Rules changes for Field Day

Yet another Field Day reminder: PARS will participate in this year's FD from the Senior Center, on the weekend of June 22-23. Antenna setup will commence at 0800, and we'll try to be QRV by 1100. Doug Bell has agreed to be our FD chair this year. Thanks, Doug!

The ARRL has made a couple of notable rule changes this year:

- 1. Stations anywhere in North or South America may compete. Previously, competition was limited to stations in the U.S. and Canada. Stations elsewhere can make contact with FD stations, but aren't eligible for awards.
- 2. The optional "free" Novice station previously accorded to class 2A or larger operations has been replaced with a "Get On The Air", or GOTA station. The intent is to allow Novices, Technicians, and unlicensed club members (with a control operator), and other hams who may be inexperienced at contesting, or whose skills have gotten rusty, to have a radio to call their own. Participating clubs can claim credit for up to 400 QSOs from the GOTA station, on top of a 100-point bonus. The GOTA station must use a separate callsign from the main FD operation.

Herschel Whiting, 1921-2002

Herschel Lloyd Whiting WS7K, ex-WA7IMC, an avid amateur radio operator and formerly of Bellevue, died April 13, 2002. He was born on December 12, 1921 in El Centro, California to Walter Calvin and Mary Agnes (Gleason) Whiting. He was raised on farms in Southern California and near Eugene, Oregon, with five brothers and one sister. At the age of 17 he joined the Civilian Conservation Corps, and in 1940 at the age of 18 began studying airplane construction and maintenance at the Northrop company school. During the Second World War he enlisted in the U.S. Coast Guard, serving on ships guarding North Atlantic convoys and in the South Pacific. At the end of the war he was a third class Petty Officer with a Radarman rating. After the war he continued flying and working on airplanes, indeed flying his own from Southern California to Alaska where he lived for three years. In 1955 he settled in Bellevue, maintaining airliners for Pacific Northwest Airlines (later Western Airlines and now part of Delta). He married the former Janet Murdoch Gow, who predeceased him in 1992, and the couple had five children.

He was bitten by the amateur radio bug and soon antennas began sprouting from his car and his house with one large tower attracting faraway signals as well as lightning bolts. He constructed remotely controlled radio repeaters for mountaintops which pioneered technologies we use today to talk on our cell phones. He was a member of the Puget Amateur Radio Society and donated many hours and parts rebuilding a trailer for their use as a radio station and classroom. He provided backup emergency communications for 911 as a member of the Eastside Amateur Radio Support Team.

Herschel was a true handyman, able to fix or build almost anything, including his own cars, airplane, boat, and radio towers. He was the first to complain about being unable to work on computerized cars. He was extremely talented in the workshop, able to make anything he set his mind to. Projects included a cabin cruiser, in which he cruised several times to Bainbridge Island; an airplane; and a telescope for his son who is now a professional astronomer. He spent many hours puttering around the yard and planting gardens and trees when he retired in 1985, he planted his entire backyard with farm crops he loved from his youth.

Not at all a storyteller, the few incidents in his childhood and his military career known to his children were learned in unguarded moments or from his siblings. He had a very strict code of right and wrong which he followed stubbornly and without hesitation. He strongly opposed any sense of entitlement, but was overwhelmingly generous when he thought the cause worthwhile. The love and support which poured out from all his family and friends during his last illness are a testament to how badly he will be missed.

Herschel was preceded in death by his wife, parents, and two brothers, Warren and Ray. He is survived by his brothers Bernard, Gordon, and Evan; his sister Martha; daughters Marion Dowell, Ann MacGowan, and Susan Kemp; his sons Alan and Stuart KB7UUX; 4 grandchildren: Laurie, Connie, Alissa, and Daniel; and numerous nieces and nephews.

A memorial service will be held at Evergreen Washelli Funeral Home, 11111 Aurora Avenue N, Seattle WA, at 12:00 Noon Saturday April 20. Memorial contributions may be made to the American Diabetes Association. Please sign the on-line guest book at **evergreen-washelli.com**.

Minutes of the PARS general meeting, 18 Apr. 2002

The members met at the Bellevue Senior Center. 8 members were present, a quorum. One visitor also attended. The President and Vice-President were absent. The Secretary brought the meeting to order at 7:12 PM.

After the members had introduced themselves, the Secretary called for a moment of silence in memory of former member Herschel Whiting, WS7K [See the obituary on page 3 - Ed.]

Lynn Burlingame, N7CFO, presented a program in which he recounted his exploits as a VHF roving station, and gave some tips on how to get started in roving. He brought some of his VHF equipment for display.

Following a break, the Secretary called the business meeting to order. The members approved the minutes of the March meeting as published in the April issue of *Sparks*.

Treasurer's report: The Secretary didn't have a bank balance available, but reported that there was a positive balance and no withdrawals during the previous 30 days. [Financial statements are available from the Treasurer - Ed.] He noted that he had ordered the linear amplifier retrofit kit, pursuant to member approval in March, but hadn't yet deducted it from the club account.

Trailer committee: Committee chair Mark Whitaker was absent. The Secretary had installed a new ground rod and wire for the trailer on Apr. 13, in an effort to alleviate the RFI problem plaguing the Senior Center's PA system. He and Dick Schwanke had made some transmitting tests from the trailer on Apr. 16 and had added a filter capacitor to one of the PA amplifiers, but had been unable to complete their tests due to a group that wanted to use the PA at the time.

The President still hadn't installed the new smoke detector or CO detector in the trailer.

Contest: The Secretary noted that the next event, other than Field Day, would be the Washington

Salmon Run in mid-September. He planned to lead a DXpedition to San Juan county for the event. He suggested that PARS could have a second Salmon Run operation from the trailer, if there were some members wanting to work the contest as a group but unwilling to travel to San Juan.

Hamfest: Nothing to report. The Secretary remarked that the club endeavors year-round to collect donated hamfest items.

Field Day: The Secretary discussed some of the details of this year's Field Day operation, and reminded the members that PARS would be operating from the Senior Center this year. Doug Bell agreed to act as Field Day chair, with help from John Heflin.

Old Business: There had been no progress on the new 443.2 repeater controller since the March meeting. PSE liaison Steve Szombathy had turned off the repeater IDer in the wake of Herschel Whiting's passing, since the club had been using Herschel's call for the repeater. The Secretary asked everyone to ID the repeater manually, using the club's K7PAR call, until Steve could hook up the new controller.

New Business: The Secretary announced the names of the members who had agreed to run for office for the '02-'03 club year: Don Hickman for Vice-President, Doug Bell for Secretary, and Van Kichline for Treasurer. Don agreed to run for President if no one else came forward.

The Secretary recounted some of Herschel Whiting's contributions to the club, and noted that he was one of PARS' first Hams of the Year. The members voted and approved purchase of a floral arrangement to be delivered to Herschel's memorial service on Apr. 20.

With no further business, the Secretary adjourned the meeting at 8:48 PM.
