

Membership — There are currently 252 paid members and the last WAMO issued was 1513.


The President also advised the membership that the ARRL Section picnic will be on October 19. More information to follow.



WHITE HOUSE GREETS AMATEUR RADIO OPERATORS

In mid-June, President George W. Bush sent his greetings to all Amateur Radio operators, acknowledging their role in emergency communications and in generating international goodwill. The White House letter came as hams in the U.S. were marking Amateur Radio Week June 16-23 and preparing to participate in ARRL Field Day.

"I salute amateur radio operators for your work on behalf of public safety officials," the President said in a letter dated June 18. "I also commend your interest in communicating with persons in other parts of the world and learning about other cultures and countries. Your involvement builds understanding and goodwill around the globe."

For the first time, Field Day this year was open to participation by amateurs throughout the Americas and the Caribbean.

The President's letter acknowledged ham radio's "important role in emergency communications, assisting law enforcement personnel and other emergency services as they carry out their responsibilities."

ARRL President Jim Haynie, W5JBP, expressed his delight at the presidential communication. "I'm extremely pleased that the president has decided to recognize the accomplishments of Amateur Radio operators throughout America," he said. "Amateur Radio is a real asset to America, and even more so after September 11. Amateur Radio has always played a big role in disasters and emergencies, and I'm very proud of it."

President Bush said First Lady Laura Bush "joins me in sending our best wishes".

Governors in several states issued proclamation designating Amateur Radio Week of Amateur Radio Month during June.

Surfin': Radio History on the Web

Barry Mishkind's <u>The Broadcast Archive</u> website bills itself as "Radio History on the Web". The goal of the website is "to continue adding historical materials on both pioneer and current broadcast radio stations as well as links and references to other locations containing accurate materials on broadcasting." After viewing the contents of the website, it seems that Barry is well on his way to fulfilling this goal.

The website is chock full of nuggets of broadcast radio history. Find out if David Sarnoff really did hear the distress call from the *Titanic*. Read such "war stories" as a first-hand account about climbing a 1572-foot radio tower ... in the dark. Learn what were the first broadcast radio stations in each state and discover what the acronyms that make up radio station call signs really signify. And what is the real story behind those now-rare three-letter broadcast station call signs?

You will spend hours poring over the entertaining and informative narratives in The Broadcast Archive. Every story I viewed on this site caught my attention and demanded to be read to its end. This is a very bookmarkable site that you will want to revisit.

In addition to the histories and anecdotes of broadcast radio, you will also find broadcast radio software that is downloadable from this site. These include radio-engineering tools and programs that allow you to search the FCC radio station database and plot the station transmitter locations on maps.


