Board Meeting, Oct. 18, 2004

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President Barbara Britten, KD6QEI, called the meeting to order at 19:43:10. A quorum was present.

Attendees: Barbara Britten, KD6QEI, President; Clark Murphy, KE6KXO, Director; Don Apte, KK6MX, Director; Don Village, K6PBQ, Station Trustee and Director; Lou Steirer, WA6QYS, Director; Wally Britten, KA6YMD, Director; Gary Mitchell, WB6YRU, Editor; David Paul, AE6MV, Secretary; Gwen Steirer, KF60TD, XYL

President Barbara Britten, QEI, welcomed everyone to the meeting. She said that Lloyd would not be present, but left checks with her to pay the bills,

- the storage is paid through December,
- she will call Kaiser and reserve the meeting room for 2005,
- the SVECS Breakfast Meeting is coming up,
- the Sweepstakes contest will be 11/20 for Phone, and 11/6-7 for Code,
- an Antenna party will be held again 10/30 or 10/31.

Gary Mitchell commented, with regard to the recent general meeting, that it is hard to eat pizza and host a radio clinic at the same time.

Don Village reported that the radio at the discovery museum was grounding out, and the situation is now corrected the (newer) rotating camera system was contacting the antenna.

Lou Steirer reported, regarding the roof of Red Cross, that the vertical has six guys, but is ten feet high, that we need more UV-stable polystyrene rope, about 75 feet, and that the coax isn't long enough perhaps it was cut to length?

Clark suggested more rope might be needed, for the dipole. He has fond the replacement dipole at HRO for \$24; Clark recommends SS eye-bolts, so they won't rust.

Wally Britten moved, and Don Village seconded a motion that \$50 be authorized to pay for the needed rope and balun.

Wally YMD reported no change to the repeater. It cuts off the first syllable the short ID but transmits its entire long ID, Ben Vickers suggested a simple solution of adding a couple of spaces before the ID.

Newsletter Editor Gary Mitchell reported that the recent newsletter omitted some information, but he mailed a supplement.

BBS chairman Gary Mitchell reported that the BBS is now answering its phone (its control line). He thinks it may have just missed hanging up a call. Another BBS, Los Gatos N6LDL, will shut down. So a single LAN will remain in the Bay Area, centered in Albany. It has only a few remaining users.

Old Business

The Pizza for the last meeting cost \$74.61, and we collected \$51, so the Steirers need a payment of the difference, \$23.61.

Gary Mitchell suggested that in addition to the Letter to New Hams, we need to send a package to new members. Lou suggested that it contain a history of the Club. Others suggested that it contain repeater information, repeater codes, BBS information, times and dates of the nets, and a Welcome to the Club letter from either the President or Secretary. It was suggested that Doc Gmelin knew the club history best.

Clark Murphy reported that the trailer is stored in a fenced area at Irwin Electrical, thanks to John Irwin. The combination for the gate, and home phone and cell phone of John Irwin are <omitted>.

Lou Steirer asked about the plan to connect Echolink to the 70cm machine? Don Apte is trying to find the time, but needs Xtals. Don as programmable Commercial radios, Moto HT 600's, but needs programming cables. It was suggested that Trish might know.

Lou added that Gwen has been asking to see the year-to-year treasury numbers; Barbara added that Lloyd is working on that right now.

Lou inquired regarding Jeannie's work on a new club QSL Card design; Barbara replied that she has been busy, but is working on it.

Lou noted that evidently no new licenses were received, so none of the Letter to New Hams were mailed.

Gary Mitchell asked that the Secretary send a new Club Roster by email.

New Business

Clark noted an urgent item of new business heavy rains are forecast and the antenna trailer has yet to be covered with its tarp.

Don Village reported that a friend wants to buy a second radio as a backup. Don also noted that the club holds eight HF radios: the station 757, the new radio, two 520's, one Kenwood TS440, an ICOM 736, 735 and 745, plus the Collins. Don volunteered to take them home one at a time and check them out, then report next month. The Club could then have the information needed to decide which to keep and which to sell. Don Apte added that we might be guessing high on what they are worth, since a 703 is only \$399; a multi-band multi-mode radio was seen at Pacificon early in the morning for only \$150. Don Village suggested that we keep only the 12V equipment that can be run from battery so we don't need a big generator for Field Day. Clark suggested that we sell the oldest rigs first, as they will just continue to drop in value as newer rigs come to market. Don Apte recommended that we purchase filters for the 736 while we still can. Don will try to get all the radios checked by the next

meeting.

No further business was brought up.

Don Apte moved that the meeting be adjourned, and Barbara agreed. The meeting was adjourned; the Secretary failed to note the time.

From The ARRL Letter, October 15, 2004

FCC ADOPTS NEW BPL RULES, ACKNOWLEDGES ITS INTERFERENCE POTENTIAL

As expected, the FCC this week adopted revised Part 15 (unlicensed services) rules to specifically regulate broadband over power line (BPL) systems. Meeting October 14 in open session, the Commission adopted a Report and Order in ET Docket 04-37. In comments before voting, three members of the Commission, including Chairman Michael Powell, specifically cited the concerns of Amateur Radio operators and expressed either assurances or hope that the new BPL rules will adequately address interference to licensed services. Republican

FCC Commissioner Kevin Martin mentioned Amateur Radio's and broadcasters' interference concerns in a written statement. ARRL President Jim Haynie, W5JBP, said he was encouraged to see the Commission acknowledge interference to amateurs as a genuine issue in the proceeding.

"What the League has done in the last year and a half on this issue showed in the Commission's public meeting today," Haynie said Thursday. He cited the FCC's approval of three major points that the League had been pushing for: Certification of BPL equipment instead of verification, a requirement for a public BPL database--something the BPL industry did not want--and mechanisms to deal swiftly with interference complaints. Haynie conceded, however, that the devil is in the details of the R&O, which likely will not be made public for at least a few weeks.

Anh Wride of the FCC Office of Engineering and Technology (OET), acknowledged that Access BPL devices "pose a somewhat higher potential for interference to licensed radio services than typical Part 15 devices." But, Wride continued, "we believe the specific benefits of BPL warrant acceptance of a small degree of additional risk, and that this interference potential can be satisfactorily managed."

Commissioner Michael Copps, a Democrat, said he remains concerned about interference to Amateur Radio users. "I take the concerns of this community very seriously and believe that the FCC has an obligation to work hard to monitor, investigate and take quick action, where appropriate, to resolve harmful interference."

Copps said if interference occurs, "we must have a system in place to resolve it immediately," and he expressed the hope that the new rules would include such "rapid turnaround" provisions. Copps, who dissented in part with the R&O, raised the question of whether utility ratepayers should have to "subsidize an electric power company's foray into broadband."

The Commission's other Democrat, Jonathan Adelstein, said the interference question made the proceeding a challenging one because it had to accommodate concerns raised by Public Safety licensees, federal government users and Amateur Radio operators. "These are important services that we need to protect from harmful interference," Adelstein said.

Adelstein also said that while it's clear that some BPL systems can co-exist with existing licensees, others "haven't fared so well." He said those systems shouldn't be deployed commercially until it's assured that they won't cause harmful interference.

Commissioner Kathleen Abernathy, a Republican, said the FCC had to "make some hard compromises" to deal with questions about interference. But she expressed confidence in "technical solutions."

Chairman Powell called it "a banner day" for communications in the US because, he said, BPL promises "ubiquitous service to all Americans at affordable rates." The chairman, a Republican, conceded that BPL will affect some spectrum users--including "all those wonderful Amateur Radio operators out there." Powell said the FCC has taken Amateur Radio interference concerns seriously from the start and has put protections in place "to allow that service to continue." At the same time, Powell implied that the FCC must balance the benefits of BPL against the relative value of other licensed services.

Powell said BPL's potential for the US economy "is too great, too enormous, too potentially groundbreaking to sit idly by and

allow any claim or any possible speculative fear" keep the Commission from promoting adoption of BPL technology.

ARRL CEO David Sumner, K1ZZ, suggested that Powell was overstating the necessity of yet another broadband pipeline. "It's astonishing to me that the chairman of the FCC can talk about needing a 'third way' to provide broadband to consumers when multiple technologies already are available, including wireless broadband," he said.

The United Power Line Council (UPLC) applauded the FCC's action, saying the new rules should encourage BPL deployment while protecting licensed services from harmful interference. "We didn't get everything we wanted," said UPLC President and CEO William R. Moroney, who called the R&O "the result of close cooperation and compromise" with the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) to address its concerns about potential interference.

DRAFT BANDWIDTH PETITION, BPL FOCUS OF ARRL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

Meeting October 16 in Dallas, Texas, the ARRL Executive Committee (EC) devoted much of its fall session to a discussion of comments received on ARRL's draft FCC petition seeking regulation of subbands by bandwidth rather than by emission mode. The EC also authorized the filing of a Petition for Reconsideration in response to the BPL Report and Order (R&O) in ET Docket 04-37, which the FCC adopted October 14. Drafting and filing the petition must await release of the actual R&O, which should happen in a few weeks. Responding to a synopsis of the bandwidth petition and proposed rule changes posted on the ARRL Web site, several hundred League members and others in the ham radio community offered comments and suggestions.

"The Executive Committee found considerable support for the concept of the petition," said ARRL CEO David Sumner, K1ZZ, "along with constructive suggestions to reduce both the impact of the changes on current amateur operations, as well as possible unintended consequences." Sumner's "It Seems to Us . . ." editorial, "Regulation by Bandwidth," in September QST addressed the bandwidth petition.

Earlier this year, the EC decided to make a synopsis and explanation of the petition available to ARRL members before filing it with the FCC. At this month's meeting, the EC agreed to submit several recommended amendments to the proposed rules changes to the ARRL Board of Directors for its consideration in January. These include:

• Retention of rules permitting automatically controlled digital stations (packet and other digital modes) in narrow HF subbands. The draft petition had proposed dropping these provisions.

• A rule prohibiting so-called semi-automatic digital operation (automatic control in response to a communication initiated by a live operator) on frequencies below 28 MHz where phone is permitted. This addressed a concern that "robot" digital stations might take over the phone bands.

• A segment for 3 kHz bandwidth (no phone) emissions at 10.135-10.150 MHz to accommodate existing and planned digital operations.

• Deletion of the word "continuous" from the description of test transmissions authorized on most frequencies above 51 MHz.

• Simplification of proposed changes to ?97.309 to clarify that FCC-licensed amateur stations may use any published digital code as long as other rules are observed.

"These recommendations are not intended to be the final word on the draft petition, but are intended to address the major issues raised to date," Sumner emphasized.

The draft bandwidth proposals take into account the ARRL's prior "Novice refarming" petition to expand some HF phone bands, included in the "omnibus" FCC Notice of Proposed Rule Making in WT Docket 04-140.

The EC also authorized ARRL General Counsel Chris Imlay, W3KD, to "prepare to pursue other available remedies as to procedural and substantive defects" in the BPL proceeding.
