AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION:

GENERAL BUSINESS:

WARO Constitution Amendments:

CONSTITUTION: The following amendments will be moved at the 2007 AGM:-

<u>Paragraph 10 Clause (g)</u> of the Constitution be amended by adding /Archivist after the word Librarian.

Explanation: This name change was confirmed at the 2006 AGM.

<u>Paragraph 10 Clause (h)</u> of the Constitution be amended by inserting (under the heading Editor and Publicity) the following:

- (i) Editor of the WARO Bulletin.
- (ii) Break-in Columnist.
- (iii)Official Broadcast Co-ordinator.

(All non-elective positions appointed at the AGM.)

Explanation: This amendment clarifies the positions currently under the heading Editor and Publicity.

<u>Paragraph 12 clause (f)</u> of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"The Librarian/Archivist shall maintain the scrapbooks, albums, articles, books, documents, and electronic media. Library books, and where appropriate, some electronic media items, may be lent to members as requested. Other documents may not be lent out. They may be copied and sent to any member who requests information. The cost of such copying and postage to be charged to that member."

Explanation: This amendment defines the duties, and updates the clause to allow for electronic media.

<u>Paragraph 12 Clause (g)</u> of the Constitution be amended by striking out "The Editors and Publicity Officers shall edit the WARO newsletter and record and produce any publicity as required" and by then inserting the following: -

Clause (g) Editor and Publicity:

- (i) The Editor of the Bulletin shall edit the WARO Newsletter/Bulletin and arrange distribution.
- (ii) The Columnist for Break-In shall prepare appropriate material for publication in the NZART magazine.
- (iv)The Official Broadcast Co-ordinator shall prepare and deliver a report for inclusion in the NZART Official Broadcast.

Explanation: This amendment states the duties of the appointed officers in Clauses (f) & (g)

<u>Paragraph 14 Clause (d)</u> of the Constitution (Quorum) be amended by (i) striking out the words "not less than one sixth of financial members" and then inserting the words "not less than one ninth of financial members", and by (ii) striking out the words "a minimum of fifteen" and then inserting the words "a minimum of ten".

Explanation: A quorum of 15 has been unattainable at recent AGMs.

(The changed paragraph should now read: Paragraph14(d). A quorum at the Annual General Meeting and Special General Meeting shall consist of not less than one ninth of the financial members of Clause 3(a), with a minimum of ten. In the absence of a quorum the meeting may make recommendations to the Executive Committee.).

This year has been another quiet year for awards with no applications being received in the last few months. I have issued four WARO HF awards which were from some of those who entered the 2006 Thelma Souper Memorial Contest. Most people who enter the contest make at least 10 WARO contacts and I hope that more people will apply for an award after this year's contest.

Several WARO members are attempting the CLARA Challenge which is to contact 40 YLs during 2007. To support them it would be good if WARO members could come up now and again on the WARO net at 8.00 pm on 3.695 on a Monday evening to give some contacts. Contacts of course can be any YLs.

I am happy to continue being Awards Manager and hope to receive a few more applications for awards during the coming year.

In 1968 they moved to Red Hill, Papakura which was to prove a top DX location. DXCC was in their blood by now, rivalry was fierce, but with a TS830, an SB200 linear and a TH6DXX beam the going was relatively easy. Both achieved Honour Roll status, currently Dave has 354 countries confirmed, Aola has 351 confirmed. Amongst other activities they have taken part in are:- Tri Island DXpedition to Western Samoa, Tonga & Niue Islands. (Aola was the first YL operator to put Niue on the air). They were regular operators on the Pandora's Box DX Net, Pacific DX Net, 222 YL Net, YL ISSB VK/ZL Systems, Seanet, to name a few. Aola served as the NZ link of the ZL1AA/K operation when Dave went to the Kermadec Islands.

Since Dave retired in 1984, they have traveled widely to United Kingdom, Europe, United States, Pacific Islands, Australia, Hong Kong, China, Japan, catching up with the wonderful "on air" friends they have made over the years. It has also been their pleasure to host many of the overseas amateurs that have visited our country from time to time.

In this Diamond Wedding Anniversary year Aola & Dave thank all those fine folk who over the years have made their way into our lives.

NZ WARO Achievement Award



This Award takes the form of the MYRTLE EARLAND MEMORIAL ROSEBOWL which shall be retained by the winner for the succeeding year, together with a suitably engraved shield to be kept by the winner. The winner, if any, to be announced by the NZ WARO president at the NZ WARO Annual General Meeting. Unsuccessful nominees may receive a certificate of achievement if appropriate.

CRITERIA - The nominee is to be a member of NZ WARO who has made a significant contribution in any aspect of Amateur Radio, e.g. Personal Achievement as a NZ WARO member, Services to NZ WARO, Services to NZART at either Branch or national level, Community Service including Civil Defence and Search and Rescue, DX participation, Contest, etc. The Trophy may not necessarily be awarded every year, and when not awarded shall be kept either in the NZ WARO cabinet at NZART Headquarters or at the home of the Award Custodian.

NOMINATION FORMAT-

Nominations to include a summary of the nominee's activities, which need not be restricted to the immediate preceding year, and are to be received by the Award Custodian Lynnette McDonald ZL1LL 25 John Street Pukekohe on or before 31st March each year for consideration by the Executive. Unsuccessful nominations may be re-submitted in the following years, however, previous winners are not eligible for further nomination for the same or similar achievements.


International YL Meet 2006 in Mumbai India From Eva DL8ZBE

Now we are home again after many nice, exciting, and sometimes adventurous and surprising experiences during our time in India. We flew directly to Mumbai without any stopover. A gentle wind with nearly 30 degrees centigrade embraced us there at the airport at night.

At the 5 star Hotel Intercontinental The Grand, all delegates of the International YL MEET 2006, 26th to 29th October in Mumbai, India, were warmly welcomed by Sarla VU2SWS, and her staff. There were 54 participants from all over the world, including 41 Yls. Some Indian Hams and the chief of the Indian Amateur Society were sometimes present also.

During our stay in Mumbai several events took place. We enjoyed the welcome party and dinner followed by an Indian classical dance program. We attended the half day conference and the get together with traditional dresses, then sightseeing by bus through the huge town of more than 12 million inhabitants. On one day we departed on a one hour boat cruise to the Elephanta Cave Island tour. These caves house rock cut temples dating back to the 5th century. They are dedicated to Shiva Mahadeva and rich in sculpture.

Between the official programs there was also time for shopping or relaxing, or working at the club station in a hotel room with the special call AT6MYL. It was not easy for



most of the YLs to get connections to their home country at the right time and under useful conditions. The travel by rail from Mumbai to Jaipur over 1265 kilometers of distance was quite an experience. The journey took one night and a half day. There were couchette coaches with compartments for six persons, but no partition to the corridor. Fritz and I were in a compartment together with an Indian family with two children.

After that we longed for a shower when we reached the hotel in Jaipur!

The town Jaipur in the north of India is called The Pink City, because of the pink coloured walls of the old part of the town which had been structured at a drawing-board. Jaipur, the town of the Maharajas with 2 million inhabitants is also the capital town of Rajastan, one of the provinces of India. There was heavy traffic on the roads with different kinds of vehicles, both with motors and without and everybody was sounding their horns all the time.

In Jaipur town we visited the Hava Mahal, literal meaning, Palace Of Winds, an

important landmark of the Pink City. It is an interesting building with a special facade. This honeycombed building was originally built to facilitate the women of the royal family to watch the everyday life and processions of the city.

The highlight near Jaipur was the sightseeing of Amber Fort. All of us had an Elephant Ride ascending uphill. Two persons at a time on the back of an elephant directed by a rider. There were more than two hundred animals on a rather narrow alley, one after the other, transporting lots of visitors. A fantastic event. We travelled 260 kilometers by coach to the next point of interest: Fatepur Sicri, an old Mohammedan town of different temples, each for a special purpose or religious ceremonies. This town belongs, as some other famous monuments we visited, to the World Culture Heritage. On the road suddenly the coach stopped. We supposed an accident, but the real reason was that an overhead powerline of 20,000 volts was broken down and was lying on the road. That took us more than an hour of waiting. So it had become too late to visit the Taj Mahal near Agra that day. Instead of that we fell into our beds earlier than the days before.

Very early next morning, in the dark and before breakfast, we departed to the Taj Mahal. This famous Monument was built in the 17th century by a Moghul Emperor in memory of his beloved wife. He loved his wife so much that after her death he decided to immortalize their love in the form of Taj Mahal, built of marble and semi precious stone. We reached that area at dawn and witnessed the following sunrise, an unforgettable memory. A photo was taken of our group in the well laid out garden.

Then our last destination in the north of India was New Delhi, the Capital. There was not much time left, but on a sightseeing tour by bus in the evening we had a glance of the huge town in the Government district. We visited the India Gate; a majestic structure set in a beautiful area of New Delhi. It is called All India War Memorial in memory of many Indian soldiers who died in different wars.

The second very old monument near New Delhi is Qutub Minar. This tower is identified with Delhi as the Leaning tower in Pisa in Italy or the Eiffel Tower in Paris. It is an excellent example of early Islamic architecture in India. The area around has important monuments which together constitute the Qutub complex. By airplane we reached our last destination, Goa, a former Portuguese colony, now belonging to India since 1961, at the west coast of India and south of Mumbai. Wherever you are in the region you will find Portuguese buildings, churches, and modern beach resorts which have a European touch.

The capital town of Goa is Panaji, 9 kilometers far from Old Goa. On a sightseeing tour by bus we visited the well known Basilika Bom Jesus, built 1605 by the Jesuits, with the tomb of St Francis Xavier, Goa's holiest relic. Another point of view was the Shri Mangesh Temple, a very impressive Hindu temple. Our stay there was at Goa's longest beach south of Panaji. The beaches are beautiful but the climate is hot and humid, about 35 degrees centigrade. Hotels and small resorts are scattered along the

coast, clustering around former fishing villages. Sun, sand and sea - with these impressions we left Goa by plane to Mumbai to catch the flight back home with sweet memories of our Indian Tour.

We thank Sarla VU2SWS very much for her invitation and the organisation, so we could enjoy such a wonderful meeting and learn to know some very interesting parts of India.

Logs should include date of contact, name and call sign of the YL operator, and band or mode. Signal reports are not needed.

Cost of the certificate in Canada, including postage is \$5.00. For DX stations the cost is \$5.00 US. Deadline for submission of the logs: March 1st 2008. Talk it up so we can get lots of YLs on the air!

Thelma Souper Memorial Contest 2007

The Thelma Souper Memorial Contest will be held on the 31st March and 1st April 2007 from 0800z - 1000z on Saturday and Sunday evenings. All Contacts to be held on 80 meters phone or CW may be used. YLs contact YLs and OMs. **OMs contact YLs and OMs**. One contact with each station permitted in each half hour period. Call "CQ WARO CONTEST" exchange report, serial number (commencing 001) and name. To qualify as a multiplier **WARO MEMBER** stations must have contacts with at least **10** different stations.

A Bonus Station using the WARO callsign ZL6YL will be in operation for random periods and will count as a multiplier one on each night of the contest <u>if worked</u>. Club stations may be operated by multiples of YLs providing that they are WARO members and have licenses applicable to the band being operated. These stations count as one multiplier. All radio regulations must be observed.

SCORING:

To Qualify: Enter date at beginning of each evening. Each log must contain: Time of Contact, callsign of station worked, cipher sent, cypher received and the name of the operator contacted and points claimed for contact.

Score 5 points for each WARO contact including ZL6YL. Score 3 points for OM contacts, Score 2 points for club stations. Multiply by the number of WARO members including bonus station if worked.

Logs to have each contact claimed as a multiplier <u>underlined</u>. Include a separate summary sheet showing: Your callsign, name and address. The number of contacts. The number of WARO members worked. Your score. Declaration that all radio regulations, have been observed. Logs that do not comply with all the above requirements will be disqualified.
