2-meter list

In response to a request from Jim Darby, W7FYH, this issue of *Sparks* includes a list of 2-meter FM repeater and simplex frequencies in use around western WA, along with a smattering of BC repeaters that we can hear in Seattle. This is a list I've compiled over several years for my own use, sorted by frequency rather than location. Let me know if you have any additions or corrections. I'll list the 75-cm repeaters in next month's *Sparks*.

The shaded rows indicate frequencies used for both voice and packet operation. City and county names in bold italics indicate simplex frequencies used by ARES/RACES teams for the areas listed.

"Shared non-protected pairs" are repeater pairs set aside by the Western WA Amateur Relay Ass'n (WWARA, the repeater coordinating body for our area) for use by temporary or experimental repeater installations, or by anyone wanting to put up a repeater and willing to risk interference from other machines on the same pair.

A few words about PL: I know there are some repeater owners who get apoplectic when somebody blabs about their PL tones; but in fact PL offers almost no security or exclusivity, and owners who think otherwise are simply deluding themselves. With only about 32 tones in common use, it doesn't take long for a determined operator to cycle through all of the tones until he finds the one that works. At any rate, on-air etiquette dictates that you refrain from giving out the tones over the air, unless you're sure that the repeater operators don't mind.

PL is very useful in allowing repeaters to coexist on the same frequency pair without mutual interference, or to allow you to access a particular receiver within a repeater system. But it won't keep out the riff-raff. - de N7UK

Minutes of the PARS general meeting, Apr. 15, 1999

The club met at the Bellevue Senior Center. Thirteen members were present, a quorum. One visitor also attended. Treasurer Beckmeier was absent. The President brought the meeting to order at 7:06 PM.

Following introductions and the Pledge of Allegiance, the President introduced the night's speaker, Charles Scharlau, NZØI, who presented a program on fox hunting. Charles compared US and international competitions, and demonstrated some of his homebrew equipment.

After the break, the President proceeded with the business meeting. The members approved, without revision, the minutes of the March general meeting as published in the April issue of *Sparks*.

Treasurer's report: The Treasurer reported, prior to the meeting, that the club had a positive balance for the 30 days ending April 15. The President collected receipts for club expenses in the Treasurer's absence. [Financial statements are available from the Treasurer - Ed.]

Trailer Committee: The Secretary reported that most of his efforts for the month had been concentrated on collecting information about triband beams, to replace the club's existing beam. He still needed to replace the batteries for the 12V distribution system.

Field Day: Chairman Bob Adams, KJ7BP, reported that he had received permission for the club to use Downtown Park in Bellevue once again for Field Day. The club won't start setting up at the site until 1100 hrs. (local) on June 26, so that we'll have the entire 27-hour period to operate per the FD rules.

Nomination Committee: The Vice President noted that elections would be held in May, not April, as the President had announced at the March meeting. She solicited additional nominations for the four officers' positions. The President reminded the members that everyone would have an opportunity to nominate themselves or someone else at the May meeting.

Old Business: none

New Business: The President announced that the PARS fox hunt would be held on Saturday, May 22. Participants are to meet at the Senior Center at 9:00 AM. The area for the hunt will be bound approximately by SR-520, I-90, Lake Washington, and Lake Sammamish.

Tim Monk, KD7DEY, presented the club with a mirror etched with the club name and logo, which he had made for a high school art project. The mirror will be hung in the trailer.

John Black, W7HIL, said that he and neighboring hams were setting up an EOC at Providence Point, and solicited donations of CB equipment.

Les Ellis, KC7TQP, offered to present a slide show for the May program on the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. The members agreed to this.

The President congratulated the participants in the CQ WW WPX Phone Contest for their efforts. He suggested that the club should plan to participate in certain contests on a regular basis, as it already does with Field Day. The Secretary recommended the WA Salmon Run, the ARRL Phone Sweepstakes, and the WPX Phone Contest for inclusion on the club's contest calendar.

The Secretary read a card from Larry McIntyre's widow, Donna, thanking the club for its donation to the Mary Lou Brown Scholarship Fund. She mentioned that she wanted to donate some of Larry's radio equipment to the club.

The Secretary moved that the club purchase a new triband beam to replace its aging Hy-Gain TH3JR. The members voted and approved this motion. The Secretary then moved that the new beam should be a Mosley TA-33-M, based on his comparison of available models and features. The members voted and approved this motion also.

With no further business, the President adjourned the meeting at 8:43 PM.

Emergency Supplies

With Y2K looming, and scenes of the Midwest tornado damage still vivid in our memories, it's a good time to think about what disaster supplies you should have on hand. The American Red Cross recommends that you keep these items on hand, so that you and your family can survive for 72 hours without assistance:

- ★Water: At least three gallons per person for drinking and sanitation, and extra water for pets. Store water in non-breakable plastic bottles. Replace it every six months.
- ★Food: At least a three-day supply of nonperishable food. Select foods that require no refrigeration, preparation or cooking, and little or no water, e.g. canned meats, fruits, and vegetables. Replace every six months unless it's specially packaged for long-term storage, like MREs. Pack a can of Sterno so you can heat the food if desired. For infants, include formula, bottles, and powdered milk. For pets, have a three-day supply of dry or canned pet food.
- ★First aid, health, and hygiene supplies: Include band-aids, safety pins, soap, 2 pairs of latex gloves, sunscreen, 2- and 4-inch gauze pads, triangular bandages, 2- and 3-inch sterile roller bandages, scissors, tweezers, needle, moist towelettes, antiseptic, thermometer, tongue depressors, tube of Vaseline, aspirin or Tylenol, Kaopectate or Imodium, antacid, Ipecac and activated charcoal (use only when advised by a Poison Control Center), and laxative. For sanitation: toilet paper, feminine supplies, garbage bags with ties, plastic bucket with tight lid, disinfectant, and household bleach. Personal hygiene items: toothbrush/ toothpaste, shampoo, razor, denture needs. Include diapers for infants. Have a three-day supply of all prescription drugs, including drugs for the pets, and extra eyeglasses and hearing-aid batteries if needed.
- ★Clothing and bedding: At least one complete change of clothing and footwear per person, sturdy shoes or boots, rain gear, blankets or sleeping bags, hat and gloves, thermal underwear, and sunglasses.
- **★**Tools and emergency supplies: Mess kits, battery radio with extra batteries, flashlight with

- extra batteries, cash or traveler's checks, manual can opener, utility knife, small ABC fire extinguisher, tube tent, pliers, tape, compass, matches in a waterproof container, aluminum foil, plastic storage containers, signal flare, paper, pencil, needles, thread, medicine dropper, shut-off wrench for your gas meter, whistle, plastic sheeting, pet carrier or leash, and a local street map. Pack some games, playing cards, books for entertainment.
- ★Important documents: Keep these in a waterproof, portable container: Will, insurance policies, contracts, deeds, stocks and bonds, passports, social security cards, immunization records, bank account numbers, credit card account numbers and companies, inventory of valuable household goods, important telephone numbers, birth/marriage/death certificates (this all assumes that you don't have a safe-deposit box).

Store your kit in a convenient place known to all family members. Keep all items in airtight plastic bags, inside portable containers like plastic trash cans or duffel bags.

Whew! That's quite a list, but everything on it makes a lot of sense. Don't wait until Dec. 31 to start collecting your supplies.

Radio games in Portland this Aug.

This summer the tenth anniversary Friendship Radiosport Games will be held in Portland, Aug. 6-13. The Friendship Amateur Radio Society (FARS) is the organizing group for the Friendship Radiosports Games. The events are: CW sending, CW receiving, CW pileup (receiving through simulated QRM/QRN), HF contesting, and ARDF (foxhunting).

In conjunction with the Radiosports games the first-ever IARU Region 2 ARDF Championships will be held in Portland Aug. 9-13. This event will provide ARDF practice sessions and two international-style foxhunts, one using 2 meters and the other using 80 meters. These will involve 5 foxes each transmitting for 1 minute in a "round robin" fashion.

These events bring hams and their families from all around the globe to our back yard for sport, fun, and friendship. The local ham community is urged to become involved in these activities and help make them a success. An event like this needs a lot of volunteer help. Some of the areas of assistance needed are: Drivers, score keeping, hosting foreign competitors in your home, planning and logistics, donations, and event setup and registration.

MFJ buys Hy-Gain

From the ARRL newsletter: "MFJ Enterprises has acquired Hy-Gain, a well-known manufacturer of antennas, towers, and rotators. Hy-Gain was owned by Telex Communications of Lincoln, Nebraska. The deal closed Monday, according to MFJ President Martin Jue, K5FLU, who declined to reveal the purchase price. Jue said today that MFJ plans to move the antenna manufacturing facility to Mississippi and staff it with local employees. He anticipated production at the new site could begin within a few weeks.

"'We bought everything -- the whole deal,' Jue said. 'We're going to have to shift some things around to make room.' Jue said MFJ would tackle the moving job after the Dayton Hamvention.

"As it has done with other enterprises it's acquired, MFJ plans to keep the Hy-Gain name and operate the antenna manufacturer as a separate entity. Hy-Gain products will compete with MFJ's own line of antenna products, but Jue said the short-lived Ameritron antenna line would be discontinued in favor of the Hy-Gain line.

"Former Cushcraft Production Manager Art Hambleton, K1ART, joined MFJ Enterprises last fall. Jue said Hambleton will be involved in the new Hy-Gain venture, but he was not sure in what capacity.

"Jue said Hy-Gain would immediately start selling the entire product line through the Amateur Radio dealer network. For the past year, Hy-Gain had sold its products factory-direct. MFJ said it expects there to be a 'small transition period' as stock, parts, equipment, and production are moved to Starkville. As part of MFJ, Hy-Gain will continue its current product line and introduce several new ones -- including two new verticals that will be announced later this week at the Dayton Hamvention.
