Please arrive one-half hour early for test sessions to give time to process applications. Testing applicants should bring the following items with them: Two pieces of I.D. one being a photo I.D., Original license and one clear copy of their license if applicable, Completed form 605 (one will be provided if you don't have one), pencils, calculator and the test fee of \$15.00. Please have the correct fee as examiners do not carry change. **You must have an FRN and provide a valid email address**. *Please contact the individual(s) listed to confirm date(s), location(s), etc.*

The Adventure of Amateur Radio

Last week, Lou, KG8NK, and I – with the assistance of Fred, KD8JIP, and Paula, the XYL of Rich, N8GBA – gave a presentation on Amateur Radio to the Northern Center for Lifelong Learning (NCLL). As with most things Ham Radio, *Murphy* visited me early in the form of not having an HDMI port on my laptop. So I had to adlib during my PowerPoint presentation!

I guess I can't speak for the others, but as we got deeper into the talk, I felt that rising feeling of excitement when I speak about a hobby that I **REALLY** love. The presentation lasted at least an hour (I lost track of the time) and it felt like we barely scratched the surface of the different aspects of Amateur Radio. Lou brought many "hands on" examples in the form of radios, keys, coax, etc. He even managed to make a DMR contact with a station in Missouri! By all accounts, the presentation was well-received. It remains to be seen if we obtain any new Hams from the group, although we did invite them!

Shortly afterwards, I had a brief 2-meter conversation with a young man who had obtained his license this past June (I don't recall his call?). He was on his way to the gun range in Negaunee, followed by Search & Rescue class. I mentioned ARES and he replied that he was definitely interested – once he found a balance between family, work and Ham Radio (we've all been there!).

Those that know me know that one of the facets of Ham Radio that I enjoy is contacting long-distance stations (AKA working DX). It can be extremely frustrating particularly when you operate a modest station. But with the current increase in the propagation numbers, even a modest station can work that "All Time New One" (ATNO). Such an event happened to me this weekend when I was able to make an FT8 contact with FT8WW, a single-operator station on Crozet Island in the southern Indian Ocean – a mere 10,600 miles away! It took a lot of time and patience – and some help and encouragement from my friends (you know who you are)!

This column is usually about public service and emergency communications. So what does working DX and the other things have to do with my usual topic? Well first of all, you can't dedicate your time and effort to public service if you don't have a love for the hobby (my opinion). My portion of the NCLL presentation was geared toward how Amateur Radio is utilized in emergency and public service events. However once we got going, the sky was literally the limit! So my New Year's wish to all of you is to enjoy the **total** Adventure of Amateur Radio.

Parting Thoughts

1. From the January edition of Dale's, W8EFK, Tales:

ARRL's Year of the Volunteer kicks off now and the special operating event Volunteers on the AIR (VOTA) associated with it means a lot of us will be hitting the airwaves for this fun event. Check the VOTA web page at https://www.arrl.org/volunteers-on-the-air for the latest information. Everyone who holds an ARRL Volunteer position, including League membership, carries a point value in the VOTA event. A contact with the ARRL President gives you a whopping 300 points, for example. Your local District Emergency Coordinator (DEC) gives you 30 Points and your EC will offer 12. ARRL Volunteers will be sending their contacts to log to Logbook of the World (LoTW) which then handles the scoring automatically. Regular participants are not required to use LoTW, but are encouraged to do so. Updates will be posted regularly. There is also a VOTA Points Table accessible on the web page so you can see the points given by each appointment holder.

3. From the December 23, 2022 edition of the ARRL Member Bulletin:

Rep. Bill Johnson Introduces Bill to Eliminate Private Land Use Restrictions on Amateur Radio

Congressman Bill Johnson (OH-6) introduced a bill in the U.S. House of Representatives (<u>H.R.9670</u>) on Thursday, December 22, 2022, to eliminate private land use restrictions that prohibit, restrict, or impair the ability of an Amateur Radio Operator from operating and installing amateur station antennas on property subject to the control of the Amateur Radio Operator.

The exponential growth of communities subject to private land use restrictions that prohibit both the operation of Amateur Radio and the installation of amateur station antennas has significantly restricted the growth of the Amateur Radio Service. These restrictions are pervasive in private common interest residential communities such as single-family subdivisions, condominiums, cooperatives, gated communities, master-planned communities, planned unit developments, and communities governed by community associations. The restrictions have particularly impacted the ability of Amateur Radio to fulfill its statutorily mandated duty of serving as a voluntary noncommercial emergency communications service.

Congress in 1996 directed the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to promulgate regulations (Public Law 104-104, title II, section 207, 110 Stat. 114; 47 U.S.C. 303 note) that have preempted all private land use restrictions applicable to exterior communications facilities that impair the ability of citizens to receive television broadcast signals, direct broadcast satellite services, or multichannel multipoint distribution services, or to transmit and receive wireless internet services. ARRL attempts to obtain similar relief for Amateur Radio were rejected by the FCC with a statement such relief would have to come from Congress.

ARRL Legislative Advocacy Committee Chairman John Robert Stratton, N5AUS, noted that Congress, in 1994 by Joint Resolution, S.J.Res.90/H.J.Res.199, declared that regulations at all levels of government should facilitate and encourage the effective operation of Amateur Radio from residences as a public benefit. He continued by stating that "H.R.9670, the *Amateur Radio Emergency Preparedness Act*, is intended to fulfill that mandate and preserve the ability of Amateur Radio Operators to continue to serve as a key component of American critical communications infrastructure."

ARRL President Rick Roderick, K5UR, and Mr. Stratton both extended on behalf of the ARRL, its Members, and the Amateur Radio community their thanks and appreciation for the leadership of Rep. Johnson in his tireless efforts to support and protect the rights of all Amateur Radio Operators.

- 4. I receive two Ham Radio magazines each month QST and CQ. I occasionally quote from articles that I find interesting in CQ. This month, I am going to list some excerpts from David Minter's, NA2AA, *Second Century* column on page 9 of the January QST:
 - "The bad news is that amateur radio is in a leadership crisis. Many of the leaders in ARRL positions and in other ham radio organizations, including clubs from small to large, are deciding, for whatever reason, that perhaps they've done it for too long and it is time for someone else to pick up the baton and run forward."
 - "Another aspect of volunteerism is getting people active on the air. I have seen a persistent and uniform complaint hanging out there in social media: "Why are only 160,000 hams ARRL members? Where are the other 600,000 licensees?" The truth of the matter is that they either aren't around any more, have left the hobby, never really were in the hobby, or simply aren't active. That's where every one of us can play a role."

• "If not me, then who? Ask yourself that question. Look around. Find your space. Bring your talents to life by sharing them with others. Local club? ARES group? Contest club? ARRL Field Organization? There are opportunities literally everywhere."

Your Club might be interested in the Linc Cundall Memorial CW & AM event!

It is almost time to fire up your pre - 1950 gear for the AWA Linc Cundall Memorial CW & AM Event. This event honors Linc Cundall - W1LC (SK) who co-founded the Antique Wireless Association back in 1952.

Op's can be found operating this event using both AM and CW on Wednesday January 25, 2023 @ 2300 GMT to Thursday January 26, 2023 @ 2300 GMT and Saturday January 28, 2023 @ 2300 GMT to Sunday January 29, 2023 @ 2300 GMT.

This event focuses on operating gear either home-brewed or manufactured prior to 1950. Bands of operation are 160, 80, 40 and 20 Meters. Contact the greatest number of stations using your pre 1950 gear. If you're not a CW op, have some fun by operating AM. When calling CQ, use "AWA AWA de "W1GIG" for example.

In scoring, both equipment and power multipliers are offered. Your biggest advantage is to use a receiver along with a low power transmitter that was manufactured prior to 1950. Home built gear is encouraged as long as the design was available prior to 1950.

If you do not have any gear prior to 1950, you can still operate and have fun but will have a reduced multiplier. Remember to still send in that log!

Lets make our event coordinator Steve - WA8UEG work real hard by sending in your log sheet. Please send it your log regardless of how many stations you work. Special thanks go to Steve for being the event coordinator for the Linc Cundall Memorial CW & AM event.
