AMATEUR RADIO EXAM CLASSES

Amateur radio has activities to interest everyone. Cell phones, email and instant messaging have NOTHING on amateur radio. Amateurs talk to others around the world, across the country and even to the International Space Station. Some just talk across the state or around the local area. Amateurs 'talk' using voice (like cell phones, except longer distances) or they use their computers (just like email / IM). Some even *like* using Morse code! Amateurs earn **awards** for contacting every state or county in the US or for the most different countries in the world. As they make contacts they exchange QSL cards, which are similar to post cards and are used to confirm a contact with another amateur. Amateurs **collect** albums of these cards from all over the globe. In the process they make **friends** around the world and **learn** about far off places. Do you like to **compete**? Think you can make more contacts in a given time than everyone else? Amateurs have **contests** to see who *is* the best. All in fun of course! Do you like to tinker with electronics? Amateurs do this all the time. Want to **help** your community in times of disaster, at special events or become a storm spotter? Amateurs do this too! **This is just a small part** of what amateur radio is all about. Amateur radio really does have activities to interest everyone.

Amateur Radio Operators (sometimes called 'hams') must earn a license from the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) by taking a simple exam. There are three classes of amateur licenses. The entry level is called 'Technician'. Following the Technician class there are 'General' and 'Extra' class licenses. Each class of license gives the radio amateur additional privileges.

Earning your license is where we can help. The Milwaukee Radio Amateurs' Club (MRAC) offers classes to prepare you for your amateur radio license exam. The entry-level exam is easy and a MRAC class will prepare you to take the exam. Reading assignments are reinforced with class discussion and study of the published question pool. It really is easy! With just a little work you can be on the air in just a few weeks. Classes are usually one 2-hour session a week for six weeks. Students from 8 to 108 are welcome.
