### **Skywarn Recognition Day**

The Skywarn program is a joint ARRL/National Weather Service (NWS) partnership where Hams provide weather information services to their local NWS office. If you attend the May/June club meetings, you're likely to hear one of the NWS employees, usually Matt, KD8EFY, provide a detailed explanation. The first Friday in December celebrates that partnership with an operating event known as Skywarn Recognition Day (SRD). During the 24-hour event, NWS offices from across the country are on-the-air offering opportunities for contacts.

This year, I operated as WX8MQT, the callsign assigned to our local NWS office. During the roughly 9 hours of operation, I managed to make 141 SSB contacts that included 17 other NWS offices across several states. SRD is a fun special event (not a contest) that shows our support to a vital partnership useful in times of weather-related emergencies. I will attempt to be more diligent in advertising next year's event to give even more Hams the opportunity to participate!

SRD is just one of the events available for local, including ARES members, Ham participation. We are always looking for new ARES members. Applications without accompanying transcripts and additional required documents (if applicable) will not be considered. The ARRL Foundation Scholarship Committee will review all applicants for eligibility and award decisions. Awards are mailed directly to recipients' schools.

### **Lessons Learned From A Few Years As The Region 8 District Coordinator**

### On Auxiliary Communications...

Auxiliary Communications (AUXCOMM) staff are a force multiplier. AUXCOMM personnel are willing and able to provide much more than back-up communications. AUXCOMM is comprised of knowledgeable, dedicated persons who are eager to help in any way that they can. They bring a vast array of experience in a wide range of fields. In region 8, we have trained some of our AUXCOMM persons in debris management and damage assessment. Many of them are retirees who can respond across the region. This deployable force will be invaluable in disaster-stricken communities where local persons are otherwise occupied with other areas of disaster response.

#### On Debris Management...

If a community waits until a disaster to plan for debris management, they're going to pay for disposal themselves. In a flooding event, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) will pay for a large portion of debris disposal *if it is done according to their process specifications*. That includes having a large (several acre parking lot) area to stage debris, separated as vegetation, scrap metal, hazardous, general waste, etc. Communities are wise to train a local team in debris management and have a staging area pre-identified.

When you simply identify an empty lot for people to drop of their flood debris... there will be some legitimate flood debris dropped off, and the lot will immediately get overfilled with everything that everyone has been waiting to get rid of. Everything. Tires. Cans of chemicals. Paint cans. Old gas grills. Everything. When there are some hazardous waste items in a load of garbage, you pay the hazardous waste rate for the whole load. This cost falls on the local community because the FEMA stage/separate plan was not followed.

#### On Incident Management Teams...

Every upper peninsula county and community will need outside help with an Incident Management Team (IMT) if a significant disaster occurs. We can (and do) train our community leaders, first responders, and local players in Incident Command System, but the fact is that most of our communities are pretty small. When a significant event occurs, most of those persons are busy with their regular positions in dealing with the disaster. We can staff a Unified Command and Operations Section Chief well enough, but we are frequently wanting for the positions of Planning Section Chief and Logistics Section Chief.

EMHSD is in the process of working with locals in developing IMTs that are regional and mobile. My fear is that such a team in Region 8 is not going to be activated enough to remain proficient. During the 2018 Houghton Flood we had an Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE) IMT step in. During the 2022 Menominee Paper Fire we had a Department Natural Recourses (DNR) IMT step in. Both of those teams did an OUTSTANDING job. EGLE has had some turnover in their IMT personnel and I'm not sure where they currently stand on the position of sending a team to serve a local community. The DNR IMT that responded to Menominee and the EGLE IMT in Houghton hit the ground running and kept the efforts running on a schedule. Both were very much needed.

Bottom line is... If you have a sizeable incident and need an IMT, we can probably get you one.

#### On Yooper Resilience...

Yoopers are a truly resilient bunch. Through the years we have set up many shelters for relief during forest fire evacuations, flooding, extended power outages, etc. Very few Yoopers show up at a shelter. They stay with family. They stay with friends. They go to their camp. When people are displaced, or can't stay at their homes, we'll always work to set up shelters...but very few Yoopers show up at a shelter.

Also, during the 2018 Houghton flood, there were many homes with mud and debris in their yards and basements. When volunteer groups offered to help muck-out the basement or clean-up the yard, many of the homeowners declined the assistance, telling the volunteers to help those who had more damage.

#### On EMHSD Subject Matter Experts...

The information that you (and I) need is just a phone call to an EMHSD Subject Matter Expert (SME) away. There is a lot to this job field, and the stakes are high that we get it right. There is far too much information for me to know, so I've come to accept that I cannot know it all...as long as I know who will know the answer to the question at hand.

One positive outcome from COVID is that the EMHSD SMEs became very reachable. I don't completely understand why, but I get someone to answer their phone just about every time I call. (That really wasn't the case when they were all cubicle - all the time.) Very often when I'm talking to an emergency manager, or at a Region 8 Homeland Security Planning Board (R8HSPB) meeting, and questions arise, I put my phone on speaker and call Kim Richmond, Brenna Roos, Deanna Johnston, or whomever has the information we need. EMHSD has very dedicated personnel that make themselves available to locals.

#### On Takin' Off to Da Great White North...

Everyone wants to come to a meeting, exercise, or training in the UP... unless it's winter. We frequently have guests attend our R8HSPB meetings, such as subject matter experts, emergency management partners, members from other state and federal agencies, trainers, etc. It seems like they'd like to join the meeting via TEAMS during January, February, and March. Hmmmmm.

They would also like to know what time the northern lights come on, and where they can go to see them. I'm not even sure what to say to that.

So, if you're contemplating a trip up north, please consider mid-February. Catch us during a polar vortex (formerly known as regular old February). The kind of cold that freezes the contents of your nose. Please bring lots of cash and spend it all before you leave (tourism is our only sustainable industry). Give me a heads-up that you're coming, and I'll make sure the Northern Lights get turned on for you.

Oh, what the heck – we'll leave them on for your entire stay!
