

Hello fellow members. In the last month we have had a successful field day. Even though there were two different groups at the camp, we were able to operate with no interference from the Shriners and we did not interfere with them. In fact we probably had the most CW contacts (41 on 40 meters) in recent years while the band was playing. This would not have happened if we had not made special arrangements with several operators to run CW while the band was playing inside the lodge. For all the antenna problems, one put together wrong initially, and one nonfunctional, we were successful. Our operation was able to make contacts on five bands (6, 15, 20, 40, and 80) and two modes for 812 points along with 750 bonus points for a total 1562 points. We had about 70 people participate over the course of the event including the setup day (Friday). I would like to thank Chet Smith for making this event possible and the San Diego Six Shooters for running the 6 Meter station. Well done to one and all.

PRESIDENT: Panger, KG6JCW reported on the recent field day operation. He thanked all of the participants as well as members of the Six Shooter club. Pat, WA6MHZ displayed two 1946 vintage 2-meter handhelds. Chet Smith, K6VM also addressed the group and expressed his appreciation for the club's attendance at field day. Chet also announced that Bill Snell, KB6EB is the liaison between the lodge and the club. For help or information, we would need to contact him. The ARCEC has been invited to have exclusive use of the campsite for the 2006 field day. The board of directors recommended that the club purchase an A4S Cushcraft antenna for about \$500. The club president will be authorized to obtain prices and report back to the club and then request authorization to purchase.

<u>Cal, KG6FBV</u>, offered the program. His topic was about two specialty antennae that he built from the ARRL Handbook.

After the break, the business portion of the meeting continued.

<u>WELCOMING:</u> Chairman Mike, AE6CQ reported that 35 members were present at this evening's meeting.

<u>MEMBERSHIP</u>: Chairperson Ann, KC6TBG announced that there are 293 members of the club.

SANDARC: report was given by Len W5WFW. He reported that the attendance at the fair by all clubs was poor. Ann Rios, KC6TBG has been appointed the convention forum speakers chairman. The next convention meeting would be held on 20 July at the Sizzler restaurant at Aero Drive and Murphy Canyon starting as 1900. Dinner would be served after 1800hrs. Mike, N6OPH will be attending the NCVEC conference in Gettysburg, PA on 22 July. Mike, N6OPH and Mike, N6IEF both received letters of appreciation from the FCC for their work on the ITU UWB conference radio station. The conference was held in May at the Sheraton Harbor Island hotel.

NEW BUSINESS: It was moved and seconded that a committee be formed to investigate the possibility of purchasing a new or used antenna for the next field day. The committee members are Mike, N6IEF, Pat, WA6MHZ, Susan, KF6WXA and Rich, N6NKJ. The chairman for this committee is to be Susan, KF6WXA.

There being no further business before the general membership assembled, the meeting was adjourned at 2035hrs.





This month, the ARCEC spotlight shines on Chet Smith, K6VM, WAMO #188. Chet has quite a story to tell. He was born in Minneapolis, Minnesota, in 1919 and was always interested in electronics. He built his own radio crystal sets and other equipment, and became a radio amateur (W9TRC) at the age of 13 (after bootlegging for a few years). He demonstrated his skills in "show and tell" programs in high school and joined the Naval Communications Reserve in 1937.

When Chet became a part of the active United States Navy in 1940 as a seaman, his electronics skills served him well. He went to Navy "A" and "B" schools and became a radio operator. He was at his typewriter copying naval communications on the US GRANT on December 7, 1941 when the message came: "This is no drill—Japan has bombed Pearl Harbor." The ship turned around and headed for Pearl, to pick up casualties. The ship's next assignment was to carry American troops to Alaska, where the Japanese were invading the Aleutian Islands. After the American forces had taken the island of Kiska, Alaska, Chet (by this time a first class petty officer), was selected to go ashore and collect Japanese electronics radar equipment. He brought back the first boatload of electronics gear for delivery to electronic laboratories in Seattle, where it was analyzed.

By the time the war had ended, Chet had advanced to Chief Petty Officer and was sent to various Navy schools for additional training. While at Corpus Christi, Texas, he was selected as Avionics Warrant Officer, and, 2 years later, commissioned as Ensign Naval Electronics Officer. Further assignments brought him to Olathe, Kansas; Port Lyautey, Morocco; and Rota, Spain

In 1964, Smith (by this time a Lieutenant Commander) was assigned to the Bureau of Naval Weapons, Washington, D.C. as Administrator for Electronic Programs. In this position, he worked with tech reps and naval stations around the world, and was awarded a Presidential Citation for monetary savings. While in Washington, he lived in nearby Arlington, VA. When he first moved into his apartment, he set up his hifi gear and began listening at full blast. However, this didn't set well with his neighbor upstairs, who started to hammer on the radiator pipes. He met his neighbor—Bea—a few days later, at the mail box.

They both apologized, and soon became best friends. He learned that she worked for the Navy, too—as Technical Editor for the Office of Naval Research. In 1966, Chet left for Vietnam, where he was aviation officer in Project Jenny, a naval airborne television program. He was there during the Tet offensive, and was promoted to Navy Commander. All this time, he kept in touch with Bea through tapes and letters. When he returned from Vietnam in 1968, they were married. Following their wedding, they traveled to Paris, France where Chet was attached to NATO. During their 3 years in Paris, they traveled throughout the NATO nations setting up conferences and training programs for emission groups and airborne electronic organizations.

In 1970, after 31 years of active service, Chet retired from the Navy. He says he and his wife "took a chance and swung the compass." The needle pointed to El Cajon, California, where they are enjoying the sun, the diversity, and the life that Chet believes is a "perfect paradise."

As a Ham, Chet keeps his station in an attempt to provide the "camaraderie and warmth" that communication gives to people everywhere. While he was in the Navy, Chet helped keep morale high for sailors, soldiers, and civilians by enabling them to contact family and friends—to deal with business, or just let their loved ones know they were OK. During his tour in Morocco, there were several earthquakes, and Chet's radio station helped support disaster relief efforts and save lives. He was able to supply similar assistance while in Kansas City throughout a tornado. All in all, to people everywhere, the comfort provided by radio communication is nothing short of gratifying.

Chet wants to encourage the current and next generations to get involved in Ham Radio. He says, "It is not just a hobby that teaches basic engineering and emission, but it brings people together. It brings students together with seniors and Hams into the classroom. It's a wonderful welding agent." With such words, how could anyone refuse the temptation? This month, the ARCEC spotlight shines on Chet Smith, K6VM, a new Life Member of the El Cajon Club with an old love for radio.

The Editor's Corner KC6QLS Paul



This month I would like to talk about BPL. I am not personally against BPL; I can see the good in it. I am just against the interference it has caused at other test cities. Amateur radio and commercial radio communications are very important during a disaster, and we cannot have any interference at the time of the important communications that we provide to mankind.

Broadband over power lines is here in San Diego County. The test will most likely be in the Kearny Mesa area. As reported at the July SANDARC meeting, San Diego Gas and Electric has the equipment in place and has started the baseline testing. I would suggest that you read the article called **BPL** in the ARES Alert dated August 2005, which can be found at www.gsl.net/ sdgarrl We need to get a baseline from 2 to 30 MHz. Also check higher if you feel the need.

We need to get some data together to help support the issue that we are against BPL because of its interference to our frequencies. For the non engineers, I made a simple excel form to input data. If you wish to have a copy of it, please e-mail at kc6gls@cox.net and I would be happy to send one to you. On my form I have the following: date, time, frequency, mode, noise floor level, and notes. In the notes section I would input if a QSO was going on and any sounds that you might hear.

For the engineers, do what you do best. Submit your noise floor baseline and/or sound bites or any other data that you think may be helpful to our cause.

It was also reported at the SANDARC meeting that Richard Norton N6AA our Southwestern Division ARRL Director has put together a top team of Engineers to address this issue. I will be forwarding all the collected data that I gather to him, and anyone else that can use the data to help us out in our quest of no interference from BPL.

Please help in any way you can, or we may be sharing our bands with BPL forever.





Chicken Noodle Soup for the Ham Radio Operator's Soul

Here is the first installment of an article that was printed about 10 years ago in an other amateur radio newsletter. The author of this column has given me permission to reprint them for the counterpoise. So I hope you enjoy the first one of twelve.

"A Heart Warming Ham Oddesy in Arizona"

Turmoil and change have shaken the ranks of our hobby in recent years. Controversy over incentive licensing, the role of the code, and concern over the dwindling ranks of our hobby have caused angst and sown the seeds of division among hams, young and old. Now, with the decline of Cycle 23 upon us, it is time for a healing catharsis for our hobby, with "Chicken Noodle Soup for the Ham Radio Operator's Soul".

Our story begins high in the mountains north of Flagstaff, Arizona, one lazy Sunday afternoon in October of 1962. The drama which would unfold this day, began in the Mount Coronado National Recreation Area, a favorite area for local residents. That afternoon, a group of family members from Flagstaff drove up to the "Wilderness Range Campground", unaware their family outing that day would touch many lives and bring Amateur Radio into the national spotlight.

Sharing the crisp autumn air with his family this day, little Johnny Colpitts, barely 10 years old, played a game of "hide and seek". Amid the noise and activities of a family gathering, little Johnny slipped out of camp, and disappeared into the wilderness.

Frantic family members drove the 25 miles down a winding mountain road to call for help at the Ranger Station. Search teams were dispatched and one of the most massive search and rescue operations in Arizona history was launched. Joining the search was a group of ham radio operators who were in the Wilderness Campground area for a weekend contest. Utilizing their ham HF station at base camp to keep in contact with hams supplementing communications with the Forest Service, the frantic search to find little

The search took a turn for the worse, as an early October snowfall hampered the three week old search. After conditions improved enough to permit search and rescue crews to resume their work, hopes were again raised, only to be dashed when Little Johnny failed to appear after two long months of the most intensive search and rescue effort Arizona had seen in nearly three decades.

All hope had been given up, when strangely enough, that spring another group of hams happened across what was reported to be a wild "dog-boy", sighted in the same "Wilderness Camp" area where little Johnny had been lost the previous October. Reports of a young boy, walking on his hands and feet, piqued the curiosity of area rangers. Investigators combed the area and discovered the young Colpitts, taken in by a pack of wild, yet kindly dogs.

Incredibly, little Johnny Colpitts was unharmed, except for slight mal nourishment. Apparently the young Colpitts had been adopted by the pack of wild dogs and had survived exposure to the elements by hiding out in their cave. Young enough to rebound from the trauma of being separated from his family, Johnny steadily recovered from the psychological effects of his ordeal. After a period of re-adjustment, young Johnny was pronounced healthy and completely recovered from his long and harrowing ordeal and was reunited with his family.

The group of hams who had played a part in the rescue of the young Colpitts had developed a friendship with the young boy and his family. This friendship which would later develop into a lifelong avocation for young Johnny. Staying in touch with the Colpitts family, the hams nurtured Johnny's interest in electronics and ham radio. At age 15, young Johnny received his Novice license and eventually upgraded to General, earning the call sign K9GUY.

As a young man preparing for college, his interest in radio stayed with him. Upon graduation from high school, Johnny Colpitts was accepted into the Electrical Engineering program at Northern Arizona University. After four long years of study and dedication,

dedication, Johnny Colpitts graduated with his Batchelor of Science in Electrical Engineering, after a nearly fatal brush with fate a decade earlier.

Today, John Colpitts is the CEO of a well known Fortune 500 company which produces the sophisticated machinery used in the production of miniaturized electronic components. Proof that with a hard work, a can-do attitude and the love and support of a caring family, the human spirit can overcome almost insurmountable adversity.

Editors note: Unfortunately, our story took a tragic turn as this newsletter went to press. Reuters News Service, dateline Kenosha, Wisconsin. John Colpitts, Chief Executive Officer for Granutraine Corporation, was taken into custody by Sheriffs Deputies, after he was arrested in his neighborhood "...snarling and growling at neighbor's cats and chasing cars". We will keep our readers updated as this story continues to unfold.
