Luckily it had been a thrift store purchase, so our dollar loss was negligible.

Everyone's been anxious to share their stories about where they were and what they were doing when the shaker hit, and we'll be doing so at this month's meeting. We can all take pride in the local hams who put their emergency-response training to use to keep our police, fire, Red Cross, and other public-safety agencies in touch, even as King County's 800 MHz trunked system became almost instantly overloaded with traffic. I made my own small contribution to the relief effort, manning the ARES radios along with Stitz, W7BET, at the Shoreline EOC for about 2-1/2hours that day. We were, fortunately, spared the kind of damage that befell Olympia and Pioneer Square. The battalion chief on duty continually bemoaned the lack of effective communications with his fire trucks, and was threatening to put a ham on each one so he could keep tabs on his guys. We earned big Brownie points with our new fire chief for our initiative and organization in establishing our emergency net, and I'm sure that ARES/RACES groups all over the area made an impression on their served agencies as well. Those of you who are involved in emergency communications, or would like to be, should take note of the upcoming Communications Academy at Sand Point, in this month's Events Calendar.

Puyallup Hamfest

Your *Sparks* Editor has just returned from this year's Mike & Key Hamfest, having put in a goodly amount of his spare time over the last several weeks hauling, cleaning, pricing, hauling, loading, etc. (did he mention hauling?) the PARS' Puyallup Plunder (henceforth to be known as the P3). He's mentioning this expenditure of his time as a thinly-veiled, nay, butt-nekkid excuse for the tardiness of this month's edition. Additionally, it gives him a chance to file this report while his recollection is still fresh, and to refer to himself in the third person.

Charles Beckmeier, Doug Bell, and he, uh, I loaded the P3 into Charles' and my vehicles Friday morning for the trip south. We arrived at the fairgrounds early, queued up at the gate about an hour before the 2 PM opening, and found ourselves set upon by some of the other dealers in line, who were determined to get first crack at the P3 before we could even take it out of our cars. We gave away some of the P3 that we didn't want to take away with us. Everyone packed it in at 3:00, loaded up their leftovers, and headed for home.

Minutes of the PARS General Meeting, 15 February 2001

The members met at the Bellevue Senior Center. Ten members attended, a quorum. President Beckmeier brought the meeting to order at 7:10 PM.

Following introductions and the Pledge of Allegiance, the President proceeded to the business meeting. The members approved, without correction, the minutes of the January general meeting as published in the February issue of *Sparks*.

Treasurer's report: The Treasurer was absent.

Trailer report: The Secretary had nothing to report.

Contest report: The Secretary reminded the members about the upcoming CQ WW WPX Contest, as detailed in the February *Sparks*. He announced that the members would start setting up the antennas at 0900 on Mar. 24. Bob Adams agreed to let the club use his callsign, KJ7BP, for the contest, which was a more desirable call because of its uncommon prefix.

Field Day: Co-chair Jim Darby had applied for the permit to use Downtown Park for Field Day weekend. He expressed some concern about having vehicles parked on the grounds. Other members opined that this should not be a problem, as the club had parked vehicles there for previous Field Days. Mark Whitaker outlined his efforts to have King County ARES, Search and Rescue, King Co. EOC, the Coast Guard, and others set up exhibits at the Field Day site.

Publicity: Chair Lisa Marker was not present. The Secretary stated that Lisa had completed the text for the new brochure, but was in need of some photos to include with the text. The Secretary hoped to have a draft brochure available for the March meeting.

The President thanked Al Staples and the Secretary for providing refreshments.

Old Business: The Secretary reiterated that he had renewed the 443.2 repeater coordination for another five years, had signed up PARS as a member of the Western WA Amateur Relay Association for a year and planned to attend as many of the WWARA general meetings as possible, and that Steve Szombathy would be our new PSE liaison to provide us with access to the repeater site. Doug Bell reported that he was compiling a list of repeater controllers and their features, in preparation for the club to decide on which controller to buy.

Hamfest: Chair John Heflin was not present. The Secretary noted that the club had a lot of hamfest donations this year, including commercial FM radios donated by the Shoreline Fire Dept. and miscellaneous items from John Sorensen, K7WNE. He announced that there would be a work party on Feb. 24 to clean up the donated items.

New Business: none

The President recessed the meeting for a 15minute break. Following the break, Mark Whitaker showed an ham radio introductory video produced by former member Chuck Zappala in 1992, and featuring a number of present and former PARS members.

With no further business, the meeting adjourned at 9:25.
