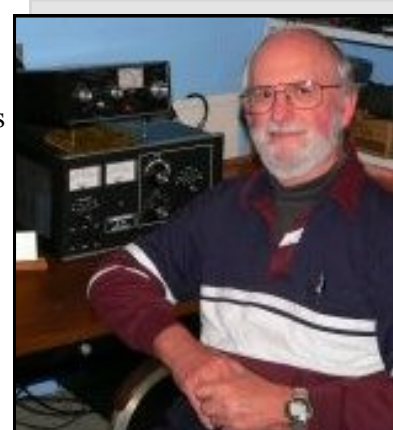
Anyone who would like to take similar displays to ham fests you attend may request information from Tom, AA0LF, and he will be glad to assist you.

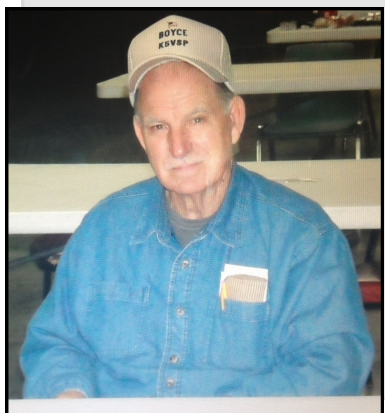


Net Manager Report:

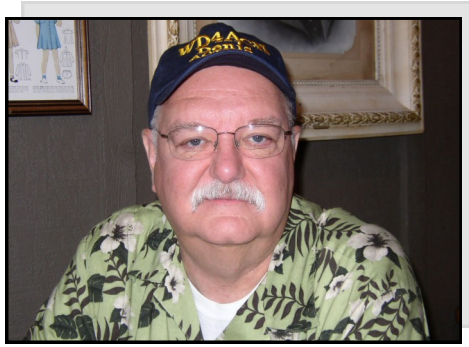


Southeast Section Report:

George Wood, KA7HGE

Bob Hambly, WA7BYD, was on Iwo Jima as a Naval photographer in February of 1945. The Marines fought determined Japanese defenders and would take the Island but at great cost.

On February 23rd five Marines and a Navy corpsman raised the American flag on top of Mt. Suribachi. AP photographer Joe Rosenthal was there and snapped what would become one of the most famous photographs taken during the war years.

Later that day Rosenthal approached a Naval photogra-

pher who had a small dark room and asked if he would develop some film for him. Bob Hambly was that photographer and at the time didn't realize the significance of his skills in developing those negatives.

Later, Joe Rosenthal, would present Bob with a signed copy of that historic event and that framed photograph hangs in Bob and Mae's home in Grants Pass, Oregon.

We averaged about eight check-ins each week including: Chuck, N7AAG, Ora, KE7BF, George, KA7HGE, Dave, W7PTL, Wayne, VA7GF, John, K7BXF, Mike, K7PTL, Bob, WA7BYD, and Wayne, WB7EIF.

A Step back in ARMS history:

Dr. Sam Marx, WB7ARA/SK and his XYL, Grace, served for many years as medical missionaries at the Moravian Clinic in Eastern Honduras. We met when they came back to the states in the 70's and settled near where I was pastoring the Harrah (WA) Grace Brethren Church. We became friends and discovered we both had an interest in amateur radio.

After a time staff needs called them back again to the Clinic in Honduras. We were able to establish contact with them by way of my radio shack, located in an upstairs classroom at the church. The roof held my Gem cubical quad antenna and propagation was great.

Usually the Clinic sent biopsies, pap smears and other tissue samples by mail to a lab in the states. Turn around time could be a month or more. The Lord raised up a Christian pathologist in Yakima, Dr. Jay Johnson, NC7D who did the tests, gave the results to me and I radioed that information to Dr. Sam. We were able to cut the turn around time to less than 2 weeks, which was a blessing to both Dr. Marx and his patients.

In the early 80's the MAF pilot stationed at Ahuas made an unusual request. He told Dr. Sam that he had a small dog that he wanted to have spayed, but the cost in Tegucigalpa was prohibitive. Would Dr. Sam even consider doing that procedure? Sam's reply was he thought they could do it but he would need to talk to a veterinarian. Our little town of Harrah had a vet, whose name happened to be Dr. Harrer! Several phone patches between Harrah and Ahuas gave Dr. Sam the information he needed. Dr. Harrer even advised a visiting anesthesiologist at Ahuas what anesthesia to use.

Dr Sam and his anesthesiologist set up an operating table under an outside lean-to and performed the procedure. A week later I talked with Dr. Sam and he said it all went well but it was a bit harrowing because the organs were so small. Needless to say the MAF pilot was very grateful.

Several months went by and I was ready to sign with Dr. Sam when he said, "By the way, the little dog is pregnant. What happened in the surgical procedure I have no idea."

Missionary Report:

Tim & Gloria Hagquist, KEØQ

Just to bring everyone up to date, Gloria and I officially retired as WorldVenture overseas missionaries to the Philippines on March 31. We are now back in Minnesota and making the transition into a new culture and a new climate. Shoveling snow and wearing long underwear in April was a shock, but we don't regret returning to the town I grew up in, Milaca, which is located about 65 miles north of Minneapolis. We love Minnesota and I don't think the weather and the Minnesota State Bird (the mosquito) will dampen our desire to live here. The Lord has blessed us with a nice home, an exceptional local church, new friends, and great neighbors. He's also opened the doors for a new avenue of ministry as part-time Missions Coaches with WorldVenture in the North Central Region. We'll be working with young couples and singles preparing to serve overseas, and helping local churches strengthen

their mission programs. The Lord is good!

Returning to the U.S. also provides an opportunity to get back into Amateur Radio. Although I had a reciprocal license in the Philippines, I had little time to get on the air. I'm just completing the installation of a 43 foot Zero-Five Vertical Antenna and a radial field (44 radials). I'm also working on setting up my hamshack. Once the antenna is in place I hope to check in to the ARMS Net.



SK Don Jensen, KC7WV

Don Jensen suddenly went to heaven to be with his Savior on Saturday morning March 30 (the day before Resurrection Sunday!) as a result of a brain hemorrhage.

Donald Leslie Jensen was born on February 23, 1942 in Vallejo, California, the oldest of three children, with one brother and one sister. His father, Eiliff Jensen owned a candy making factory and his mother, Lillian worked with his dad and was known for chocolate dipping. Don's mom was Jewish, and before she married his dad, she had studied at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music to be a concert pianist and to teach, but instead dedicated her life to serving her husband and raising her children. Don's mom became a "completed Jew" at the same time that Don was baptized in 1945.

Missionary Report:

Our good friend Gary is responsible for archiving and other things, and he forwarded this story.

Melanie is a Kagayanen speaker who works with translator Jacqueline. Since the Kagayanen New Testament launching in 2008, the Kagayanen team has been working to digitally archive 32 years worth of Kagayanen materials. Recently, Melanie was working in the studio alone on audio file transcription. That day's task turned out to be a re-recorded testimony of another Kagayanen woman named Bing.

At first this tape was no different than any other transcription Melanie had worked on. But then, as she strained to make out the poor quality of the 22-year-old recording—rewinding and re-listening many times—it was like God was repeatedly talking directly to her.

Melanie, too, was pretending to follow Christ, just like Bing on the tape. As Melanie's ears and fingers worked on the transcription, her heart knew what she needed to do. Tears streaming down her face, she gave her life to God, just as Bing had done.

Melanie was only 6 years old when that tape was made. Yet 22 years later, God spoke His love to this Kagayanen and she responded. All because of an archiving task in her own language!

The most significant event in Don's life was a diving accident at the age of 13 1/2, on August 25, 1955. His broken neck left him paralyzed and changed his life forever. Before the injury, he enjoyed swimming, fishing, hiking, horseback riding, and golf, and HE built three Soapbox Derby racing cars with his dad, one of which won the prize for best-constructed car (and was called "The Chocolate Drop"). His mom home-schooled Don for a couple of years, and Don was in and out of high school until he graduated. After the accident, he learned about ham radio and Morse code. Having handled some of his father's bookkeeping, Don realized that business and accounting would be a good direction for his life, so from 1961-1964 he studied by correspondence through International Correspondence School and the International Accounting Society, and took courses in taxation from Golden Gate College in San Francisco. In 1964 Don heard Morris Watkins of Lutheran Bible Translators speak at church, and he learned there was a need for people other than in linguistics.

Don married Margaret Stoelting on July 12, 1969, and in 1971 the couple were accepted by Wycliffe as Short Term Assistants for one year of service in Mexico. In 1973 they were accepted as Members In Training and assigned to the Mexico branch and went to Norman SIL in 1973. Don began serving as an accountant and Margaret taught primary grades in the branch school. David was adopted in 1974, the same year that Don became Finance Office manager. And then in 1978, they adopted Johanna and brought her home on Father's Day! That same year, Don became Supervisor of Services.

In 1979, the Jensen's were among the first to relocate to Tucson when the branch received news that members' visas for work in Mexico would not be renewed, and Don was instrumental in helping to establish the Tucson center. Margaret helped to organize and operate a pre-school in a local church, which benefited many Mexico branch families that had moved to Tucson. Over the years, Don also served the branch as controller, associate director, and treasurer, and assisted many of our members with their taxes and financial planning. In 1997 Margaret left Don and the Mexico branch. In the next few years, the family expanded as their son David married Sarah in 1999, and daughter Johanna (mother of granddaughter Tayler) married Adam Gale in 2000. Don's family later expanded to include another granddaughter, Lily Gale, and two grandsons, Logan and Hunter Jensen.
