VE session at the swap and Feb 17 6:30 pm at the Tucker Center.



Sad News

In looking through files on my computer I saw an old *Tuned Circuit* from December 2000. When I opened it up, I saw the article about Fletcher Wold and his younger brother, Parker Wold. They used part of their "15 minutes of fame" when they helped save the lives of two hikers up on a mountain somewhere. The brothers were a short distance off of their 'home property', with the FRS hand held radios as their 'connection' back home.

THEY heard the calls for help from the hikers when no one else heard them. Their father, not far away, with another FRS radio was out of 'line of sight' and heard nothing until the boys went back home to tell him what they heard. He moved to a different spot and was able to have a short communication with the hikers, and realized that they needed help, since one of them had a serious injury and could not come down the mountain.

Mike Wold got on the phone and notified local police who put into action a search and rescue operation which got the hikers off of the mountain. The hikers were responsible for their predicament, since they did not register, as they should have, to go past a certain point in their wanderings. Park rangers or someone, kept track of hikers, and 'checked them off' of a list as they came off the mountain.

If the boys had stayed in their own backyard that day, it is just possible that one or both hikers could have died up there.

Anyway, I took a look for the boys on the internet, just out of curiosity. Sadly, I discovered an obituary for Parker Wold, age 20, the younger of the two brothers, who passed away in May of this year. He would have been 21 years old in late November, 2015.

http://www.macyandson.com/obituary/Parker-B.-Wold/Leavenworth-WA/1509542 LCARC decided (in 2000) to give some recognition to the boys in the form of a Letter of Congratulations; Gift Certificates to Radio Shack; an ARRL Comic Book, and a Certificate of Recognition from the club. In addition, they were sent a copy of "Now You're Talking" for them to study, with hopes that they might get interested in ham radio.

A quick trip to the Name Search of <u>QRZ.com</u> does not show either a Fletcher or Parker Wold as licensed amateurs.

Editor: Truly it is sad. I did a web search and found the reason Parker passed away. A rollover automobile accident at 3:30 AM. According to http://www.katu.com/news/local/1-dead-2-hurtin-fatal-McMinnville-crash-303314731.html "Initial indicators show alcohol may have been a

factor".

LCARC Rewards Young Heroes

Two mountain climbers on Mount Hood, Ore., are safe today because of 7-year old Fletcher Wold and his UHF walkie-talkie. Fletcher and his 5-year old brother Parker Wold were playing on a neighboring farm near McMinnville, Ore., on June 20, 2000, when Fletcher heard the faint signal of Jim Frankenfield and Blain Morris from some 80 miles away, up about 8,000 feet on the northwest side of the mountain.

Fletcher said that the signal was kind of scratchy but that he heard the man say he was hurt. Fletcher tried to radio his father, Mike Wold, but because he was in a log building with a metal roof, the signal was blocked. Fletcher then ran and found his dad and the rescue began. Ardine Wold, mother to the two boys, said "we are surrounded by very large farms, 85 acres to one side and 450 acres on the other. We insist the boys carry their walkie-talkies when out playing because the area is active with cougars, bob cats, and other wildlife."

The LCARC board decided to recognize the boys for their concern over the health and welfare of the two climbers. They each received a letter of congratulations, a gift certificate to Radio Shack, an ARRL comic book, and a certificate of recognition from the club. In addition, they now have the book, "Now You're Talking" to study and begin on their next phase of communicating by radio.

Kids are Not the Future of Ham Radio

You've heard it a million times: our kids are the future. That statement gets applied to almost everything, including amateur radio. How can you argue with an obvious fact like that?

But I am starting to think it is incorrect.


We've had really good success on creating new hams of all ages in our Technician License Class (at the Tri-Lakes Monument Radio Association). We've been doing this for a while now and I think I am seeing a pattern emerge. We've been able to attract middle schoolers to the class and help them get their ham radio license. I've talked to many of them on the air. They've helped out with public service events. They seem to have fun playing with radios.

Then this thing called high school happens. The high school phase in the US is filled with tons of stuff to do: studying, homework, AP classes, science competitions, sports, dating, movies, driving and after school jobs. Way too much stuff. Ham radio starts to take a backseat to these normal high school activities. Then we don't see the kids at the radio club meetings or chatting on the local repeater because they are busy doing other things. Have we lost them forever? Not sure.

High school is often followed by college which has its own set of challenges: a totally new environment, away from home, a new set of people, new studies, etc. There might be a ham radio club on campus but maybe not. If a kid is not off to college they are (hopefully) out doing something to establish themselves in this world. Eventually they emerge on the other side, get a job, get themselves established, sometimes with a spouse and maybe a kid or two. By this time they are 25 to 30 years old, depending on the individual.

I recently posted about the demographics of our students in the Tech License Class (http://www.k0nr.com/wordpress/2015/10/wher

<u>e-are-the-new-technicians-coming-from/</u>). The chart below shows the age distribution of our students from our most recent class. Hmmm, clearly most of our students are 30 or older. (Sorry, we have not collected age data with finer resolution.) This particular class is light on the under 18 crowd...sometimes we have a clump of kids in the mix.



For whatever reason, it seems that most people find themselves in a situation as an adult that causes them to say "I want to get my ham radio license." When asked why they want to get their ham license, the top response is always emergency/disaster communications, followed by backcountry communications, pursuing electronics as a hobby and learning about radio communications. I suspect that starting to be established in a community and having some disposable income also play a role.

My hypothesis is that the most effective way of growing a vibrant ham radio community is to target adults ages 25 to 40.

This age range is more equipped and ready to be ham radio operators and are still young enough that they will be around for a while. Of course, we still want to work with all age groups, including

get the bug for ham radio early and carry it throughout their life. And we also see plenty of older folks get interested in the hobby as they approach or enter retirement. We don't want to	miss out on either of those groups. So that's my read on the situation. I've got some data to support my theory but I can't really prove it. What do you think? What are you seeing in your ham radio community?


