Minutes of the November 27, 2013 regular meeting of the Central Illinois Radio Club (CIRC)

The regularly scheduled meeting of CIRC was called to order by President, Grant Zehr (AA9LC) at 7:00 PM, November 27, 2013.

Hams present at the meeting then introduced themselves by name and call sign.

It was noted that the minutes of the regular October 2013 meeting had been published in the November Newsletter. On motion by Dennis Mills (KE9UA) and seconded by Tom Planer (KJ9P), the October 2013 regular meeting minutes were unanimously approved as amended.

Treasurer Norm Huber (N9ZKS) reported that the balance on hand was \$583.62 as of meeting date. On motion by Tom Planer, seconded by Ed Deutsch (KC9GF), the Treasurer's Report was unanimously approved.

Dennis Mills then reported on the results of the E-bay sale of certain equipment donated to the club. After E-bay, shipping and Pay-Pal fee, the net proceeds were \$506.39. Dennis will place some additional donated items for sale on E-bay. The remaining items will be made available at a local sale as determined by members.

Tom Planer then reviewed the clubs successful efforts in collecting local weather information during the 11/24/13 weather event and relaying it statewide to weather officials. He encouraged members to take additional training in preparation for future weather events.

Membership then approved the appointment of Tom Planer as chair of the Repeater Committee. Tom reported on negotiations with both Normal and Bloomington on potential sites to replace the current Corn Belt repeater site.

Grant Zehr then indicated that the equipment on loan from the State Farm (SFRARC) club has been inventoried and a list of items that are of continuing use to our club. The list has been sent to members via the W9AML reflector. On motion by Tom Planer, and seconded by Dennis Mills, members unanimously directed club officers to discuss a permanent loan agreement with SFRARC. Duane Benjamin and Gary Huber(AB9M) were requested to work on the wording of such an agreement.

Following a discussion of the club station, there was a consensus that the club should consider an open house to familiarize all members with the results of recent renovations and perhaps to establish a regular schedule of operation by members.

Grant Zehr indicated there has been no response from the Route 66 event committee. He will follow up again in the near future.

Ed Deutsch proposed the club again participate in the ISU Family Science Day next April 5th. There was a consensus that the club should plan to do so.

Grant Zehr indicated that Keith Hanson (AC9S) had been temporarily appointed to fill the vacant position of Director of the CIRC Board. On motion by Tom Planer, seconded by Dennis Mills, Keith Hanson was unanimously confirmed as a member of the CIRC Board of Directors.

Keith Hanson then reminded members that the December meeting would be a social dinner event held at Jims Steakhouse on December 4th at 6:00 PM. All members and spouses are invited.

Jim Baker (WB9EDL) advanced the proposal that our website include information on times, frequency and other data on several HF nets in the surrounding counties in

addition to our current local listing of nets. There was a consensus that this expanded information should be added to our newsletter and e-mail reflector.

A discussion of the site for the 2014 Field Day was held. Keith Hanson indicated he had already reserved the Old Town Township Hall, but that the site could be changed if desired. Rick Suhadolc (N9CKL) discussed the offer by the Water Reclamation District south of Bloomington to use their facilities. It was decided that members would arrange a visit to the Water Reclamation District early next year and report back to the Club.

On motion by Rick Kempf (WD9HRU), with second by Keith Hanson, the meeting was unanimously adjourned.

New Repeater and I-Gate

This from KG9DW, Michael.

I've yet to make it to a CIRC meeting, but I'm planning on making it next week!

The Heyworth 442.825+ 141.3PL repeater is now live and up on the Tate and Lyle grain elevator. The repeater antenna is at 250', with the repeater located in a pressurized room at the 189' level. The Village of Heyworth decided not to narrow-band its UHF equipment, so the repeater was donated to the volunteer fire department. The repeater is an older Kenwood unit and has been upgraded with a basic ICS controller and an rf pre-amplifier. The antenna is a commercial 8 bay DB420 with 9 dBd of gain. The repeater trustee is KG9DW, and the sponsoring organization is the Randolph Township Fire District.

I'm also working on an APRS I-gate and fill-in Digipeater thanks to a radio donation from Jay, NUOX. The system is built upon an Alinco 2m radio controlled by a kit-built TNC connected to a Raspberry Pi credit-card sized computer running linux. It's up and running on a home-brew j-pole antenna at my QTH east of Heyworth. If I'm able to coordinate internet access at the grain elevator, this system may move to the 250' level as well.

Since this subject kind of came up regarding one of the 4 <u>allstarlink.org</u> registration servers being down I thought it would be a good time to remind everyone that all of this technology we enjoy as Allstarlink node owners does not just happen without cost. As John pointed out in his previous email there are over 3000 Allstarlink nodes now registered.

This is certainly a milestone accomplishment and a testament to Jim's (WB6NIL) dedication to this project.

Once again I am re posting this email which is very similar to last year with the hopes that we as the amateur community can step forward and support our hobby, mainly the app_rpt and Allstarlink.org technology that we all enjoy today.

As many of you that are new to app_rpt you might NOT know. The creator of app_rpt and the Allstarlink network has never charged or asked for financial support to keep the system going for the use in amateur radio.

He has never charged users money to be a part of app_rpt or for use of the network, nor has he ever made any profit off of specific hardware sales for the Allstarlink network. Through the years he has put in a great deal of time and dedication along with his exceptional talents to make app_rpt and the Allstarlink network the great VOIP technology that it has become today. No other VOIP technology in the amateur radio community can even compare to the technology, features and capability that is offered for free to anyone wishing to setup a node.

Another understated fact is that there are monthly costs associated with keeping things running smoothly for the system. These costs are for server collocation, domain certifications and so on, amounting to roughly \$200 per month. Jim has been paying these monthly fees from donations, but mostly out of his own pocket. Wouldn't it be nice if we could all pitch in and help him to at the least cover these monthly costs for this coming year?

**** HAM RADIO AND THE NEW HANDS FREE LAW ****

This was suggested that you might want to copy this and put it in your car. Use your own judgment on that. Some police officers might not appreciate that...

(Note: underlined sections are per State of IL webpage - I highlighted section (d) and (d) (8) for your reference)

Section 5. The Illinois Vehicle Code is amended by changing

Section 12-610.2 as follows:

(625 ILCS 5/12-610.2)

Sec. 12-610.2. Electronic communication devices.

(a) As used in this Section:

"Electronic communication device" means an electronic device, including but not limited to a <u>hand-held</u> wireless telephone, <u>hand-held</u> personal digital assistant, or a portable or mobile computer but does not include a global positioning system or navigation system or a device that is physically or electronically integrated into the motor vehicle.

- (b) A person may not operate a motor vehicle on a roadway while using an electronic communication device.
- (c) A <u>second or subsequent violation</u> of this Section is an offense against traffic regulations governing the movement of vehicles. <u>A person who violates this Section shall be fined a maximum of \$75 for a first offense, \$100 for a second offense, \$125 for a third offense, and \$150 for a fourth or subsequent offense.</u>

(d) This Section does not apply to:

- (1) a law enforcement officer or operator of an emergency vehicle while performing his or her official duties;
- (2) a driver using an electronic communication device for the sole purpose of reporting an emergency situation and continued communication with emergency personnel during the emergency situation;
- (3) a driver using an electronic communication device in hands-free or voice-operated mode, which may include the use of a headset;
- (4) a driver of a commercial motor vehicle reading a message displayed on a permanently installed communication device designed for a commercial motor vehicle with a screen that does not exceed 10 inches tall by 10 inches wide in size:
- (5) a driver using an electronic communication device while parked on the shoulder of a roadway; or
- (6) a driver using an electronic communication device when the vehicle is stopped due to normal traffic being obstructed and the driver has the motor vehicle transmission in neutral or park;
- (7) a driver using two-way or citizens band radio services;
- (8) a driver using two-way mobile radio transmitters or receivers for licensees of the Federal Communications Commission in the amateur radio service:
- (9) <u>a driver using an electronic communication device by pressing a single button to initiate or terminate a voice communication;</u> or

(10) a driver using an electronic communication device capable of performing multiple functions, other than a hand-held wireless telephone or hand-held personal digital assistant (for example, a fleet management system, dispatching device, citizens band radio, or music player) for a purpose that is not otherwise prohibited by this Section.

American Red Cross CIRC Radio Room Management

Please read carefully. This will be brought up for discussion at the meeting so as to let us finalize this project.

A lot of work has gone into getting the Radio Room to the useable state it is now in.

There is a substantial amount of valuable equipment in this room which will be available to all qualified CIRC members.

Therefore, it stands to reason, the use of the room and its contents shall be managed, with the preservation of the effort made to build it and the preservation of the equipment located in it.

To do that, I am suggesting that the room access be limited.

The first order of business shall be the appointment of an Assistant Radio Room Manager.

The Radio Room Manager and the Assistant Radio Room Manager shall be available to provide scheduled access to the room and the contents.

The Radio Room Manager and the Assistant Radio Room Manager shall be the only two persons having the necessary key to provide scheduled access to the room and the contents.

Minimum requirements shall be necessary for use of the radio equipment and the test equipment.

In addition to scheduled access for radio use, a minimum of a General Class License shall be required. That shall include operation of HF, UHF, and VHF radios.

The use of the radios shall require demonstrated ability to use the radios. That shall include a required training period.

The first training held will be a "Training the Trainers" program. We have already had members step forward to first train the Radio Room Manager and the Assistant Radio Room Manager, who shall also then be available to train individual members in the use of the equipment.

Before the initial radio training starts a trainee shall demonstrate and be questioned on their knowledge base.

This does not mean that the radio access and training are now immediately available.

Procedure manuals shall be produced for all of the above and other issues involving use of test equipment, borrowing, responsibility and security of the building and it's contents.

A "Ham Fest" at Bloomington

BLOOMINGTON, Ill.: The following excerpt from a letter from the Secretary of the Central Illinois Radio Club tells of a "ham fest" to be held at about the time this magazine comes on the newsstands: "Our organization numbers around 40 members, all of which reside within a radius of 25 miles and all of which operate amateur short-wave stations. We will be organized two years on the date of this anniversary "ham fest," August 5th, and this is the first affair of this kind we have ever put on. While our "ham fest" is not being sponsored by the American Radio Relay League, they have heartily approved of it as a good method of establishing good fellowship among the amateurs in this vicinity.

"Without good radio magazines to guide their steps amateur radio enthusiasts would still be 'in the dark.' When you step into the operating room of any amateur, the first thing you notice is his equipment, and the second, his technical library. In the latter in most every case, you will see

copies of Radio News. We amateurs have appreciated all you have done for us. Since short-wave interest has replaced the broadcast-receiver interest of earlier days, it is to the amateurs, who carry on their experiments on these bands, that you must look forward to to buy and read Radio News. I speak from my own experience. I followed the trend to those fascinating high-frequency bands and am happy to say that Radio News was my guide." J. A. Umstattd, W9CFV, Secretary.

From Radio News September 1934

Here is the current DRAFT of the State Farm Equipment Loan Agreement Please read and bring any suggestions to the meeting.

This agreement is between the State Farm Retirees And Associates Radio Club (SFRAARC) of Bloomington, Illinois and the Central Illinois Radio Club (CIRC) of Bloomington, Illinois.

Whereas:

- The SFRAARC owns certain amateur radio equipment, as listed in Exhibit A to this agreement, that it does not currently use;
- That SFRAARC would like to have that unused equipment placed in service for the public good and enjoyment and in furtherance of the amateur radio hobby;

Further:

• The CIRC desires to use the radio equipment listed in Exhibit A to further its service to the public good and enjoyment and in furtherance of the amateur radio hobby.

Therefore:

- For the sum of one dollar and other good and valuable consideration to be paid by CIRC to SFRAARC, receipt of
 which is hereby acknowledged, SFRAARC hereby loans the equipment in Schedule A to CIRC for a period of
 time commencing with the signing of this Agreement and ending when either of the following conditions exist.
 - (1) SFRAARC determines all or part of the equipment in Schedule A is needed by SFRAARC for its own use, or
 - (2) CIRC determines that all or part of the equipment in Schedule A is no longer needed by CIRC for its own use.
- At such time, CIRC shall return all of, or individual specified items, on Schedule A to SFRAARC within a
 reasonable length of time and in the same condition as originally accepted, normal wear and tear excepted.
 Return of part of schedule A to SFRAARC shall end this agreement only with respect to returned items and
 Schedule A shall be amended accordingly.
- CIRC agrees to insure those items of equipment in Schedule A, for the perils common to an all risk Property or Inland Marine policy, during the time they are in CIRC's possession. Such insurance shall be for the benefit of both CIRC and SFRAARC.

This Agreement, executed in duplicate, is accepted by the following officers of the parties on the dates indicated.
