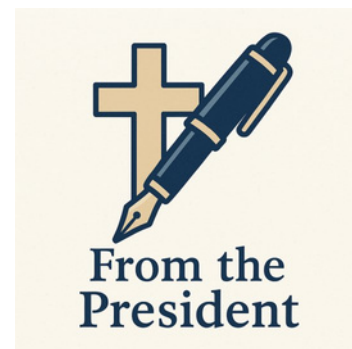

Personal Background, Training, and Ministries (Revised August 22, 2025)

Rev. and Mrs. David E. Newell

Dave Newell

In 1959, Dave enrolled in the Missions Program at Philadelphia College of Bible (PCB), Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He became involved in the Radio Club which operated K3CBM, the home station of the Amateur Radio Missionary Service (ARMS). In 1962, he passed the FCC test, was issued Amateur Radio Operator License WA4DUP, and operated the K3CBM radio station. After graduating from PCB with a B.S. degree in Bible in 1963, he enrolled in Philadelphia Wireless Technical Institute and studied Radio Electronics for two years.

Anna Gay Chapman

In 1961, Anna Gay received her Diploma after graduating from Appalachian Bible Institute, now Appalachian Bible College, Bradley, West Virginia. She then studied Nursing for two years at King's Daughters Hospital, Ashland Kentucky. In 1963, she enrolled in the Missions Program for one year at Philadelphia College of Bible as a special student. Anna Gay had studied Music on the Accordion and was an accomplished musician. On July 11, 1964, Dave and Anna Gay were married in her home church, Grace Gospel Church, Huntington, West Virginia.

Missionary Service

On February 10, 1966, Dave was ordained to the Gospel Ministry by his home church, Cheltenham Baptist Church, Dresher, Pennsylvania. Dave and Anna Gay began their missionary service with Trans World Radio (TWR) on May 30, 1966, on the island of Bonaire, Netherlands Antilles. Dave was issued call sign PJ9BG by the Antillean government. Daughter Gaylene and son Philip were born on Bonaire in 1971 and 1973, respectively.

In 1974, Dave completed a correspondence course with Cleveland Institute of Electronics and received a Diploma in Broadcast Engineering. On January 7, 1975, while on furlough, he passed the FCC exam and was issued the First-Class Commercial Radiotelephone Operator License by the Federal Communications Commission.

In 1975, Dave and Anna Gay were transferred to the island of Guam in the Western Pacific to help develop and construct the Trans World Radio studio and transmitter facilities. Dave operated his ham station using call sign KG6JFW. While living there, Dave and Anna Gay helped establish the Pacific Independent Bible Church, Agana, Guam. Daughter Holly was born on Guam in 1979.

In 1984, Dave and Anna Gay were transferred to the Trans World Radio Headquarters...



in Chatham, New Jersey. In 1987, they changed missions and moved to Madison, Georgia, to serve with Source of Light Ministries International (SLM). In 2005, they were seconded to Neighborhood Gospel Missions (NGM), sold their house, and moved to Lexington, Georgia, to establish the NGM Home Office and begin the construction of the camp/conference center.

In 2011, Dave published his autobiography titled "My Journey Through the Myopic Zone." In 2013, Dave and Anna Gay moved back to Madison. In 2017, through God's miracle, they bought back the very same house where they lived from 1987 to 2004. They both enjoy playing their mountain dulcimers.

On May 31, 2016, after 50 years of missionary service, Dave and Anna Gay transitioned into retirement mode, but they continued to assist in SLM and NGM ministries. Dave serves on the NGM Board of Directors. In April 2023, the Newells sold their house and moved 5 miles to a retirement community. Their address is: 1600 Bethany Road, Unit 3028, Madison, GA 30650. They are blessed with 8 grandchildren and 4 great grandchildren.

On May 23, 2025, Dave experienced a heart attack and received 2 stents to clear the blockages. He and Anna Gay are now limited in

assisting with NGM and SLM ministries. Dave continues as NGM Mission Consultant and serves on the NGM Board. On August 13, 2025, Source of Light Ministries had a reception for the Newells and presented them with a Certificate recognizing their 9 years of ministry after retirement. Dave is now undergoing Cardiac Rehab therapy 3 times a week.

Anna Gay has taught Good News Clubs for island and missionary kids. She has used her music abilities with her accordion and vibraharp to provide instrumental accompaniments for TWR program productions on Bonaire, and she has participated in choir groups, singing in the English, Spanish, and Portuguese languages for the radio broadcasts. Anna Gay introduced and coordinated the use of Source of Light Bible study correspondence courses for listener follow up to the TWR broadcasts from Guam. In 2007, Anna Gay took a Spanish course at the University of Georgia to improve her speaking and writing abilities. She enjoys reading, quilting, and birdwatching.

As an accomplished artist, Dave has worked with oils, India ink, and lecturers chalk using an easel with black light to illustrate his messages. He has drawn a series of cartoon strips titled "Life with Amos," for The Bonaire Feedback (TWR, Bonaire, N.A.). He...



has written many editorials and articles for The Reaper (SLM, Madison, Georgia). Dave has a special interest in trains and depots, especially those of the former Louisville and Nashville Railroad, and he is a member of the L&N Historical Society. He was named “Alumnus of the Year 2000” by Philadelphia Biblical University (formerly Philadelphia College of Bible and currently Cairn University). Dave continues to be active in ham radio, using call sign WA4DUP, and checks into the weekly ARMS Southeastern Net.

North West Section Report

My name is Jim Thurston, and I am one of the ARMS participating members, although I live outside the USA. Even though I am 10,000 miles from the US. I have been appointed as the NW Section Director, and I wanted to take a moment to introduce myself. My call sign is XQ3PC.

Our mission headquarters is located in Ferndale, Washington, and I was born and raised in Washington, where my grandparents homesteaded in Renton, WA. Currently, I am the oldest working missionary in Chile, of all denominations, and in December, I will have completed 60 years in Chile and 63 years in the ministry.

In 1956, while I was in high school in Bremerton, Washington, every boy had to take a shop. Some took Wood or Metal Shop, but I took Radio Shop. Every day at the beginning of class, we would have 15 minutes of code practice. The teacher encouraged us to go to Seattle to the Federal Building and take the FCC amateur radio test. I did that, and I received the call sign WN7IBB. Soon thereafter, I began building my own transmitter in radio class, using an 807 tube in the final, which produced approximately 35 watts. I built a 40-meter dipole in our backyard. After I had the transmitter, I needed a receiver. With the money I earned by selling newspapers, I soon

had enough to purchase a National 125 receiver. That was my beginning.

A few years later, it was time to upgrade to general. Harry Lewis, W7JWJ, SK, who was a great teacher, offered classes at a community college in Edmonds. I took the Bremerton-Seattle Ferry, a one-hour ride to Seattle, to attend his class once a week. During the ferry ride, I stayed in the car and practiced listening to the code on tape, getting me up to the required 13 WPM. Soon after that, I was able to pass the general test, and I received the call sign WB7VRO. (Very Reliable Operator) I have both a US and Chile call sign.

Skip ahead a few years, and I was off to College. After graduating from Seattle Pacific College with a degree in Education, the World's Fair came to Seattle. However, during the summer months, to earn money for the next school year, I worked at the Northwest Steel Mill in Ballard. The big project they were working on, and I had the privilege of helping them build, was the Seattle Space Needle. For the two summers, I cut and cut rebar for the base of the Space Needle, over 230 metric tons of reinforcing steel.

The summer after the Fair, I was invited to visit Arrowhead Springs, the

headquarters of Campus Crusade. (CRU) At that time, God showed me that He wanted me to work in evangelizing University Students. I was assigned to work at the University of Oregon for 1 ½ years, and then in 1964, I was sent to Southern Oregon College, a small school in Ashland, Oregon to start the work there. That year, God greatly blessed, and 10% of the school indicated they had received Christ and seven entered into the full time ministry.

All that time, I was not on the air, but I did have my faithful National 125 receiver. The following summer, the Latin American Crusade director asked me if I would be willing to go to Chile to help start the work there. To help buy my plane ticket, I sold my radio receiver, which I received only \$35 for, and my second big purchase, a Raleigh bicycle, which I had owned since I was 13 years old.

Once I got my feet on the ground, I began working on obtaining my Chilean radio license. It is basically the same process as the US, but they add one more thing: time. The radio, electronic material is about the same, but after your novice, you need to wait one year before you can upgrade to

technician. Then you need to wait two years before you can upgrade to general, and then three more years before advancing to a superior class, equivalent to an extra class test in the US. Presently, 10,641 people have a radio license in Chile. Of that number, only 128 have the superior or extra class license, of which I am one.

In Chile, I have started three different radio clubs—two for Chileans and one for US citizens. For the US people, we were able to conduct FCC radio tests, but over the last few years, those who held a US license have left Chile, and I am currently the only one remaining. During that time, I ran many phone patches for missionaries.

I enjoy radio contests, and I have a contest station, which is my second station at my beach house 1/8 of a mile from the Pacific Ocean in El Quisco. My antenna is a 7 element HF Cushcraft at 70 feet. My HF antenna at my Santiago station is a 6 element Mosely at 65 feet. My favorite contest is the ARRL International DX phone. I have done exceptionally well over the years. In 11 years, I have won eight first-place awards for Chile, three second-place awards, which included five fourth-place awards for South America, and one fifth-place award. I learned about ARMS from the ARRL QST magazine, and I became a member, I believe, in 2011. I tried and tried to check into the net for various years, but gave up due to the distance between Chile and the US, the time, and the band conditions, it was never possible. In 2015, while I was on furlough in Bremerton, WA, I decided to try to make personal contact with those in the Washington area. I wrote emails to those who were close to where I was staying. Only one responded, and that was STU, K7ALM, and we were able to get together. In 2018, Stu, Roland, Mike, and I were able to get together in Bellingham for lunch. Our friendship has been terrific.

We started an ARMS meeting on Zoom, but it was not ideal at the beginning, as there were time limits. We then switched to the Microsoft program, which was worse. Since I am the President of JET Mass Media, a non-profit, I was able to obtain a paid version of Zoom at a significant discount, which our Mission covered. This allows us to be on air for any amount of time, even more than 24 hours, without needing to shut down. It has really helped our fellowship time together, and at times, I have chatted for more than three hours with a member after the others have

signed off. This was the answer we were looking for, and it has proved to be the right program for our group. We now have all the bugs worked out.

We have at least 12 members of ARMS from all over the US, including Canada and Chile who meet every Monday. There are more in the group but some are not regulars. The program will allow us to have over 200 attending the meeting at one time. We are a long ways from that, so we have lots of room to grow. It is nice to have fellowship with no noise, poor band conditions, or for those who no longer have a radio or antenna. It is even nicer to be able to see each other. One of the main goals of ARMS is fellowship, and this mode allows us to have it with members from any where in the world at any time.

This is a personal invitation to all ARMS members, to join the ARMS video group on Zoom every Monday at 23:00 UTC. If you know of anyone in our organization who is unable to communicate via ham radio on a daily basis or has problems to get on the air, please share their name with us. We will then reach out to them and include them in our activities.

WHAT IS ARMS?

The Amateur Radio Missionary Service is a fellowship of committed Christian radio amateurs and associates who are dedicated to serving missionaries, their families, friends and ministries.

ARMS is a non-denominational non-profit organization from all walks of life throughout the world.

It was founded March 2, 1957 at the Philadelphia School of the Bible, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. One of the early functions of ARMS was to provide phone patch communication between missionaries and their families and friends. With the advent of the Internet and mobile phones, that function has largely disappeared.

We still meet on the air for fellowship, to share Scripture and prayer concerns, to assist missionaries, and to present a positive witness for Christ on the amateur bands.

The ARMS motto is taken from the Bible in Galatians 6:10 "Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers."

Also, we see in 1Co 1:9: "God is faithful, by whom ye were called unto the fellowship of his Son Jesus Christ our Lord."



Canada Section Report



Greetings from British Columbia:

With fall in the air it is my honour to share what the Lord has been doing in my life over the past few months.

Most of you know of my sea-faring experience since September 2023. Having purchased a 40' Cabin cruiser, which I named The MV-Maranatha, and became my residence (QTH) until the sale of her the last week of September this year.
