

Current Financial membership is 66 ZL members, 2 Associate, 4 Friends of WARO and 79 sponsored DX members. The bulk of subscriptions were paid within 3 months. There is always the stragglers who need a gentle reminder. There is also 4 unpaid members who have not notified anyone of their circumstances.

Stock on hand – we currently have a large stock of various WARO badges – 115 "A" @ \$6-00 each, 27 "B" @ \$6-00 each, 11 "C" @ \$4-00 each, 1 bar @ \$1-00 each, 6 Lapel Pins @ \$2-50 each, 10 Charms @ \$2-50 each and 8 Scarves @ \$17-00

I suggest we look at ways to encourage the reduction of these badges and maybe reduce the price and encourage all WARO members and WARO friends etc. to have a badge or Lapel Pins with their call sign engraved. Our investment with UDC is returning a good interest rate and keeps growing as is evident in the Balance Sheet. This comes up for renewal in November of each year. Hope to hear you on 9th August. Pass the word on to all the local amateurs. This is a fun contest. Ideal for newcomers.



<u>Thoughts from the Alternative Programme Hastings Conference</u> <u>From Rosemary ZL1RO</u>

It was a frosty Hastings morning but inside the bus it was warm as we set off from Hastings towards Napier on the first day of the Alternative Programme. We travelled around the base of Napier Hill hearing how the great earthquake of 1931 changed the landscape in the area when the land was moved upwards by some two metres. Rebuilding of the town started quickly and new houses in the now familiar Art Deco style were built to house residents. These houses were made of concrete and cheap to build and I remember my father talking about being sent from Wellington to help with speedy erection of houses in the Napier area.

Our bus took us through some streets of homes built in Art Deco style then we stopped to see a video explaining how Napier was rebuilt with Art Deco and Spanish Mission influences. The various embellishments with names such as ziggurats, sunbursts. speedlines, fountain zigzags. shapes and flowers as well as some Mayan symbols seen on buildings were explained to us and we were later able to recognise some of them later



during a guided walking tour of the Napier CBD.



In the afternoon at Arataki Honey we heard about the importance of bees in our daily life. If there were no bees there would be no flowers pollinated, so very little fruit. We learned that bees communicate by doing a special type of dance to convey a message to other bees. A wall chart of "bee dances" beside the hive helped us work out what message a bee we were watching was sending. There were many flavours and types of honey available for testing and of course byproducts of the honey industry like beeswax, propolis etc. From honey we moved on to a winery high on a hillside to sample their product and view an art exhibition

in a small gallery. The last call of the afternoon was at a gourmet cheese factory for tasting and eduction about specialist cheeses.

On day two after the WARO AGM the bus took us to a Farmers Market where there were all sorts of fresh produce, meat, and preserves for sale. Two buildings were filled with stalls and there was a large crowd of people there. After a stop at the Hastings Art Gallery to view an exhibition of creative works by invited artists the

morning ended with a visit to a Sculpture Garden, Gallery and old fashioned sweet shop. The Sweet shop was very popular and the rows of jars containing many types of boiled sweets and toffees from years ago brought back childhood memories. Do you remember sherbet dabs, or "proper" liquorice straps which you could split into many thin strips, or genuine gob stoppers, they were all there too.

An after lunch stop at a distillery providing tastings of gin, liqueurs and schnapps was a good place to warm up before we went on to Clifton Station, a working sheep farm not far from the coast. We gathered in the huge woolshed, which was built in 1886 and is still in use today. Memorabilia associated with the farm was displayed on and around the walls. A lady arrived with what appeared to be a small case, which unfolded into a spinning wheel on which she demonstrated the art of spinning raw wool into knitting wool.

A sheep was shorn using three methods. First the blade or hand shears were used, then a very early shearing machine hand cranked by an assistant trying to keep the speed constant, and lastly the conventional electric powered shearing machine of today.

Much of the wool from Clifton Station is combined with possum fibre and manufactured into items for the retail trade. We were able to see a live possum, which was a first for some of our group. Most of were more familiar with the dead possum on the roadside. A call at a nearby winery for tastings and a walk in the vineyard was the final part of a very enjoyable alternative programme at Conference 2009.

DXPEDITION TO CHATHAM ISLANDS 2009 by Lee White ZL2LE

The idea for a dxpedition to the Chathams was first mooted in 2007 but shelved as the cost of accommodation and somewhere to operate was prohibitive.Early in 2008




Morrie, ZL2AAA, met up with Ken who runs the Chatham Island Fishing Experience to the Chatham's with accommodation and with trees for antenna supports and a much better price structure than previously. The Chatham Islands are serviced by a boat, which has an unpredictable schedule and Air Chatham, so costs are incurred on everything imported. From this meeting it was on again in earnest.

After several months of planning 9 males and 1 female including our travelling host assembled at Hawke's Bay Airport for departure on Thursday 5th March. An hour and a half later than the scheduled departure time the Convair 580 arrived. The flight originates in the Chathams with an approx. departure time of 9.30am and takes 2 hours to Auckland then onto to Napier, which takes approx. 1 hour. A few photographs were taken just before we boarded.

After a 1-1/2 hour flight we arrived to cool winds. We had a short wait for the the truck to transport our personal gear and 358 kg of radio equipment which was loaded in record time for an hour's journey by gravel road to a farm in Kaingaroa which was to be our home for the next 6 days. When we reached our destination we were met by a lovely lady who informed us she was one of our hosts. All personal gear was unloaded and we were allocated our rooms.

Once that was done it was onto the task of unloading radios, linears, ATUs, coax and antennas plus a few bins containing computers, interfaces, morse keys, headsets and



foot controls etc Decisions had to be made as to which barns would be used for what. After a while 1 barn was allocated to 160 and 30 with the use of two radios and the other barn for 80, 40, 20 and 17 with another two radios. By this time it was 9.30pm Chatham time (thev are 45mins ahead of NZ) so we called it a day outside and

headed indoors to a lovely roast meal followed by a team meeting and a decision was made to start erecting antennas the next morning.

Day 2 Friday 6th.

Everyone awoke to the smell of frying bacon and eggs after which we divided into 3 teams namely antenna erection, radio computer setup and gofers and then it was onto the jobs as allocated. Both the tribander and the 17 meter beams were assembled with the 17m one being erected first. As the beams were being assembled radios, computers etc. were being linked up. Diesel generators supplied power and the first radio was on the air on 17 meters CW at midday. A short time later the tribander was lifted into the

air and 20 CW was on the air. Not long after the 160 inverted L and 30-meter vertical antennas were in the air. A spud gun was used to shoot some lines over some 30-meter trees in order for the 80-meter and 40 meter delta loops to be raised. By sundown all antennas were in the air and work began in earnest.

For the next four days were operated, SSB, CW and RTTY round the clock depending on the propagation. For the time of the year the SFI indicator was very low which meant CW was the predominant mode of operation. On the Wednesday, the day before departure, we started dismantling at about 08.00 Chatham time and by midday everything was packed away and stowed on the truck ready for transport to the airport the next day. The rest of the afternoon was spent sightseeing with a visit to the Waitangi watering hole, then to a new restaurant for the evening meal before the return trip to the farm.

On the day of departure we had to be at the airport by 09.00 for a 09.30 flight toAuckland with a 3hour wait there while repairs were made to the aircraft. Once again we learned the meaning of Chatham's time. This wait turned into 5 hours with us finally arriving home after 18.00.

I believe everyone had a great time and learned a lot.

Mavis VK3KS celebrates 70 years of Amateur Radio.

Mavis VK3KS has been a radio amateur for 70 years and a DX member of WARO for a good many years being sponsored by the late Pearl ZL2QY. A luncheon in Melbourne was held in her honour. The occasion was organised by the YLs of ALARA, which she has actively supported since its formation in 1975. Mavis's story begins in a small farming settlementof Lallat North in Victoria's Wimmera district when a school teacher Ivor VK3XB boarded at her parent's home.

The young man set up a battery powered rig in his lodgings much to the interest of Mavis' brother Artie who started studying for his licence, but soon he had to leave the farm to find work. Mavis at this time had quietly learnt the Morse code and with some

study under Ivor's guidance passed her licence test on 30 May 1939 to be issued the callsign VK3KS on 6 June in that year. Within three months she had made 110 contacts using a crystal controlled rig with 3-watts output, before World War II brought an end to amateur radio activity.

In 1943 Mavis married Ivor and with the resumption of amateur radio after the war the couple continued to share the enjoyment of the hobby, both being fine CW operators who also enjoyed Phone. Eventually they relocated to Box Hill in Melbourne's eastern suburbs and were proud to have a shared OM and XYL QSL card. Sadly Ivor became SK in 1999.

Mavis has won a large number of contest awards. With Ivor they were stalwarts of the BERU Commonwealth Contest over decades. In 1966 Mavis became one of the few ladies in the invitation-only First Class CW Operators' Club. She was one of the early members of ALARA and, as the ALARA Historian and with assistance from Ivor, she produced the organisation's history for 1975-89. Many an ALARA meeting was held



at the Stafford home and she was also the Award Custodian. ALARA bestowed her Honorary Life Membership in 1983. President WIA Michael Owen VK3KI praised her contributions and then gave her а WIA framed President's Commendation. ALARA Vice President Marilyn Syme VK3DMS

talked about the voluntary work of Mavis and her support of others, before presenting an ALARA plaque marking her 70th anniversary. Mavis was thrilled to see so many friends at the luncheon. (Edited from the WIA website and the Alara Newsletter) and the ALARA newsletter. Marilyn VK3DMS and Mavis VK3KS share a laugh at the special luncheon in the Wheeler's Hill hotel on the 6th June.

A Tribute to Cathy from her OM George

When I started to accumulate material for this tribute, I was surprised how many awards and accomplishments Cathy had achieved -a pile over 7" high! It would take several pages to list them all, so I will try to mention the most important.

Cathy was born August 1932 in Detroit Michigan and at age 14 had already gotten her drivers license (naturally, in Detroit, driver's training started in the first year of high school). As a young go-getter, she was flipping burgers (5 cents each!!!!) at White Castle to help out. At age 16, she operated her own dance studio, having been on stage most of her younger years. We met at a neighbourhood TV viewing evening (very common in the early 50s) and liked each other so much we got married in May 1951. She raised 5 sterling children including 2 diabetics (thanks to my father) and even found time to try working in the hot real estate market. She was a whiz at getting listings! We moved to a farm 12 miles outside of Windsor so I could be near my job with CBC. Cathy participated in the usual Home and School, hockey Mom, Church activities etc.

We moved back to Windsor in 1963 and on to Toronto in 1967. Also in 1967, we went to Expo in Montreal (who didn't ?) and after that trip decided we should see the rest of the country. We dipped our camper wheels in the Atlantic the next summer and later followed up with a trip to the Pacific Ocean. No children were harmed on these trips thanks to mobile ham radio. Cathy had gotten her radio licence in 1966 so it was a pleasure working our friends back home.

Cathy really blossomed in Toronto. With the kids in school, she was able to help at the Scarborough ARC newsletter, the Ontario Science Centre plus an afternoon of phone patching to the VE8 stations up north. She participated in every Women's (called YLs) Ham organization including many she helped found and get off the ground and joining umpteen YL only clubs and societies in the US, Canada, Great Britain, Germany, Japan, Australia and New Zealand. She was one of the founders of GOTA (Guides on the Air) in Canada, an international organization. She got so immersed in the YL functions that she attended many conventions in the US and Canada. So much so that in the mid 90s, she arranged two on her own – an international one with YLs coming from as far away as Japan and New Zealand. She also arranged a CLARA (Canadian Ladies Amateur Radio Association) Convention, and with the help of her family, made a huge success of both. Naturally, she had the assistance of her local ham girlfriends too! In 1984 she started writing for Canada's national radio magazines, and has written a monthly column continuously for 25 years! In the last few years, she missed the odd month, but her record is a high water mark.

Now we come to the most pleasant part of her last few years. About 7 years ago we bought a horse. It was mutual love at first sight. Oreo was about a year old when acquired, and the love affair has continued at white heat. A girl friend of hers, Dayna Hale, ran the Crossroads Ranch just 1 km up the road and we saw Cathy's new horse almost every day. She would call out "Oreo" at first but after a few weeks all she had to do was stand there and her horse would trot over to her, even from a distant pasture. Trouble is, his buddies would often come with him, and if Cathy was inside the corral, she would soon be surrounded by 6 - 9 horses, all clamouring for a carrot and milling about her.

I used to smile at the scene, but at the time I didn't realize that all it would take was for one horse to jostle another and if it accidentally stepped on Cathy's foot, serious damage would occur. Strangely enough it never happened...imagine a 5 foot, 105 lb woman in the midst of 6 or more milling horses for over 5 minutes. Were we lucky? To add icing to the cake, Dayna had barrel racing, team penning, and other events every Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday, rain permitting, and eventually Cathy participated until she was thrown a second time and broke her collarbone. Fortunately, a nurse riding friend of hers was on duty at the hospital and when Cathy went to ER, she made life more pleasant for her.Did that cramp Cathy's love for riding horses? No way! After she healed she would cook up a huge pot of cowboy-style chili and take it over on Saturdays and Sundays for the other participants. She actively enjoyed her riding friends and horses. But all good things must come to an end. Like many horse owners, Dayna was forced to sell her ranch.

Since Cathy was not riding anymore we had to keep Oreo at a "room and board"pasture near by and were only able to see him every 2 or 3 days. Shortly thereafter, a pasture nearer became available and the love affair continued unabated. They used to nuzzle each other at the gate and Oreo found it amusing to knock her hat off her head without touching her.

When we fell on evil times, Cathy and I both originally thought she had caught the vicious flu that went around the last half of 2008. However things got progressively worse until she had to go to ER the early part of January for a short, one day visit and then back again a few days later by ambulance, at which time they detected the cancer about mid-January. By this time Cathy had lost weight and was in no condition for any kind of treatment. From then on the doctors would/could not treat her and eventually sent her home for the end.

Our daughters tended to her in 3 hour shifts and kept her going a week longer than the doctors gave her. We even had a friend bring a portable corral to our house and Oreo was right at the patio doors. He would often stick his head in the open door for carrots on the floor. Cathy would have a weak smile on her face to see her cherished pet. This lasted up to two days before the end. After that it was just an unhappy wait for the end.

Why am I writing a tear-jerking story like this?? Since Cathy's passing various people have commented on how poorly she had looked when they had previously last seen her. I, seeing her daily, was unaware of the changes. Half a dozen people noticed the change but never pressed us to seek medical help until it was too late. Had the cancer been caught earlier, there is a possibility she could have been saved. So – if you really cherish your dear one, you BOTH should get a check-up at least once a year, if not every six months. It may save you a lot of grief later. If you do this and you are found to have cancer and get treatment and recover, I want you to phone any HRISCHENKO in the Toronto phone book and tell them your story. They will know where I am in later years, and if even one dear life is saved, I will feel Cathy's experience was not completely without redeeming qualities.

Third son Peter had been there the week before Christmas to do a repair job in a steel factory over there and, as it was his first overseas trip, he felt very alone. He just stayed in his room in his spare time with his cigarettes and a beer. Now he had to return to finish the job so I said I'd go with him.

Being the pushy mum, I made sure he was going to see some sights. The Air New Zealand flight was packed, about two centimetres between our knees and the seat in front. When we arrived in Auckland, after settling into the motel, Peter had to go to work and I went walking. I walked for three hours and did about 10kms stopping to take frequent photos, and chat with elderly locals sitting in the sun.

Next day I caught a bus into Auckland to see the city - it was covered with scaffolding

As luck would have it, I was just crossing the road on a pedestrian crossing when Peter had to stop for me. He knew to go to the parking area at the wharf but, as there was no radio repeater coverage (for a .5W handheld) down there and there were over 1000 cars, it would have been a real job to find each other. We bought a Chinese takeaway and took it up the mountain to eat at sunset and Peter

Then another radio couple who I had met at a radio field day came


