Please arrive one-half hour early for test sessions to give time to process applications. Testing applicants should bring the following items with them: Two pieces of I.D. one being a photo I.D., Original license and one clear copy of their license if applicable, Completed form 605 (one will be provided if you don't have one), pencils, calculator and the test fee of \$15.00. Please have the correct fee as examiners do not carry change. **You must have an FRN and provide a valid email address**. *Please contact the individual(s) listed to confirm date(s), location(s), etc.*

News

from the desk of N8NAV



Lately, I have been reminding folks that completing the "big four" courses (IS-100, IS-200, IS-700, and IS-800) is key to successfully integrating into the world of the Incident Command System (ICS). These on-line classes can be found on the FEMA website (fema.gov). You have to register, but the process is relatively painless ("if I can do it, ..."). ICS is the concept that managers (aka Incident Commanders) utilize during an emergency. And as communicators providing support during those emergencies, it is vital that we know and adhere to that concept. So during these long, cold winter days, I encourage you to complete – at least – these courses. A further reminder to provide me with a copy of your completion certificate(s) so that I can keep your training record current.

Speaking of current and training, when I took over as the ARES Emergency Coordinator (EC), I inherited a couple of spreadsheet-type documents that listed who had completed what training. The documents are dated January 14, 2010. Recently, I had a current ARES member query me on what courses he had already completed. Referring to that sheet, I informed him what it showed. Afterward, it dawned on me how out-of-date the documents might be.

So ARES member or not, if you completed any radio-related training since January 2010 that you would like to have documented, please let me know.

And speaking of credit, I know that there are different local operating events in which many of you participate. If you participate in a local net, like the Friday night 10-meter Net, or the Sunday DMR or 2-meter Emergency Nets, then the Net Control for those nets provide me with a report of those activities. If you personally participate in some other radio-related activity – an HF, VHF/UHF, or DMR net or an operating event such as the UP 200 or Ore to Shore – please shoot me an email and let me know (type of activity, date, number of hours, etc.). As I recently told an ARES member, you might as well get credit for the hard work that you do!

I'd like to welcome Bill, KE8KCA, to the ARES group! We are always looking for new ARES members. If interested, you can download an application from the ARRL website, www.arrl.org/ares and email it to me at n8nav1@charter.net, or contact me and I will arrange to get an application to you.

Parting Thoughts

1. From the February edition of Dale's, W8EFK, Tales:

The Annual ARRL Board meeting was held from Jan 18 through the 22nd. Both Vice Director Scott N8SY and I attended. The meeting's official minutes are currently being prepared for approval and they will then be published. But here are some of the meeting highlights:

- Among the items decided include some changes offered by the Programs & Services Committee to the Field Day rules. They are giving more emphasis to the "Get on the Air" stations by allowing a single op to make more than 20 contacts and evening out the points for various modes.
- The Board gave approval of minor changes to the structure for how our 71 ARRL Sections are administered. The Board also reaffirmed the established guidelines for recognizing anniversaries of ARRL Affiliated clubs at 25 year intervals and established a Special Board Meeting to nationally acknowledge those clubs and their anniversaries by an open video broadcast to be called the "Annual Awards Recognition Day".

- In consideration of the value and benefits of Logbook of the World and the age of the current program, the ARRL Administration & Finance Committee provided a motion to begin the upgrade process for Logbook of the World through a new Radiosport Platform Committee.
- There was a proposal put forth to evaluate why many newly licensed hams do not become active on the air, and the Board formed a Survey Development Working Group to evaluate those underlying causes. From those and other actions will come an "Amateur Radio Bootcamp" with live interactive on-line video. This package is proposed to include skill development, license training with exams and continuing education programs.
- The long-awaited solar cycle 25 with the expected improvement in propagation on 10 and 6 meters, provides the opportunity to promote activity of Technician licensees on those bands. To that end we will offer a series of articles on QST, On the Air and other ARRL publications introducing new hams to DXing, contesting, and propagation on those bands.

2. And from Vice-Director Scott, N8SY:

- Do you have all of your NIMS courses completed yet? You know those troublesome little Incident Command courses that everyone has been nagging you about for several years now to get. The weather outside is frightful, and there's nothing good on TV to watch and the bands aren't cooperating for you to play radio much. So, isn't this the perfect time to get that training in before the weather and the bands start turning nice again? Trust me on this, take advantage of the spare time that you now have and get that all important training in now! All the classes that are suggested in the ARES Plan, including ICS-300 and 400 can be found on-line. Yes, you may have to look around a bit to find an open on-line class for ICS-300 and 400, but they are out there and just ready for you to get started on!
- Oh, and don't forget your first aid, CPR and AED as well as those all-important "Stop the Bleed" classes too. They are sometimes the ones that we forget about the easiest and become the most important classes we could ever do. Don't be one of those folks that say, "I don't need this training because nothing ever happens here!" It does and it will! The better that we are prepared, the better we will be at assisting our served agencies and even possibly our own families when that time comes, and like I said, it will come!

FRIENDLY...slow and patient operating when requested; offers friendly advice and counsel to the beginner; kind assistance, cooperation, and consideration for the interests of others. These are the hallmarks of the amateur spirit.

BALANCED...radio is an avocation, never interfering with duties owed to family, job, school, or community.

PATRIOTIC...station and skills are always ready for service to country and community.

-- The original Radio Amateur's Code was written by Paul M. Segal, W9EEA, in 1928.

This was written over 90 years ago and should be applicable to every operator today. If we're operating on the air or working to mentor a new operator, are we living up to this ideal and passing it along to others?
