
A SECOND CAREER

It has been good to talk with you from here in the jungle at Yarinacocha. We are here for two years and possibly longer if it is the Lord's will.

My main job is maintaining the base station here at the center. The station operates with an output power of 1 KW, and we use 5.340 MHz for tribal communications and 6.708 MHz for aircraft communications. I also maintain approximately 40 Stoner solid state SSB radios that are used by Bible translators. They use storage battery power, and solar panels are used for recharging the batteries.

I am taking over some of the engineering for a new Christian FM station here in the jungle. All of this work becomes a new challenge when compared to being a broadcast engineer for a commercial television station. All of this is a really new experience in trusting the Lord to supply our needs after 30 years of working in commercial electronics. Since arriving in Peru, we have seen the Lord more than meet all of our expenses. We arrived here just in time, as Wycliffe had a critical need with some problems in their base transmitters.

I was given a Stoner radio to repair for Swiss Indian Mission. The radio had a lot of damage, as it had been hit by lightning. I spent several days replacing parts, but our

radio department was short one part that was needed to complete the repair. The interesting thing is that I had packed and brought from home a small box of radio parts that I thought might be useful until our shipment arrived in Peru. It turned out that because of the Lord's provision, I had brought the exact part that was needed to complete the repair.

I was able to make a trip to Iquitos to install the radio and antenna system for Don Bernardo Ferreira, our buyer there. Iquitos is a city of 400,000 people located on the Amazon River about 300 miles northeast of here. The Lord worked out all of the details so that Marinelle was able to go with me. It is a 45-minute flight by commercial airline. This was a really new experience for both of us since we were forced to rely completely on our limited knowledge of Spanish.

The new radio and dual antenna system is designed so that Don Bernardo can communicate directly with our translators. The radio can be switched to another frequency allowing him to talk to the boats that are carrying our supplies on the Amazon river.

We enjoyed spending the weekend with Don Bernardo and his family in their home. This was our first experience in living and eating meals with a Peruvian family. We also attended church with them at the Christian and Missionary Alliance Church in downtown Iquitos, where Don Bernardo is chairman of the board.

Christmas Eve was extra special for our neighbors, Rol and Furne Rich. After more than 30 years of intense study and many discouragements, along with seeing the Lord change lives, Rol and Furne have completed the Arabela New Testament. The completion of a New Testament is always an important time at our Center. Since we had the opportunity to get to know our friendly neighbors (they are also our U.S. neighbors, coming from Oregon and Washington), we were especially joyful.



AN EARLY RETURN

Ed, KØEL, and Carol, KDØVW, Lee have just recently returned from Haiti after a stay of only two weeks. Because of the present political situation there, visitors were requested to return to the United States for the duration.

Ed and Carol had gone to the West Indies as short-term missionaries to work with West Indies Self Help, also known as WISH. WISH has many projects on the island of La Gonave, such as building churches, schools and roads; and they run a dental clinic three or four times a year. Food, both physical and spiritual, is supplied for the people, and there is freedom to distribute literature in the native language, Creole.

Ed worked with the well-drilling team, carried food up the mountain for the road-building crews and performed maintenance work on the mission compound. Carol helped in the dental clinic during the time they were there.

Ed mentioned that he had only one ham contact while they were in Haiti. He talked with HH2KR, who was in Port au Prince.

In closing his letter Ed quoted from Matthew 25:35, 40: "For I was hungry, and ye gave me food. . . . And the King shall answer and say unto them, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me" (NSRB).

A POEM FROM DOWN UNDER



Besides the Scouting, Gene held offices in the three different churches that he and Anne had attended. He had been Treasurer, Deacon, Financial Secretary and Brotherhood President at different times.

His passing was a tremendous loss to his many friends in the Amateur Radio Missionary Service, and he will always be remembered.
