with 79 other dogs of various breeds, by court order and we brought her home about three months later. She was a wreck! All skin and bones and scared to death of her own shadow. We told NASPR that she was not adoptable in her current condition. However, we became so attached to her, and she to us, that after a few months we just couldn't let her go and adopted her ourselves. We've had Schnuffles for almost a year now and she has become a happy and healthy Pei once more.

There have been quite a few rescues, and families giving them loving homes, since then and Schnuffles has helped each and every one of them to readjust to a normal life.

As for us, we decided to get a puppy. Her name is Callie. That's her picture up above and she's a doll. Whenever anyone asks why we got another one, or why we keep fostering Pei in need, Lizz just tells them "Shar-Pei are like potato-chips, you can't have just one!"
