EARC BOD has set aside \$2000 from our accounts for a Repeater Fund. The repeater fund is for upgrading repeaters that are owned by EARC. The current plan is to start with Mauna Kapu and get the VHF and UHF units fully operational. Mauna Kapu has Motorola Micro mobiles converted to repeater use. A dual band Comet is on a back up machine and temporary antenna. The comet antenna is full of moss, rust, and collecting water (see picture). The Mauna Kapu UHF is down graded and running at very low power for controlling of repeater. I am awaiting some parts for a temporary UHF control radio to keep the VHF up and take UHF machine off for repairs. The technical team is always looking for help when going to the different repeater sites. We are also taking donations to help with the upgrading on EARC owned repeaters.

January Meeting & Automatic Position Reporting System (APRS)

The January EARC general membership meeting topic was on APRS. We passed out a slide show on APRS by Rick Ching (KH7O) and updated by myself. Here is a little background on the Automatic Position Reporting System (APRS) developed by Bob Bruninga, WB4APR. The System is capable of sending position data worldwide using radio, internet, satellites, ISS, and Special Format similar to packet, Nationally, on 144.39 MHz. Tactical short messages can be sent, without identifying path and World Wide tracking, via internet access. As we went through the topic of APRS a lot of good questions were brought up, followed by a demonstration of a program called APRS+SA. APRS+SA is a program to track APRS station send messages, data, and weather. You can download the program for free, but if you would like the program to keep your settings it costs \$15.00. You also need to have a copy of DeLorme Street Atlas (versions 4 to 9 will only work). Using a ribbon J-Pole, with a Alinco DR-135 and built in TNC, we had a text QSO with Todd (KH7UK) who was in California.

My current mobile station is a VX-150, Tiny Trak 3, and Garmin GPS-18PC. I am using a Alinco DR-135T with built in TNC for data passing from my Laptop. I also have a Kamtronics KPC3+ TNC that can be used as a digapeter.

Treasure's Report

As a part of the February Board Member's meeting, the 2006 budget was voted on and approved. Not much changed over previous years, except \$2,000.00 was allocated to repair our repeaters. The expenditures of the budget total \$3,301.00. While the 2006 projected income is \$1,400.00, primarily from dues, our total assets in the bank are \$11,938.10. \$4,389.78 is in a Scholarship Fund that we cannot touch and the balance is from prior dues collected and not spent. Because of the deteriorating condition of our repeaters, the board voted to spend more than our projected income to insure that our repeaters are up and function for our members.

NET MANAGER REPORT....

STATISTICS - JANUARY 2006: Check Ins: 235, Duration: 600 minutes

Although there were no public service events for the first month of the new year, January proved to be a busy month for our nightly nets. We've had several newly licensed hams check-in to try their new technician class privileges, and since then they have made a regular presence on our repeaters. The net is a great way to get your feet wet into amateur radio and overcome those first-time jitters on the air.

NET SCRIPT CHANGES

When operating mobile, a station may traverse a large area and can quickly move out of repeater range. The net script is being updated to allow mobile stations to check-in and comment before the rest of the net. In addition, the update attempts to simplify the script and gives the Net Control Station (NCS) a variety of tools and options to conduct the net with a slightly different style, if necessary.

The updated script will be rolled out during the fourth week of February.

LOOKING FOR A CHALLENGE?

If you monitored amateur radio communications during the Honolulu Marathon last December, you were probably amazed at how well I was able to maintain my composure in the face of mounting challenges in the command center.

I realized quickly that when it comes down to the real thing, no amount of training prepared me for the deluge of messages that I got that day. Training and constant practice can reduce the problems in the field, but it never produced a problem-free net that I was hoping for during practice.

One of my goals for 2006 is to establish a "2/2" net schedule: 2 operators, 2 nets alternating every other week. This will help prevent burnout and allow others to gain experience as an NCS. As of today, we are about halfway there (3/7 days already have two operators).

As an NCS, you will sharpen your listening and communication skills, learn self-discipline, organizational skills, and people/message management. It's fun, it's easy, and you will gain a lot of respect for the position the next time you're out in the field.

ON STATION IDENTIFICATION... **[This section is separate from Net Manager Report]**

As a reminder, Part 97 Section 119 (Subpart A) of the Federal Communications Commission rules state that:

"Each amateur station, except a space station or telecommand station, must transmit its assigned call sign on its transmitting channel at the end of each communication, and at least every ten minutes during a communication, for the purpose of clearly making the source of the transmissions from the station known to those receiving the transmissions. No station may transmit unidentified communications or signals, or transmit as the station call sign, any call sign not authorized to the station."

So, although stations don't need to identify at the beginning of the conversation, stations must identify at ten-minute intervals thereafter or at the end of the "transaction", whichever comes first. When in doubt -- identify -- even if it means keying up your radio just to drop in your call sign.


