Calculating Distance and Bearings

A few years ago (before I joined OCARS) I worked with a group that was preparing for Field Day, and while determining where to place one of the antennas, I suggested a place only to hear "that's more than 500 feet". Turns out, the suggested site was within the 500 feet circle, but ever since then, I have been looking for various computer tools that can be used and which would remove any question.

www.GeoLifeLine.com has a number of tools at their website including a distance and bearing projector. All you need to do is to enter the GPS Coordinates, for most of us that would be W42 degrees and the number of minutes rounded to three decimals places, and W083 and minutes. The enter a bearing – zero for true north, 90 for true east etc. to a maximum of 359 degrees, and the distance in miles, yards, feet, kilometers or meters. The website will then determine the coordinates for you.

The Coordinate Tools has a dropdown select for Distance Calculator where both the starting and ending coordinates are entered, and the website determines the distance and bearing part.

Some of the practical uses for this service besides the Field Day 500 foot circle, include determining the range of a repeater signal. For EMCOMM purposes, if a half marathon utilizes ham radio operators at different waypoints, it might be helpful in selecting an antenna site for net control. A half marathon is 13 miles in length and covers an area no larger than about 3 by 4 miles. If NCS is located in the exact center, the far points should be no more than 2 to 3 miles away. If there is available land at the exact center, it may be interesting and useful to know the distances of each operator from NCS. Alternatively, if there is no available land at the exact center, the potential for larger variances in distances becomes apparent. This may be particularly useful if there are hills or tall buildings in the area.

Ham radio operators who are actively engaged in contesting may also be interested in measuring and evaluating antenna performance. Or if you have a tower and a directional antenna, you could determine the direction to point your antenna.

In closing, I have tried other sites, but to date, I believe this has been the easiest to use.


