

Amateur Radio Direction Finding (ADRF) - Fox hunting




A map and compass sport that combines the skills of orienteering and radio direction finding. It is a timed race in which individual competitors use a topographic map, a magnetic compass and radio direction finding apparatus to navigate through diverse wooded terrain while searching for radio transmitters. Worldwide, the sport is most often referred to by its English-language acronym, ARDF, but is also referred to as fox hunting. ARDF events use radio frequencies on either the 2 metre or 80 metre amateur radio bands, chosen because of their universal availability to amateur radio licensees in all countries.

For this first event from Auckland Branch clubroom, we shall not send you into rough terrain, nor should you take all day (as is shown in the video). Rather we shall confine the foxes to an area of 3 square kilometers that is mostly suburban and should take about 1 hour to find them on foot. Future events may be more demanding.

IAA REACHES OUT

Yarns with Wilkins Expedition in Alaska

RADIO z1AA is putting himself well on the map with his little Z2B. Working on about 33 metres with an input varying from 45 to 60 watts he got into touch with the Wilkins Expedition in Alaska recently, and chatted for an hour without any difficulty at either end.

At the other end Lieutenant Messer was using a portable plant with an input of about 300 watts to two 50-watt valves. At the time the Alaskan call was picked up, Lieutenant Messer was trying to get Australia, the homeland of Captain Wilkins, in order to send a message to

ting into touch with New Zealand, and it was arranged for another attempt to be made on the following Wednesday. This was also successful. On Thursday night, however, a further attempt failed.

Radio IAA thinks that this is the first time that communication has been established between New Zealand and the interior of Alaska. His last event of importance was getting into touch with the Ross Sea whaling expedition a few months ago.

Radio IAA uses the usual detector and one-step for receiving. The transmitter shown in the photo has been remadelled for use on the shorter waves; but the rest of the gear is the same, including IAA, the most important part. By the way, Mr. Edwards' address is now 50

A Bit of ZL1AA Prehistory

While searching the Branch photo album for something else, ZL1BRC came across this gem of a news item from the past. It is a pity that it is only a fragment but that is better than nothing. Its probable date is 1928.

Norm Edwards was one of the group of Auckland amateurs who created the forerunner of NZART. He was the holder of several firsts in DX records.

Note the 1AA callsign which later became the fuller callsign ZL1AA. After Norm's death in the 1950s Auckland Branch (later incorporated in 1976) acquired his callsign which is regarded as a treasure on the international DX bands.

Where this article was published is unknown. It may have been in the Detroit News which sponsored several Wilkins expeditions to the Arctic, or more likely in a New Zealand publication dedicated to New Zealand radio broadcasting and containing an Amateur Section — amateurs appearing to have a higher profile in those days than they have today.

Wilkins was an Australian named Hubert Wilkins who was later knighted. His polar exploits should make interesting reading. One of the aircraft which he used was a metal Fokker tri-motor named "Detroiter" which crashed in the Arctic and was later returned to the United States. There it was sold to Charles Kingsford Smith who renamed it "Southern Cross".
