KY SLOW NET REPORT - KO4OL

On behalf of all KSN members, I would like to thank Joe/ k4dzm for his great hospitality for all KYN/KSN members at his house on Sunday after the Lexington hamfest. It was good to fellowship with all of the members. I hope they can generate some more activity on the nets. I would like to have some new stations to train on KSN also. If ten pm is too late for training then we could always do it on KYN also. If ten pm is too late for anyone, then give me some better times to hold it. I know we can't satisfy everyone, but if it will help the nets, then we could always change. We will lose stations if we do, but may pick up some also.

In 2003 we had a total of 2388 check ins, 335 pieces of traffic handled and 365 sessions which equals 6.5 qni per net. The lowest month was December with 144 & 13.

We had stations check in from 24 different states and 2 foreign countries. There were 84 different stations that checked in. manager was to have a newsletter. With Glenn's help in sending KSN news, the help of everyone on the nets in providing news and photos, I believe it may help keep the nets going to some degree. Thanks to everyone for their contributions, and on these two nets we do have some of the finest operators and persons in Amateur Radio.

Email has helped in distribution, and I send it via BCC: to (hopefully) do a little to fight SPAM. If there is no interest in your receiving it, just let me know, and I'll correct the list, with no problem on this end. Recently, I have also been posting the latest copy on the web site. I wish I could get a monthly edition out consistently, but it's probably not going to happen. I do hope to do better than one a year!

LEXINGTON COOKOUT:

Joe Miller, K4DZM, and his wife Carol, hosted a great cookout after the Lexington Hamfest. The weather was great, and 20 ops and wives enjoyed the food at their new home in Lexington. Everyone had plenty of time to eat, chat, and enjoy the fellowship at the cookout. We didn't interfere with anyone else's forum time, nor they with ours. Joe is thinking about making this an annual event, which would be great.

About the only piece of business, besides trying to see if anyone knew of former members whom we might bring back to the net was a discussion of handling traffic. Little enough of it comes along these days, and we discussed trying to originate more real traffic that means something to the recipient. A good opportunity is family or military reunion reminders, or messages to friends in common organizations across the country. Holiday greetings are another good way to increase traffic. I hope all of us will try to originate more traffic of this nature in the future if NTS is to survive.

On the other end, we discussed delivery - I believe, as Joe, K4DZM, pointed out, that we should take traffic, even "Spam," as far toward its recipient as possible. This will exercise the nets as the traffic is meant to do. Several of us have been doing this for a while. If I can't move it in a couple of days, I look up the call for an email, and deliver it that way if possible. Much of it just dead ends when there is no outlet. I don't believe we should phone it in over an extended area.

With that in mind please help move it as close to its destination as possible. Don't feel bad if you're stuck with it, it happens to all of us. You can service the non-delivery, if you wish. I believe there is a lot less of the spam traffic than there was, so some of the spam originators must have gotten the message.

I particularly appreciate the work of WD4IYI, WB4NZS, and K4DZM in going to 9RN. I don't hear 9RN very well at this end of the state in the summer, and don't help much during the qrn season. If you haven't tried 9RN, give a listen on @3640+ khz at 8:45 PM and 10:30 PM. Regional level and up traffic handling is a real hoot, more fun than working DX in my book, because you actually have to copy more than a few characters at higher speed, but I'm afraid the system may be dying.

SICK BAY:

In case you are wondering, ARRL is proposing using WinLink2000 for long haul emergency traffic. Check out Aug. & Sept. QST) This seems to be a combination of vhf packet, unattended hf digital, and the internet. The chief advantage is that the emergency agencies can use their regular email programs and connections to seamlessly communicate during emergencies, with Winlink2000 picking up the holes caused by emergency outages. Hmmmm.....

The only problem I have with it is the use of unattended hf digital devices. This seems to be what is behind the push for determining subbands by bandwidth, it you have been following this seemingly innocuous discussion.

The digital devices will, understandably, be in the present CW subbands. There has been a push for years to get this kind of operation in the subbands. In my opinion, if such operation is to be allowed on a broad scale (it's already done under limited authorization, I believe) there needs to be a digital subband between CW and SSB subbands for its implementation.

I guess we are lucky to still have any subbands.....
