The Health and Welfare Radiogram

When disaster strikes, we need a plan to provide messaging services to our neighbors. This article presents one way to do this.

When the SHTF event happens and the grid is down, posting a yard sign that says something like RADIOGRAMS SENT HERE will let your neighbors know that you are able and willing to provide them with simple Radiogram messaging services.

You should have printed ICS-213 Radiogram forms (RRI form 1701, thru 1704) on hand to give to your neighbors for filling their Health and Welfare messages to their families and friends outside of the disaster area. You will be responsible for transcription of their plain text messages to RCC Numbered Radiogram format. You COULD print the text table below for them to use to compose their message, but to reduce circuit congestion, you may need to trim the word count, preserving the intent of the message. Do this in the presence of the originator for their approval.

RRI Numbered Radiograms for Health and Welfare messages reduce word count in the actual message sent over the air. These texts are shown in the table below.

27	TWENTY SEVEN	I am safe and well.
28	TWENTY EIGHT	Household safe and well.
29	TWENTY NINE	Currently at shelter.
30	THIRTY	Currently at home.
31	THIRTY ONE	Currently at family/friend's house.
32	THIRTY TWO	Currently at hotel.
33	THIRTY THREE	Safe but moving to a safer location.
34	THIRTY FOUR	Evacuating to a shelter.
35	THIRTY FIVE	Evacuating to family member/friend's house.
36	THIRTY SIX	Evacuating and safe.
37	THIRTY SEVEN	At home and plan to remain here.
38	THIRTY EIGHT	Will contact you when able.
39	THIRTY NINE	All communications are down.
40	FORTY	Share this message with others.

A typical message may be formatted as follows:

{} Bracketed lines are ICS-213 form "From" person and address information for message origination identification and return responses. While there is no requirement for "From" information in the standard Radiogram form, it is strongly suggested that it be included in all disaster area messages.

This example reduced the word count from 19 to 9. (Counting X periods in the plain text.)

Note that there are no periods ("X") used in RCC abbreviated texts.

Remember message routing rules. Bring your Radiogram traffic to the Local area net for relay. Don't bypass the organized traffic network.

Make sure the message precidence is W, welfare. Do not include handling instructions in the header. Responses to these messages adds to network congestion. Standard operating procedures hold Health and Welfare traffic at the Local/Section level at least 72 hours from the beginning of an event reserving network use for Emergency and Priority traffic. Include the time the message was originated in the message header. Times should be UTC (Z).
