

MINUTES OF THE NATIONAL ARMS MEETING

The first National (International) meeting of the Amateur Radio Missionary Service convened Saturday June 5, 1965 at the Winona Lake Hotel, Winona Lake, Indiana. The morning session was opened with singing led by K3JRD with K3RYV at the organ. Devotional prayer was offered by WØQCB.

ARMS president Don Birx, K3RYV keynoted the meeting with the ARMS theme verse from Gal. 6:10 and addressed the group with inspiring remarks based on Hebrews 13: 1-3, 7 & 16, setting before us the philosophy and attitudes that have motivated and directed the activities of the ARMS organization.

The minutes of the March quarterly ARMS meeting held at the Philadelphia College of Bible, ARMS headquarters, were read by K3RYV in the absence of W3EAN, Gene Reynolds, secretary.

The new officers elected by the mail ballot to serve National ARMS as reorganized under the revised Contution were introduced by president Don Birx with exception of the treasurer, Frank Sanson, W3RVY. ank and Emily, W3GNS (Good News of Salvation) were moving to Bethany Beach, Delaware and unable to attend. The meeting was turned over to the new ARMS president, W2RJQ, Leonard Van Saun. Vice President WIGQK, Bob Dickinson and Secretary KØELX, Mary Elizabeth Rittgers were present.

The Midwest section report was given by WØQCB, Francis Finck, chairman, citing the problems associated with its continued repid growth, and pointing out the value of the Cross Country and Four Corners Missionary nets to the ARMS traffic operation. WIGOK presented the New England report, reading a letter submitted by KIGUR, Harold Goss, who called to our attention the need for more extensive programmed and systematic monitoring of missionary schedules, and stressed the importance of publicizing ARMS to the mission boards and individual missionaries. He challenged ARMS members to greater sacrificial service. VE3AX, Lloyd of London, reported on the Canadian Sextion activity. Formation of a Central ARMS Section was discussed by K8HHK, Don Cronemeyer, who reported on the activities of the group in the Michigan, Illinois, Indiana and Ohio areas. Organization of the Mid-Atlantic Section was planned for June 19 at Camp W. D. I., Glen Spey, N.Y. directed by Jim Vaus, WB2IWL.

K3RYV reported that incorporation papers had been drawn up in New Jersey after the general concensus of opinion among the members was favorable toward such a move. K3JRD, George Jackamonis submitted the treasurer's report. The morning session was adjourned for the noon meal which was enjoyed together in the hotel dining room.

VE3AX opened the afternoon session with a demonstration of Toteteach built by Hamilton Powell for use on the mission field. We heard the recorded voice of Wm. Allen Vean reading Psalm 117. K8HHK conduct ed devotions as is done on the Sunrise Bible Study on 3913 kc., each one present participating.

Problems of establishing a daily Intercontinental net were discussed. 21.390 and 14.268 were chosen as frequencies with the suggestion that a daily 20 meter net be tried at 2400Z. Formal traffic handling was encouraged to increase efficiency and improve the net image. K9IEL, John Benson of the Winona Lake Light & Life Press offered to print forms for ARMS traffic similar to the ARRL form.

WIGOK was appointed to form a committee to study and bring recommendations for section boundaries.

The session was opened for discussion and each member was called upon for comments. The group felt the meeting was very profitable and that an annual National (International) ARMS meeting such as this would be desirable. It was decided to send \$10 to the ARRAL for their building fund as a token of appreciation for the work they have done which has assisted ARMS in its outreach.

It was moved that the secretary send a letter of thanks to Don Birx in appreciation for his dedicated service to ARMS as president during the past two years.

After the meeting adjourned, K9IEL guided a tour through the Light & Life Press. Following the evening meal, the group met informally to enjoy slides and a presentation of the work in Surinam by Don Draper, PZ1CF. Bob Dickinson showed slides of Trans World Radio who operate powerful missionary broadcast stations in Monaco and Bonaire.

5) General discussion of ARMs presentations and new materials. Also challenge to young people. No decisions.

6) MESSAGE HANDLING – General discussion – agreed that traffic should be handled first and in good style. Favor announdement of traffic when checking into nets, off frequency traffic when appropriate, announdement early checkout times when checking in, formal traffic form and procedure. Not too much enthusiasm on ARRL traffic reporting. WISEJ recommended ten minute message handling instruction per month and five minute net operating instruction per month.

IMPROVING COMMUNICATIONS TO SPEED BIBLE TRANSLATION

Since June 1964, daily schedules have been maintained on RTTY between the JAARS International Headquarters at Waxhaw and the Wycliffe Jungle base at Yarinacocha, Peru. This has been an experimental link with Waxhaw transmitting and Yarinacocha receiving only. Just recently additional equipment has been shipped to Peru which will enable them to transmit RTTY also. Due to the expert advice and help of Victor Poor, K3NIO, this project has been a success. We are now ready to engineer a link between the Yarinacocha base and the Wycliffe office in Lima, Peru. Plans are being made to install an RTTY link with our bases in Bolivia, Ecuador, Columbia, Brazil and Alaska to Waxhaw. Also similar links within these fields from base to city office are desired. Our New Guinea and Philippine branches are also interested.

This type of communication plays an important part in increasing the efficiency of our overall work. Receiving the messages in written form saves much operator time and gives less chance for errors or misunderstanding. Operating with auto-start permits immediate contact without the presence of an operator.

The Johnson Viking "Five Hundred" transmitter, usi a separate FSK oscillator driver, is functioning quite satisfactorily. Crystal controlled receivers are constructed from International Crystal add-oncircuits. The model 1200 FSK Demodulator manufactured by Frederick Electronics Corp. is an ingenious converter being made available to us reasonably. The mechanical equipment which is filling the need best presently is teletype model 19 equipment consisting of a model 15 page printer with keyboard and tape punch and a transmitter-distributor (tape reader). Other older models could be incorporated; however, this set-up seems tobe most praxtical for our operation now. Perhaps in the future later model equipment will be available. Lack of equipment is holding up installation of the RTTY links mentioned above and as the Lord provides we shall move ahead. A complete set of this equipment for each station totaling about twenty-four sets will be needed.

The antenna here at Waxhaw is a Sterba curtain array hanging between two 100 ft. towers provided by a Canadian friend. The Waxhaw—Yarinacocha RTTY link is on 21.1 mc. and we invite ARMS RTTYers with traffic to join us.

A Wycliffe Bible Translators Amateur Radio Club has been organized and a club station call applied for.

*Bob Dickinson, WIGQK has just reurned from a trip to Bonaire, Netherlands Antilles where he and his wife Jessie, visited the station of Trans World Radio. He reports that the installation is all ultra modern equipment whose size rivals any private station in the world. Two 1600 kw. Deisel generators power a 500,000 watt broadcast transmitter, a 250,000 watt and a 50,000 watt short wave transmitter which drive antennas to cover North and South America, Europe, Africa and Russia. Broadcasts are made in ten languages. The station now involves about 100 people including families, but the technical people are working long hours for lack of adequate help. Due to the size, complexity and newness there are still some technical problems but the amount of down time is at a bare minimum. The results have been absolutely amazing. Letters are coming by the basketful even though most programs give the address of the producers, the mail from the Spanish programs along is averagaing about 300 letters per week. Many of these letters tell of people being saved and request Bibles, literature and correspondence courses.

While on the island Bob stayed with Dick Olson, PJ2BE who has recently gotten on the air and is the only hame presently licensed on the island. The island itself has bout 6,000 inhabitants some of whom are Dutch and the rest natives, Dutch, English, and Popumento languages are spoken. The island is quite barren with goats, sheep and cactus being the bulk of the wild life with lizards and a few scorpions thrown in.

Bob Says that the whole mission is a glory to God and is reaching many otherwise unreachable with the Gospel."

"SPECIAL SERVICE OF ARMS - - - Recently Rev. Ed. Barram of the CBMFS was to travel from his home in Londonderry, N.H. to give a commissioning service for a missionary couple in Auburn, N.Y. Due to a heavy snow on Saturday night, attendant car and health problems and subsequent lack of time he was unable to make the trip. He called WIGQK who in turn contacted WA2CYO in North Syracuse, N.Y. With the Scheduled amateur hook-up, Rev. Barram recorded his message which was transmitted on 75 meters by WIGQK, received and recorded by WA2CYO and given to Pastor John Michaels of the Emmanuel Baptist Church, Auburn, N.Y. in time for the evening service."

During the year I have had almost daily contact with our mission station in the Congo. I talked with 905 KC (Billy Davis) on 15 meters with a frequency of 21.385 kc. We continue to use this frequency and talk from 12:00 to 1:00 P.M. EST. When I return I will have a new transmitter and receiver that should help us a great deal in consistently getting through. They are a Hallicrafter HT-44 transmitter, Heathkit SB 200 linear (1200 watts pep), anda SX117 receiver. The antenna is a Mosley TA 33. We have sent out already the aircraft transceiver that uses two meters and give us a range of 50 to 200 miles from the plane to the mission stations. We are trying to get three transmitters for the ADF gear.

The work of the hospital is increasing all the time. We now are assuming the care of an area 400 miles wide and 600 miles long. There are over 500 major operations yearly. The patients frequently find that they have no place to stay except the cold hard cement floor. Imagine after walking many miles to the hospital, weak and tired, the only place is on the floor. Some people are coming even longer distances by train and bus. They come from as far as Elisabethville which is over 600 miles away.

A good Methodist layman, Moise Tshombe, who became premier has thrust the communists from the Congo. Mr. Tshombe's trust in God and his faithin our Lord continue to guide his work in the government. It is hoped that missionaries will soon be returned to the Central Congo.
