


The program went through various early methods of getting the message through, to modern day technologies. The early laying of cables across the ocean floor was probably the most


Membership Report

Hi to one and all:

The 2014 Slow Spokes Peach of a Ride will be Sun. Aug. 24, 2014.

It's time to start recruiting radio operators to ride in sag vehicles and rest stop operators for the <u>Slow Spokes</u> Peach of a Ride. I am looking for any Ham Radio operators interested in helping with this years event. Here are the details.



The riders like knowing we are out there keeping an eye on things and are available in case of a problem. There will be 23, 32, 60, 100 mile routes.

A mobile radio with mag mount antenna works best for sags. Sag operators will ride with a driver in their vehicle unless you prefer using your vehicle. If you are stationed at a rest stop a mobile rig and an antenna that can be raised 15 or more feet would be good. We may use a simplex frequency as some of the stops are quit a distance. If you have a preference for sag or rest stop I will try to accommodate if the position is not taken.

Meet at Memphis Jr. High School 34165 Bordman Rd. Memphis Mi. 48041 West of Memphis at 7 am. Riders are to be finished by 4pm. Memphis is North of Richmond on M-19.

We will use 147.300 with 100hz.pl., this usually seems to work the best for this area. Also have 146.58 simplex in your radio just in case. Talk in will be 147.200 with 100 hz. pl.

MIQP 2014 is in the Log!

N8LC was on the air for the 2014 Michigan QSO party. Led by "Motivator in Chief" Doug / N8PYN, this year's multi-transmitter multi-operator station was located at Metamora-Hadley State Recreation Area, in Lapeer county. Set up was on Friday, April 18. The weather was sunny and in the high 50's with a light breeze. Much more pleasant than the 40's and high winds we experienced last year in Huron county. N8PYN, KD8LLT, and N8FYL started setting up then 40 & 80 meter fan dipole antenna provided by K8HVI. This antenna would be used by the 40/80 phone station set up in N8PYN's trailer. Following that success, we set up KD8LLT's G5RV to connect with his TS-480SAT setup in the GMC Envoy of N8FYL. Using KD8LLT's air powered antenna launcher (built for him by his uncle, David) we were able to get the G5RV up so the feed point was high enough that the end of the ladder line where the coax connects was about 5 feet above the ground. The entire antenna was in the clear.

Saturday the 19th was clear, but cooler. In the morning we got the two stations set up and wirelessly networked the 2 logging computers. At contest start time we were ready to go! Later in the afternoon, K8HVI arrived. Marty set up another 40 meter antenna—a "double bazooka", and installed his Kenwood TS-480SAT in Doug's trailer. Now we had three stations! Towards evening, N8GEO (and XYL Robin) stopped by for some visiting and Gregg did some operation on 40M. After the contest ended at midnight, we took down all the antennas and were done by 1 AM. N8FYL, KD8LLT, and K8HVI headed for home while N8PYN and KC8WNK enjoyed another night of "camping" in their trailer.

Bands were okay, but only one QSO one 20M, and none on 15 and 10. Overall contest participation seemed lower this year. Probably the Easter weekend effect. While N8LC didn't do nearly as well in the scoring as in 2013, we did have a good time operating the contest.



Help for New Hams

In a box of stuff recently donated to <u>WA2HOM</u>, our amateur radio station at the <u>Ann Arbor Hands-On Museum</u>, there was a book *W1FB's Help for New Hams* by Doug DeMaw, W1FB. This book hits on just about all the topics that a new ham in the late 1980s would want to know about, and W1FB does a great job of walking the new ham through these topics.

Of course, being 25 years old, some of it, is out-of-date, and it doesn't cover some questions that a new ham today would ask. For example, there's nothing in this book about digital modes or using a computer in the shack.

So, I'm thinking of writing my own *Help for New Hams*. Mine would probably be a little less HF-centric and include advice on joining clubs and how to use a computer in the shack. I am also thinking that maybe I should write two separate versions: an HF version and a VHF version.

At any rate, I've listed the chapters of the W1FB version below. If you have any comments about what I should include in my version, I'd love to hear from you.

- The Newly Licensed Amateur. This chapter talks mainly about how to choose equipment, but also covers some of the modes that amateur radio operators can use.
- Your New Equipment—Getting Acquainted. This chapter discusses how to use the features of modern transceivers, amplifiers, and antenna tuners. It also talks a little bit about antennas and SWR.
- Constructing and Using Antennas. This chapter goes into greater depth on antennas. It discusses the different types of antennas, how to feed them, and how to bring feed lines into the shack.
- Station Layout and Safety. This chapter covers the practical aspects of setting up an amateur radio station, including desk and chair selection and station wiring.
- TVI and RFI—Strange Bedfellows. TVI and RFI are less of a problem these days than back in the 80s, but it's still something new hams need to know about.
- Operating Problems and Fears. This chapter discusses some of the operating problems new hams face, including honesty in signal reporting, how to operate split and how to work DX.
- On-the-Air Conduct and Procedures. This chapter discusses more operating procedures, including calling CQ, how to operate via a repeater, and how to ID.
- Station Accessories—What to Buy? This chapter discusses a variety of station accessories including keys and keyers, microphones, antenna tuners, phone patches (!), and antenna switches.
- DX and Contest Operating. This chapter not only discusses operating procedures, but how certain equipment features will help the new ham work more DX and score better in contests.
- Logging, QSL Cards, and Record Keeping. This chapter discusses why it is important to keep logs and how to QSL.
- Obtaining Accurate Information. This chapter is basically an ad for the ARRL, counseling the new ham to join the ARRL and buy ARRL books.

I am especially interested in hearing from new hams about these topics. What about amateur radio confused you at first? What information would have helped you have more fun with amateur radio? What do you know now that you wish you had known when you got started?




