



GROUNDS cover 150 acres of forest, rolling hills, creeks and a beautiful lake and includes five miles of well-marked hiking trails.



Other recreational amenities include a heated pool, whirlpool, sauna, game room, tennis court and much more.



Southwest Section Report



(Be blessed by that special inventive side of hams – especially those endowed with the Holy Spirit-Editor's note)

Since moving here to this retirement center my antenna situation is very poor as my antenna cannot be visible. I can just barely work some members on 20 meters. I guess since I have been active in the past that K4RBZ could not find anyone else to fill the job. All I can tell you about is what I am doing with Wycliffe Bible Translators.

I wanted to buy a house directly on top of the highest hill here in Tucson but God stopped that through circumstances and we moved to the lowest spot here in Saddlebrooke (only 5 miles from the Wycliffe Center near Tucson) just one year later. As it turns out, that hill top would not have been a good choice because of the tremendous amount of lightning here. I believe God directs a Christian through circumstances. Being an ardent ham it was hard to move to this low place but I believe in putting God first. (Read 1st Peter 5:6 & 7.) I have seen God bless me in the past for doing His will first. I worked hard to build a house in Medford, Oregon on the highest hill top I could find with a view over 100 miles. It was a super ham location and I could work ARMS members in Asia with ease. After living up there for 10 years, I really thought how I was wasting

my time just sitting there patting myself on the back on how good a signal I was able to put out, when I knew of the media needs of Wycliffe Bible Translators.

One of the many media needs for the Bible Translators comes about because of the older members who have large collections of 35 mm slides that they want to put into digital for use in writing books about their work. One member had over 3000 slides dating back to 1936, but the local drug store photo department charged \$50 just to copy a set of 80 slides to a CD. This was out of the question as far as what the Bible Translator could afford. I bought a slide scanner but I found it to be super slow. It took 15 minutes just to copy 3 slides so I invented a fast way of copying slides at high speed. The heart of the system is an old Kodak Carousel Projector. The system is so fast that I can copy over 600 slides per day.

Here is what my new slide copier looks like and what was involved in making it. First of all I had to change the projector into an optical collimator. (The projector can never be used as a projector again.) I took out the 250 watt projector lamp and socket and installed a new lamp and socket for a low power 12 V, 20 watt projector lamp. I covered the reflecting mirror next to the lamp with a white piece of diffusing plastic. This acts like a white background for the slides. I had to hack saw open the projector lens assembly and use only the 1" lens at the back of the projector lens assembly. This is used to focus the slide to infinity focus. The original projector lens tube holds this lens and is adjustable for focusing the slide to infinity focus.

I point the camera inside the projector where the 1" lens is focused on the slide to infinity focus. Since the camera will focus to infinity the slide fills the field of view. The neat thing is that you still use the Carousel and advancing controls. It copies slides super fast and I don't plan on using a slide projector anymore. I just advance the Carousel and then snap each photo. (Super fast) It is many times faster than a slide scanner and with

my Nikon 4 Mega Pixel camera the quality is super clear.

I wanted to buy such a system, as my slide scanner is very slow, but nobody makes one. I guess that is why I thought this up. We are really enjoying retirement. It is very rewarding to be helping the Bible Translators here. I hope this will be used to help many tell about their past work in Bible Translation. Years ago everyone took slides and now they want these old slides stored on computers.

The photo is of the system. The power supply at left brings 12 VDC in on the red jack for the new lamp. The camera is mounted where the projector lens would be on the right and is powered by a small plug-in power supply (8 Volts) so you don't have to be changing batteries. A 1 GB card will store about 1000 slides at 4 MP. This past month, I have copied over 8000 slides for 7 different Bible Translators and I have a long waiting list to copy more for other members.

August 2006 update from the Poeschels - What a month July and so far August have been.

As some of you may have heard on the news Happy Camp and surrounding area experienced several days of severe weather storms. A number of fires were started and some are still going at this time. Other than the smoke it reminds me of the fires in 1987. Many fire crews from all over the west coast were brought in and fire camps were set up in different places. The seniors, who used to eat their meals in the old elementary school gym get their meals and eat in a different location since fire crews are using the gym for sleeping quarters.

On Friday evening, August 4, a Sikorsky 64 sky crane that was used for sucking water out of the river to put on the fires crashed with two men on board. Both probably died instantly. As a chaplain with the local sheriff's department I went to the scene to see if I could be of help. I talked with a husband and wife that lived across the road from the accident. They saw the entire accident take place. Needless to say it was a difficult experience for them.

On Saturday I went back down to the scene (15 miles down river) and was there when they recovered the bodies of the two men

While this is one of the harder parts of being a chaplain, I thoroughly enjoy doing ride-alongs with the local deputies. It has given me a deeper appreciation for what these men and women do. It also gives me an opportunity to get to know them better and as I do they are beginning to open up to me, sharing some parts of their personal and job related struggles. One of the deputies is a Christian so we have much more in common to talk about as we spend 3 or 4 hours together. I would ask prayer for safety for the firefighters and for our law enforcement.

Several other prayer requests are:

- For an Indian man who wants to do what is right in God's eyes but struggles with many of the same things other Indian (and white people) do. Today he stopped to tell me he was able to resist the temptation to drink. He was so happy that he was

able to resist and so was I.

- For Virginia and her medical needs. Maybe soon now she can get started on getting some of her needs taken care of before they get much worse.

- For our Lighthouse Club as we start again in September.

Several praises are:

- 1) Several years ago we asked you to join with us in prayer for more men to come to church. We are beginning to see this prayer answered.
- 2) Church finances are picking up a bit.
- 3) Several men want to get baptized.
- 4) Jerry is driving a water truck on one of the fires. Hopefully he will be doing more of this as long as there are fires.

Virginia and I are looking forward to getting away for a little while. We will not be driving many miles, but have opted to go toward the coast and spend our time in forest service campgrounds. We want to thank each of you who have so faithfully been praying for us and the work here in Happy Camp, and for those of you who have generously given to help meet our needs. Our prayer for you is that the Lord Himself will richly reward you as you continue to serve Him.



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Silent keys

Rev. Ralph Ohling, WB7OOL

"Ralph's habit, as long as I knew him, was to get up early enough to spend an hour in prayer and Bible reading every morning." So wrote Maxine



Ohling of her husband of 51 years, Rev. Ralph D. Ohling, 83, who passed away March 15, 2006. Maxine continued by writing, "every time I think of him, I just say 'Thank you, Jesus, for giving me such a loving husband.'"

Ralph was born July 7, 1928, in Seattle (WA) and

graduated from Grant High School in Portland (OR). He attended Oregon State University from 1941 to 1943. In June of 1943 he entered the U.S. Army and served until March of 1946. While overseas he became a Christian and felt called to the ministry to help others come to know Jesus. He attended Willamette University from 1946-1948. He then finished his education at Asbury Theological Seminary receiving a Master in Divinity degree in 1951.

In 1951 he was appointed pastor at the Alpine and McFarland (OR) United Methodist Churches. It was at Alpine that he met and married Maxine Larkin. Ralph served as pastor at Oregon churches in LaGrande, Monroe, WestLinn, Rainier, Veneta, Amity and McCabe, Drain and Yoncalla, Shedd and Halsey, and Goldhill and Upper Rogue. He retired in 1987 and moved to Salem and later moved to Newberg and then to Gresham.

His hobbies included photography, but his favorite hobby was ham radio. He was a member of ARMS and loved to talk on his radio whenever he


could. He also enjoyed jogging 3 times a week until his health declined and then he turned to walking.

Long-time friend Julian "Mac" Pike, W7SDS, shared that "Ralph was a dear friend for over 50 years. In the late '70s he told me had gotten his ham ticket. My first contact with him was on January 3, 1978. I introduced him to ARMS and it helped make ham radio his favorite hobby. We had numerous and frequent contacts over the years and we got together right along when we visited in Oregon."

Ralph is survived by his wife Maxine Ohling, a son, Timothy Ohling; his two daughters, Deborah Ohling and Rebekah McCallum. His last whispered words to his wife were, "I love you so very much."

Ernest "Ernie" Wendell Byggdin, 91, passed into Glory on March 10, 2006. He was born April 23, 1915 in Craik, Saskatchewan and grew up on a prairie farm.

Early on Ernie's managerial skills were recognized and he began a career with Macleods Hardware Store. He was soon transferred to

Neepawa, Manitoba, to manage a store. This career lasted for the next 25 years with moves to Calgary, Weyburn and Melfort, except for 2 years when he served in the Royal Canadian Navy stationed in Shellburne and Halifax, Nova Scotia during WW II. He was out in charge of food supplies for the crew on his ship. He spent time on the HMCS Mahone, which was a minesweeper used to protect the Atlantic coast line from Sydney to Shellburne.

His next career began in 1967, when he accepted a position to sell life insurance for Mutual life of Canada in Melfort. He continued to work for them for the next 14 years until he retired. At that time he and his first wife, Adelaine, moved to Abbotsford. She passed away in March of 1991.

Don Berggren, KØOAV

Don was born May 28, 1932 in Henning, Minnesota to Herman (KØGSZ) and Nina Berggren. He was their only child. Don's father was a grain-elevator operator and the family moved frequently during his elementary years as his father's assignments changed. Don attended grade school in Henning, Thief River Falls, and Wadena, Minnesota. The family settled in Jamestown, North Dakota where Don finished grade school and graduated from high school.

Don accepted Christ as his Savior and was baptized as a child while they lived in Thief River Falls. He was active in the Baptist Church in Jamestown. He met his wife to be of 50 years at

Camp Joy summer Bible camp. They were both 16. He fell in love with her at first sight and told his mother when he got home that Barbara was going to be his bride. Eight years later they were wed on June 2, 1956. After graduating from high school, Don attended Bethel College for a year and a half before joining the Navy. He went through electronics school at the Great Lakes Naval Academy and then spent three years on a destroyer on a round-the-world tour that included duty around Korea.

When his enlistment expired Don returned to Bethel and graduated with a degree in science education in 1960. While at Bethel in the late 1950s, Don sponsored the HAM radio club and mentored many younger HAM radio enthusiasts. He completed a Master's in Chemistry from Fargo, North Dakota State University in 1966. Don continued on in his advanced education throughout his life. He loved learning as much as he loved teaching.

After graduating from Bethel Don taught in the Mounds View Public Schools and then accepted a position with the St. Paul Schools. He served at Washington High School and later Johnson High School where he taught science and math. He spent his last several years working with students thru the Prepare St. Paul work/study program. Many of his students told him that he was the only adult that ever listened to them. He became both their teacher and their mentor. He retired in 1993. Don's lifelong hobby has been in amateur radio, especially as a member of the Amateur Radio Missionary Service, assisting missionaries in communication with loved ones back home. Don served for a time as vice president of the midwest group. Growing up, his son Paul assisted him by holding solder for radio building kits and later earned his own call sign KBØOWW. As "vanity" signs became available, Paul took on KØGSZ, the call sign of Don's father.

Don has been a member of the Gideons International for 16 years. They met every Saturday for prayer. His favorite ministry was to give out New Testaments at the U of M and at area high schools. He often said that his faith grew into

a deeper personal relationship with the Lord when he joined the Gideons. Faith in action.

His family, five grandchildren, travel, sailing, golf, and the ARMS Net filled the days after retirement. Always ready to participate, Don enjoyed every day as a unique adventure in life. Arizona became his favorite winter address and warm weather HAM shack. His friendships transcended age, time, and continents. His coffee cup and radio were always warm and ready to be shared with others - as was his life.

Don died September 11, 2006 due to complications arising from chronic leukemia and will be missed by his wife Barb, daughter Julie Berggren Laroche, son Paul, their families, and many friends.



Within the last five years, many mission organizations have come to the realization that to accomplish their goals of evangelizing the world partnering with each other is key. One of the main ingredients to making Wycliffe's Vision 2025 succeed, in addition to partnering with other missions, is partnering with nationals, teaching them the art of translation and sharing our technology with them.

With mission aviation eventually making the transition to turbine powered aircraft we are realizing the technology is much bigger and more expensive than any one group can take on by itself. Over the last several years we have been working more and more with other groups to help them as they in turn, help us. This "partnering" has gone beyond mission organizations and into the corporate aviation community as Christian owned companies get involved.

Early in the years JAARS teamed up with Samaritans Purse to help them refurbish a second Beech Craft King Air for work in Alaska. The aircraft will mainly be operated by another mission organization called MARC (Mission Aircraft Repair Center) located in Soldotna.

The project, was without a doubt, the largest ever undertaken by our shop here in Waxhaw. We gained valuable experience in the process which will help us in the future as we

maintain our turbine aircraft in the field.






