# **Transatlantic Amateur Digital Voice Transmission**

Sevierville, Tennessee-- Two radio communications pioneers recently achieved a major breakthrough: the first two-way digital voice transmission across the Atlantic via Amateur Radio. Doug Smith, KF6DX, and Didier Chulot, F5MJN, successfully transmitted and received HF digital speech signals on Friday, November 22, 2002 between here and Paris, France.

The feat was accomplished using Ten-Tec transceivers and digital audio systems from Thales Communications (pronounced "tall'-ess") in Paris. Operating station F8KGG, Chulot spoke with Smith for several minutes using the high-frequency digital link, operating within a 3-kHz bandwidth. The contact occurred on 21,218 kHz. Signal strengths were S-5 to S-7 and readability was 5 in both directions. A mean opinion score (MOS) of 3.5 of a possible 5 for audio quality was recorded by KF6DX in the QPSK mode, which runs at 1200 bits/sec. An MOS of 3 is generally defined as "toll-quality," or roughly the same as what a telephone produces.

Signals were also exchanged in 16-QAM mode at 2400 bits/sec. The two stations demonstrated the advantages of digital audio during the conversation, including noise-free, FM-like reception and the potential for simultaneous voice and data.

The Ten-Tec/Thales system is based on a new international broadcasting standard adopted last year by the ITU, an arm of the United Nations. Digital broadcast signals occupy up to 10 kHz of bandwidth. The FCC has approved a similar standard for AM broadcasting in the U.S. The Amateur Radio version is expected to appear on the market early next year.

"We view this as a significant accomplishment," said Smith. "Amateur Radio has long been at the forefront of technological development. It's nice to be able to show that our legacy is alive and well." Tests are being conducted under the auspices of ARRL's Digital Voice Working Group, of which Smith is Chair. A written report on the tests is due in January, 2003.


## Cybikos in APRS

OK, here we are to present how this little thing can improve mobile and emergency APRS.

Now, every time someone sees this in my hand I get a question like "What is it?" But please understand that it is relatively hard to explain to other students about why our PARC group is working with Cybikos in just a few words.




Cybiko PDA test setup for APRS

Originally Cybikos were designed for teenagers to play small games, chat, input small amounts of data, and mainly, for teens to get the feel of slick, adult PDA technology. The gadget became somewhat popular, but the company did not succeed as well as PALM did because price and market issues. The creators did not intend Cybikos to be anything else but a toy. However many developers used the free software development kit (SDK) tools as did amateur developers (like Alex KR1ST) and wrote a lot of useful software for it. Alex KR1ST had an idea about using these units in amateur radio, which was seen on the web and gave rise to the projects at PARC.

There are two kinds of Cybikos available in stores: Cybiko Classic and Cybiko Xtreme. Both of them come in with a  $160 \times 100$  B&W screen, 500kb virtual hard drive, and a built-in spread spectrum 900MHz wireless LAN interface. The low power wireless LAN allows you to communicate instantly with one friend or hundreds of others with Cybikos, within a radius of  $150 \times 300$  feet. More about that later.

You may ask "This is all wonderful, but how is that going to help us? Why is it better than present-day APRS setup?" In our project we decided to make APRS mobile, so instead of using a big, bulky and cheap computer (or expensive and small computer) we use just one (cheap) Cybiko with UI Messenger software which has many of the functions that are found in UI View or WinAPRS such as map display, tracking, logging, and unit to unit messaging.

# Cybiko PDA setup for APRS from PARC & W4CHL QTH




The basic configuration to use without exploiting the Cybiko wireless LAN requires a TNC in KISS mode and a HT. We connect one Cybiko Classic model to the TNC through a serial port. Thus we get a working, small, mobile APRS station.

The unique aspect of using Cybikos is to setup UI Messenger using the wireless LAN and run a simple program, the UI Gate on the Cybiko connected to the TNC. One UI Gate allows more than 90 other amateurs who have Cybikos to send/receive traffic through the wireless network within range (150 feet) and out over the ham band.

Now you can clearly see that you don't need a bulky, heavy PC and all in your pocket. Instead enjoy the PALM sized Cybikos! If you have any questions, please feel free to contact us: PARC at rtpnet.org. Or follow our progress from rtpnet.org/parc.

# H. Taylor Howard, W6HD, SK

Home satellite TV pioneer Henry Taylor Howard, age 70, died in a plane crash Nov 13<sup>th</sup> near his home in California. Howard, using homebrewed gear in 1976, was instrumental in pioneering reception of C-band satellite television transmissions intended for cable subscribers, and was the founder of Chaparral Communications.

Howard also worked on the Apollo space program and won a NASA "Medal for Exceptional Scientific Achievement" in 1973. Howard led the radio team for the Galileo mission to Jupiter. Within the ham community, Howard was an avid moon bounce enthusiast.

It is both inspiring and astounding to note just how many contributions to science and society have been made by people who also choose to be hams. Condolences to family and friends.

## **ARRL VEC examination fee to rise**

(Nov 14, 2002) -- Starting January 1, the fee charged all applicants at ARRL VEC-coordinated Amateur Radio test sessions will increase from \$10 to \$12 for the year 2003. This fee is charged to anyone applying for a new amateur license or upgrading their operating privileges. Applicants failing an exam element at ARRL sessions where examiners permit retesting on the same exam element also must submit a retest fee of \$12. Additionally, the maximum reimbursement ARRL VEC allows ARRL volunteer examiner (VE) teams to retain to directly offset their prudently incurred out-of-pocket expenses will increase from \$4 to \$6 in 2003 (this fee has remained at \$4 per person served since 1991).

"While the number of examinees has remained relatively unchanged in the past 24 months, our cost of doing business--and the expenses incurred by ARRL VEs--continues to rise," said ARRL VEC Manager Bart Jahnke, W9JJ. "An adjustment was needed in the 2003 test fee if we intended to maintain the same level of service that our VEs and VE teams have come to expect."

Jahnke said that adjusting the reimbursement level for ARRL VEs who retain a portion of the fees to offset their out-of-pocket, exam-related expenses was also past due. For more information, contact ARRL VEC
