Even if these restrictions do not apply to you, they may apply to a

friend or to a station that might just help you in an emergency.

The EARC will have an informational table at the Ham Radio Swap Meet at Aiea Elementary School on April 3. This event is sponsored by the KARC and EARC and is a project of Warren Munro, KH6WM. Information will be available at the next GM meeting. In the past, these events have been a lot of fun and you just may find that radio or antenna that you have been looking for at a great price.

More than food needed to provide services to hungry

Nestled in Mapunapuna near the airport back behind Delta Communications is Hawaii Foodbank, one of the served-agencies of Amateur Radio emergency communications. In January, I met with Brett Schlemmer, Director of Operations, who is also with Hawai'i State Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD). He took me on a tour of their warehouse operations. It is a huge warehouse bustling with volunteers sorting, inventoring, packaging, and delivering about 37,000 pounds of food a day during their work week.

Brett explained to me that they supply their items to other agencies such as the American Red Cross, the Salvation Army, food pantries, and others. During an emergency, their ability to communicate with the other agencies that provide for shel-

ter management (e.g., American Red Cross) and mass care (e.g., the Salvation Army) may be severely reduced. In addition to their warehouse distribution center and HQ in Mapunapuna, they have three trucks and are associated with the foodbanks on the other islands. I explained how Amateur Radio, especially trained emergency communicators, could help him continue communicating even during an emergency. Since we have too few Amateur Radio emergency communicators (ARES/RACES) to even staff the shelters if they were all opened, I talked to him about the need to develop the communicators in house as HealthComm has done. Brett likes the idea and said that he would be willing to get his amateur radio license. From that beginning, we can help him to develop a vital link in our community of emergency responders. He would be willing to have the EARC tour the facility as one of the General Membership meeting topics. Please let me know what you think about this. Contact me via email: ah6qo@arrl.org. 
