The United Way Building is about one mile South West from the San Jose Air Port. From 1-880: take the Alameda turn-off going South for ½ block then turn left on McKendrie, From the South: go North on the Alameda, ½ block past Hedding turn right on McKendrie.

As soon as you turn onto McKendrie (heading East), turn right into the parking lot just behind the small church on the corner. It's best to park at the far end of the parking lot. The entrance is up the steps at the South East corner of the building. There is wheelchair access at another door at the North East corner, but for security reasons, only one door is open at a time-someone will have to notify the guard if you need wheelchair access. Also, try not to be too late-the doors may be closed with nobody around to let you in.

The San Jose Red Cross is located at the East end of McKendrie, across the I-880 freeway (South) from the San Jose Air Port. From I-880, take the Colman turn-off, head South, turn left (East) at the first road—that's McKendrie. From the South, go North on Colman, just past Heading turn right (East) on McKendrie.

The consolidation of SCCARA accounts is near complete. All accounts are situated at Bank of the West. We have a main checking plus linked savings plus a repeater checking plus linked savings. The final step is to start a rolling CD account to invest for the longer term. These moves will make life much easier for the SCCARA Treasurers.

Well that's it for our finances. This month I'll tell you about the computerization of the Treasurers work. Last fall, Stan WA6VJY (our 1992 Treasurer) started migrating our accounting to a program called Quicken which runs on a PC. Data has been entered starting with June of 1991. It is a real chore getting an account set up but once operational, it makes reconciling, report generation, data entry etc. a breeze.

The Treasurer also handles the master data base for club members. This data base is where the member roster resides plus copies are used for printing newsletter labels etc. The program used here is PFS First Choice and has been operational for several years. It allows the retrieval of member data in all kinds of formats such as the percentage of Extra class, number of ARRL members and the like. There are more sophisticated programs around but First Choice is hard to beat when talking about ease of operation.

Meeting Minutes

Santa Clara County Amateur Radio Association General Membership Meeting, June 14, 1993

At 7:37 P.M., Don, KC6WMM, President, called the meeting to order. Self introductions followed as is the custom.

The guest speaker was Nick Marshall, W6OLO, who discussed the "Project Moonray." Nick talked about its history, goal and what its status is now. "Project Moonray" is a project to put a Plutonium 238 powered repeater on the moon for amateur radio communication. It was originally scheduled to be put on the moon by one of the Apollo program during either Apollo 18, 19, or 20 flights. Due to congressional cut backs, it was never launched. According to Nick, there is still hope of having it placed on the Moon. SCCARA would like to thank Nick for his fascinating presentation.

Brad Wyatt, K6WR, Vice Director - Pacific Division, ARRL, spoke about some of the current legislation and resolutions before Congress. One resolution refers to Part 97. It states that local governments must make accommodations to amateur radio. This refers to several issues including antenna ordinances. With respect to legislation, Sen. Inouye introduced amendments to SB335, the Spectrum Auction Bill, to protect amateur radio frequencies if the radio frequency auction ever happens.

ARRL has a toll free number to call and they will send an information packet about becoming an amateur radio operator. Brad pointed out several times that this number can only be used for the above purpose and no other. The number is 1-800-NEW-HAM.

Brad also announced that he is a candidate for the position of Director and gave a little campaign speech.

Lee Maxwell, W6CF, a candidate for Vice Director, the position currently held by Brad Wyatt, also gave a campaign speech.

Bill, N6ZPC, has a Kenwood R5000 receiver for sale. It belonged to his father who passed away recently.

Don, KC6WMM, announced that SCCARA could host Pacificon in 1994 if we act within the next few weeks. Don asked if anyone would be interested in being on the organization committee. If so, please contact Don. Don also mentioned that this will require a lot of work and if you're not willing to work, please do not apply.

Doug, WN6U, announced that field day is one weekend away, June 26 and 27. This year we will be a 3A Battery QRP station. There will be several different modes of operation. These include digital, VHF, voice, and CW.

The Field Day Committee will meet Monday June 21, at 7:30 P.M. at the San Jose Red Cross. All are invited to attend.

Gary, WB6YRU, noted that Alonzo Dallas agreed to loan us a solar panel for Field Day.

The CW class will be taught by Doug, WN6U. The class will be held at the Santa Clara City Adult Education Center on Benson St. in Santa Clara. The new class will start September 2, 1993 and will be held on Thursdays at 7:00 P.M. For more information call 408-377-3736.

Doug, WN6U, will hold a PACTOR, AMTOR demonstration at 7:30 P.M. in the Red Cross radio room on Wednesday June 16.

Gary, WB6YRU, gave the Flea Market Report. We made \$276 at the Foothill Flea Market.

Mike, KC6LCJ, stated that he would like to start another theory class and he would like to get the dates members joined SCCARA.

SCCARA will again (tentatively) hold its Christmas dinner meeting at Renzo's on Friday Dec. 17th.

Doc W6ZRJ offered to sell his Yaesu FT-726R to the club for \$750. The board will hold a quick meeting just before the general July meeting to consider it. If approved, the offer will be presented to the membership later that evening.

The flea market effort has been suffering from lack of interest/participation. As is now, we are facing the possibility of actually losing money, mostly because of the locker expenses. If there isn't more participation at the next flea market, the board will reconsider this activity.

Flea Market

I'm happy to report that, thanks to my brother, Curtis, for loaning me his full-size pickup, SCCARA's repeater fund is \$276.50 richer. If you will recall, last time we only made \$61, (that's one Honda Civic's worth, packed to the gills). That extra carrying capacity really made the difference. Unfortunately, this truck borrowing business is only a once in a while thing. SCCARA really needs its members to help out here.

There are two main issues at stake: First, this is a significant money-making activity for the club--but only with sufficient participation. We have to pay for the storage locker out of the proceeds as well as the flea market expenses. So, just to break even, we must make at least \$105 (average) each time. And second, it doesn't look good for the club to have just one guy out there with a hand-full of stuff.

If this poor participation continues, the board will have no choice but to seriously consider ending the SCCARA booth at the flea market.

With just very few people, this can be a significant source of revenue for the club. Otherwise, we can actually end up *losing* money.

We need help with transporting stuff and selling. We (I) will load up from the locker around 6 PM Friday, July 9th, then show up at the flea market early the next morning. I try to be there around 5 AM, but that's not necessary for everyone. (The selling goes pretty fast between 5 and 8 or 9, then slows down.) Around 12 or so, we pack up the left-overs and bring them back to the locker. If you can help out, it would be much appreciated.

W6UW and the American Red Cross

I first joined SCCARA at the August meeting in 1946. I was 18 years old and just out of High School. At the time the club was meeting in a room in the San Jose Civic Auditorium. Irv Rasmusssen, W6YPM (formerly W9FAV) was President.

I had no license, but the club had a class at Hester Grammar School where I had gone for my first six grades of school in San Jose. The class was held in an upstairs area used by San Jose Technical High School for their radio program. Bud Jacklin, W6IXJ, was the instructor for the SCCARA class as well as the radio instructor for Tech High.

In April 1947 I passed the Class B exam and received the call W6ZRJ. I was very active with SCCARA taking part in all the radio club activities. There were alternate business meetings and dinner meetings (at Vahl's in Alviso) each month.

Before WWII, the club had acquired equipment for a ham station from the estate of W6HM, an early active member of the club. Plans were to have a club station in the tower of the new Civic Auditorium on San Carlos Street. These plans were interrupted by World War II when all hams were forced off the air. When the club was re-established after the war, it had been hoped that this project could be completed, but for a number of reasons, it never was.

During the war, the club also lost its original club call, W6SV, because of non-renewal. After the War, the call was replaced by the call, W6UW. Many of us wanted to establish a club station but could not find a place. At the time I was a student at San Jose State, and one day in 1948 after attending a class at school, I took the "bull by the horns." I picked up Joe Oliver, W6YQN, a friend and active member of the club and we went unannounced to the San Jose Red Cross Chapter

House at 440 North First Street. We asked to see who ever was in charge and were taken in and introduced to Andy Anderson. Andy was the Manager of the Red Cross at the time. We told him we were radio amateurs and wanted to help out at the Red Cross in radio communications and that our radio club wanted a place to set up our club ham radio station. We would provide emergency communications for the Red Cross in times of disaster in return for the space for a station.

Andy was delighted with the offer and took us down to a room in the basement which he said he thought would make a very good place for a ham station. We told Andy that we would report to the club at the next meeting to see if the members would be interested in taking part.

We made our report at the next meeting and everyone was delighted with the offer. The club voted to set up the station, hopefully with donated equipment.

Paul Tibbs, W6WGO, who was an active member of SCCARA as well as member of Mission Trail Net, volunteered to help set up the station and Frank Quement, W6NX and others offered to donate equipment. Paul and I worked on Mission Trail Net together so we were experienced in traffic handling which would be needed for emergency work.

During the next year we established the station and in the 1950's took an active part with W6CXO at the San Francisco Red Cross, as well as the station at the Oakland Red Cross, in many drills and exercises as well as the annual ARRL SET. Paul became the CHOP and I was traffic liaison since I also worked the CW nets. I became an active operator of the National Traffic System when it was organized by ARRL in 1949. At the time NTS operation was only on CW. We also set up the station in a booth at the Santa Clara County Fair for a number of years where Paul and I operated that station on traffic nets as a public demonstration.

As active members of SCCARA know, the club is still being operated at the present Red Cross Chapter House on McKendrie Street. Harry Engwicht, W6HC, was the trustee of W6UW for many years. Harry was the first President of SCCARA.

Field Day Fun

At the Field Day Phone Station... Many thanks to all who operated during Field Day. We had a good mix of operators including some first timers. I would like to particularly thank our wee hour operators. First there was Ken KD6ABI plus Marti KD6FTJ that operated from 11PM till 1AM and then Wally KA6YMD plus Barbara KD6QEI from 1AM till 3AM. Gary WB6YRU plus Imre KD6MZM finished off the shift. I certainly hope that my snoring did not bother anyone.

The 10 meter band was puny this time but the others (particularly 15 and 40) more than made up for it. We also had good Sunday morning contacts. Running QRP did not seem to particularly cramp our style. Perhaps the tribander and long wire antennas were doing their work.

We made 302 contacts in all. Not bad for a QRP station. Our points are all X5 so we're really talking 1500 or so. Gary's (WB6YRU) computer logging program seemed to hold up quite nicely. That was helped by minimal generator down time.

I really did not spend much time in the VHF/Satellite area but this was certainly a lot of interest there. The CW station also was going great guns. Several very competent people did their best. This is a valuable point getter (they get X10 on their points). Lets get some more CW operators out there next year.

Lastly, many thanks to Doug WN6U for chairing the event this year. He did a great job.

We were running only 5 Watts at each station, yet we made plenty of contacts. There toward the end, the phone station seemed to reach the East Coast about as well as everyone else.

The VHF station (two meters) only made about two dozen contacts, but there weren't too many out there to begin with. It seems we did about as well as everyone else on the band. This station was running on solar power thanks to Alonzo Dallas who was good enough to loan us a rather large solar panel and battery.

Barbara KD6QEI, our capable food person this year, made good on her pledge to bring enough of her CDF chili. We all had plenty. I heard one person comment on how much chili we were eating, how cramped the quarters were at the phone station, and how many people would be packed in there... but that problem never materialize. I think Barbara deserves an extra measure of gratitude for that! Not only was her chili good, but it STAYED good.

There was an unusual lack of activity at the phone station after the contest this year. In the past, we had a difficult time pulling up the ground rod, but not this year. Instead, we used a multi-band ground radial set-up. It seemed to do the trick--there were no problems loading up the long wire on all HF bands and the tri-band beam worked just fine without the tuner.

Late Saturday night, Imre KD6MZM, went on a hike with is hand-held, lap-top computer, and TNC. He became a walking (mobile) packet station for a while! He claims to have found a pretty good spot for VHF work too. Maybe our VHF station would have fared better over there.

There was a friendly competition going on between the CW and Phone stations. They were neck-and-neck right up to the end. But when the dust settled, it was the phone station by a nose! Both stations made roughly 300 contacts each. No doubt, there will be a rematch next year... and the phone people will be ready! (Yea team.)

It's time to write those letters again!! On May 20, 1993, the U.S. House of Representatives joined the Senate with the introduction of a resolution supporting Amateur Radio. The language of H.J. Res 199 and S. J. 90 is identical. They discuss the role of Amateur Radio in emergencies. They tell how Amateurs work as technical innovators, who push back the technical frontiers, who discover much about radio propagation, and who develop practical and affordable alternatives to complicated expensive new equipment from our laboratories.

Mail from home is important to Senators and Representatives. It lets them know what is on the minds of their constituents. There are a large number of these resolutions that members of Congress are asked approve like *National Pickle Week*. Good letters from constituents in support of S. J. 90 and H.J 199 can ease any potential stigma about the resolutions. The letters you write need not be long. The reasons to support the resolutions are contained in the bills themselves, but if you can add a personal emergency service episode or a technical contribution of the writer, it would really help to influence the Congressman and the Senators.

Your Senators and Representatives are listed in the U.S. Government section of the telephone book They are published regularly in most newspapers. If you are not sure which of several Representatives is yours, just call any of them armed with your Zip Code. They will be able to tell you the name of your Representative.

Now is the time to write your letters for support of S. J. Res. 90 and H. J. Res. 199. Last year many of you wrote letters in support of H. R. 73 and S. 1372. Your help is needed again. As in the past, please send copies of your letters to Perry Williams at ARRL Headquarters. When Perry gets a sufficient number of letters from constituents, he has a reason to contact the office of the Senator or Representative and make a visit. Please write. These resolutions are good for Amateur Radio.

Club Callsigns • • More. FCC has announced that the Club and Military Recreation Call Sign administrator program will take effect on July 19, 1993. The window for organizations to apply to be a call sign administrator will open July 26, 1993. Any applications received prior to July 26 will be returned without action.

Pacificon '93 is coming. The dates are Oct. 22-24, 1993 at the Concord Hilton in Concord, CA. The committee is working hard to put together another great event. Remember how great Pacificon '92 was? Pacificon '93 will be even better. The price is still \$3 in advance and \$5 at the door. Jon Bloom, KE3Z, will present a workshop on digital signal processing. Jon is one of the ARRL Lab Engineers.
