Contests tend to elicit one of two reactions from hams.

#1. Oh great! I can't wait to spend as much time as possible on the air with the biggest station I can put together and see how many points I can earn this year! I may even try and dehydrate myself so that I don't have to waste time with bathroom breaks.

Or

#2. Ugh, the bands will be all jammed up. I guess I'll spend the weekend doing yardwork.

There is a third way however. I call it "playing at contests" and this way can be a lot of fun for us casual operator types.

Let me start off by saying that I have nothing but respect for the real contesters. They demand the most performance possible from their stations and have spent years honing skills that will give them a competitive edge. Many have spent many dollars and many hours to compete at their maximum potential and their feats are amazing. Big contesters are among the most serious hams around and my hat is off to them. I am not one of them though. My operating style is much more casual and leads towards rag chews, NTS nets, and using lots of vintage gear.

However, that does not stop me from using contests to have fun. For each contest that I am going to participate in, I set a personal goal and use the contest to meet that goal.

Each Wednesday is the CW Operator's club mini test or CWT. I work the 8AM to 9AM Eastern timeslot and my goal each week is to see how many people I can work, then to look at the list and see how many of them I have met in person or had a rag chew with on the air. I never submit a log. That is a simple contest with a simple goal.

Last weekend was the ARRL DX CW contest, one of the biggest contests of the year. The goal of the contest is to learn about HF and MF propagation by contacting as many stations in other countries as possible during the contest period. American stations sent a signal report and their state. DX Sta-

tions sent a signal report and their power level. Americans only work DX stations during this contest. Hearing all the different states was helpful to judge propagation at a particular time and hearing the power level of the different DX stations was helpful to judge the impact that different power levels have from similarly distant locations.

I set two personal goals for myself during this contest. **#1.** I wanted to see how many different entities I could work during a 24-hour period. **#2.** I wanted to spend time on 80, 40, 20 and 15 meters at different times of day to observe the current state of propagation on those frequencies to hear if the bands truly are "dead" or not.

To start with, I checked my antenna and made sure that the markings on my tuner and amplifier for use on each band were accurate so that I could change bands more quickly. I use an 80 meter inverted V up 100 feet fed with ladder line for use on all bands with the help of my matching network. Then I brought one of my iPads into the shack. Since my shack does not have a computer, I used the iPad to look up the QRZ.com pages of the different stations I was working to confirm their locations as my knowledge of the various prefixes for all of the different countries is a bit rusty. Next, I used my old spiral bound ARRL logbook to log the contacts and a note pad to jot down each new entity as it was worked. A real contester would use a computer for all of that, but I don't enjoy that. So That was it. I was ready.!

I was "contest ready" when the bands lit up. And light up they did. Any talk that the bands are "dead" is very wrong. I can say that I worked DX for the entire contest weekend and that 20 meters was alive with wall to wall signals the entire time. 40 meters was alive except for the period of about noon to 3 pm each day when it slumped and only other Americans could be heard. 40 was so slow that at noon I actually had a 30-minute rag chew with a ham in Ohio on 7.028 in the middle of the contest and we were not interrupted at all and I did


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
it with the 1.2Khz filter setting open the entire time! No DX on 40 from noon until about 2 but I enjoyed the rag chew with Cleveland. A real con-
 tester would have been up on 20 or 15 then. Life on 40 changed around 2 PM however and the band was gangbusters again. 80 meters was alive each time I checked during the evening and I made many several nice contacts on 80, taking time out to check into 2 traffic nets since I was on 80 anyway (something else a real tester would not do). 15 meters was full of South American and Caribbean stations all afternoon on Sunday. I stayed in the

bottom 25 KHz of that band and made about 50 contacts in the course of an hour which is a pretty good rate for me, with manual logging, etc. Since I hadn't worked that band yet I did not need to check for dupes before calling anyone so I could move quite fast.

Here are some pictures from the band scope on my Icom IC7300 that show how full the bands were. The time on the radio is set to Eastern Standard. These pictures are of 40 meters and all the other bands were equally as full.

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By simply starting at the bottom of the band and tuning up until I heard a new country, then calling that station using the rig's built in keyer, I was able to work 34 countries in about 5 hours of operating spread over a 24-hour period. I made a total of just over 300 QSOs in total and used 80, 40, 20 and 15 meters. I learned that those bands are capable of producing worldwide communications even in the current sunspot cycle. 40 was especially wonderful with an S zero to S1 noise floor the entire weekend.

I did not work any rare DX and don't think I even worked any "new ones", but I did have a lot of fun and filled the logbook with several pages of legitimate DX.

Countries worked: Honduras, Cuba, Turks and Caicos, Canada, Croatia, Republic of North Macedonia, Germany, Slovenia, Ukraine, Czech Republic, Russia, Italy, Slovak Republic, Costa Rica, Spain, Poland, Ireland, Madeira Island, Indonesia, Serbia, Balearic Islands, Turkey, France, Portugal, Mexico, Curacao, Norway, Scotland, Finland, Canary Islands, St. Kitts and Nevis, Aruba, Brazil, and Argentina.

And every one of them gave me a 599 signal report! While a contest signal report cannot be relied upon for accuracy, I can say that every station I called answered me and only 3 out of more than 300 didn't answer me on my very first call. If they didn't answer me on my first call, I turned on the amp and called them with 500W and was then answered. Since I am not submitting a log to compete in the contest, changing my power level whenever I wanted to didn't matter to me. I only needed the amp for 3 of my QSOs, so 99% of those QSOs were made barefoot on the first call. That makes me feel confident that my antenna system is satisfactory to my needs.

Some countries had a lot more contacts than others. I worked a lot of hams in Slovenia, Slovak Republic, Czech Republic and Serbia. I also worked a lot of French and Italian stations. I think that these countries tend to have fairly high ham activity. I also work them frequently when rag chewing on 40

late at night so I think my antenna system might have some gain into those locales. The contest was helpful for me to learn more about my station.

Next year my goal will be to see if I can top 34 countries. Since I logged manually, I had to manually check for dupes before calling a station and then write down my contact information with the fountain pen in the log book. A real contester would be horrified by this glacial pace and have everything computerized. Also, when I got tired, I went to bed. When I got hungry, I went downstairs and fixed supper. I grilled a steak Saturday afternoon and took a nap after. When my phone rang, I turned off the radio and talked to the person calling me. When it was time for Church, I unplugged everything and went. These are behaviors that serious testers avoid as they lower the QSO rate. But, I'm "playing at the contest" so I'm happy to do these things. I'm not even submitting a log because my log is spiral bound in my ARRL book and I have no desire to do data entry into a format to submit as that feels like work, and I don't care. If something in the hobby is not fun to me, I don't do it. But I still enjoy the contest, and so can you.

I encourage you to look at what contests are coming up and set personal goals for each of them. Maybe you want to get on the air for the NC QSO Party and just see how many different counties you can contact. Or maybe you want to see how many different bands you can use to make contacts around our state on that day. Maybe you want to make as many CW contacts, or SSB contacts as possible. Its ok to use contests to meet your own personal goals. You don't have to compete seriously to enjoy them. You don't even have to submit a log and you can take as many bathroom breaks as you want!

Editor's Comment: As many of you know I, ahem, dabble in contests regularly. If you operate a contest AND log with a computer, I encourage you to submit your log, If you don't want it scored, or you didn't follow all the contest rules, submit it as a check log.. It will help the log checking process. You never know, maybe confirmation of your contacts will make the difference in scores and affect the results in the leaders scores!






