Tornado safety rules...

The NEWS is sues a TORNADO WATCH to give you ad vance no tice that tor na does are pos- si ble in your area. This gives you time to make pre lim i nary plans for mov ing to a safe lo ca tion if a tor nado warn ing is is sued.

The TORNADO WARNING is an ur gent an nounce ment that a tor nado has been re ported or is im mi nent and warns you to take cover.

Move quickly; sec onds save lives.

In the home, the best ha ven from tor nado winds is a base ment be low ground level. If pos si ble, get un der a sturdy ta ble or work bench. Oth er wise, take cover in an in te rior closet, hall way, or bath room on the low est floor of the house.

Be sure to stay clear of any threat of fly ing glass and get to a place of safety be fore a tor nado strikes.

If you live in a mo bile home, be sure you have a plan of safe ac tion should the weather be come threat en ing. Mo bile homes pro vide no shel ter in a tor nado re gard less of how well tied, and should be aban doned for a storm shel ter.

If no shel ter is avail able, lie flat in a ditch or de pres sion in the ground.

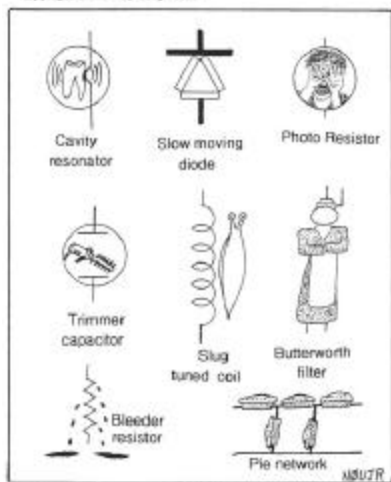

Are You Ready for a Tor nado?

Here's what you can do to pre pare for such an emergency.

- Pre pare a Home Tor nado Plan
Pick a place where fam ily mem bers could gather if a tor nado is headed your way. It could be your base ment or, if there is no base ment, a cen ter hall way, bath room, or closet on the low est floor. Keep this place un clut tered.
If you are in a high-rise build ing, you may not have enough time to go to the low est floor. Pick a place in a hall way in the cen ter of the build ing.
- As sem ble a Di sas ter Sup plies Kit
Con tain ing--
First aid kit and es sen tial med i ca tions.
Canned food and can opener.
At least three gal lons of wa ter per person.
Pro tec tive cloth ing, bed ding, or sleep ing bags.
Bat tery-po wered ra dio, flash light, and ex tra bat teries.
Spe cial items for in fant, el derly, or dis abled fam ily mem bers.
Writ ten in struc tions on how to turn off elec tric ity, gas, and wa ter if au thor i ties ad vise you to do so.
(Re mem ber, you'll need a pro fes sional to turn nat u ral gas ser vice back on.)
- Stay Tuned for Storm Warn ings
Lis ten to your lo cal ra dio and TV sta tions for up dated storm in for ma tion
- Know what a tor nado WATCH and WARNING means:
A tor nado WATCH means a tor nado is pos si ble in your area.
A tor nado WARNING means a tor nado has been sighted and may be headed for your area. Go to safety im me di ately.
Tor nado WATCHES and WARNINGS are is sued by county or par ish.

When a Tor nado WATCH Is Is sued...

- Listen to local radio and TV stations for further updates.
Be alert to changing weather conditions. Blowing debris or the sound of an approaching tornado may alert you. Many people say it sounds like a freight train.

When a Tor nado WARNING Is Is sued...

- If you are inside, go to the safe place you picked to protect yourself from glass and other flying objects.
The tornado may be approaching your area.
If you are outside, hurry to the basement of a nearby sturdy building or lie flat in a ditch or low-lying area.
If you are in a car or mobile home, get out immediately and head for safety (as above).

After the Tor nado Passes...

- Watch out for fallen power lines and stay out of the damaged area.
Listen to the radio for information and instructions.
Use a flashlight to inspect your home for damage.
Do not use candles at any time.

Cordless Phone Inventor Silent Key

Cordless phone inventor, N9LC, SK: George H. Sweigert, N9LC, of Fort Wayne, Indiana, died February 23. He was 79. First licensed as W8ZIS, Sweigert was a World War II veteran. Sweigert received a patent for the invention of the cordless telephone in 1969. He was employed at Magnavox Electronics, IIT Technical Institute and the Indiana Vocational Technical College. He was also active in Air Force MARS. His wife, Katherine "Kay" Sweigert, two daughters, and four sons are among his survivors.--Kay Sweigert

PICOSATELLITE PROJECT

Hank Heidt, N4AFL, reports that a one pound (4 inch x 3 inch x 1 inch) Amateur Radio Picosatellite is under construction by a team in the Washington DC area for Stanford University's OPAL launch in September 1999. Designers need to deliver the flight ready picosat by April 1 so they are under a very tight schedule, but hope to get every thing integrated and tested in time.

The picosatellite will be called "Stensat", and is intended for use by amateur radio operators world wide and will operate as a single channel Mode "J" FM voice repeater. The earth-to-space uplink frequency will be

145.840 MHz and the space-to-earth downlink will be 436.625 Mhz.

Stensat will periodically transmit 1200 baud AX.25 for broadcasting the following telemetry: temperature, bus current, bus voltage, receiver RSSI and 3 digital "0/1" sun sensors. Additionally, amateur radio operators will be able to "PING" the satellite causing the satellite to broadcast a telemetry packet by transmitting a six digit DTMF command to the receiver uplink.

2nd ANNUAL CQ VHF NATIONAL FOXHUNTING WEEKEND

CQ VHF magazine has announced the second annual National Foxhunting Weekend, April 17-18. The magazine is encouraging radio clubs and other groups to conduct "foxhunts" during that weekend--or another convenient weekend in April--and to report their results.

"There are no mandatory time periods, no universal rules and no log sheets," writes event coordinator and foxhunting veteran Joe Moell, K0OV in the April issue of CQ VHF. "It's just a weekend to set aside for your club, school or Scout group to try this exciting aspect of ham radio." Moell points out that foxhunters don't even have to have a ham ticket "since they will be receiving, not transmitting."

Foxhunting may be done by car or on foot, and the magazine is encouraging ham groups to use either one or both during the National Foxhunting Weekend. "Foxhunting is certainly fun and a competitive challenge," says CQ VHF Editor Rich Moseson, W2VU, "but it also teaches important direction-finding skills that may be called upon in searching for a downed airplane or lost hiker using an Emergency Locator Transmitter, or for tracking down sources of interference."
