

Ham radio news

NEAR-Fest was held under chilly skies on Friday and drenching rain on Saturday (May 2 & 3) but attendance seemed fair. There was good mix of vendors and a large supply of RF test equipment available. Ed Fitzgerald continued his lucky streak by winning a 4:1 Unadilla beam balun in a Friday drawing. Once again a contingent of Canadian hams traveled south to enjoy the (comparatively) nice spring weather and excellent currency exchange rates (\$1 US = \$1.02 CD).

<u>L.B. Cebik (W4RNK)</u> became a Silent Key in late April at age 68. He was perhaps best known for his many insightful books and articles about antenna design and modeling. Over the years Dr. Cebik served as a contributing editor for the ARRL Antenna Book and was creator and course instructor for the Antenna Modeling Course provided by the ARRL. Cebik's website, www.cebik.com will be maintained by antenneX and will be made available offline through a series of CDs.

QRP follow-up

Greg Algieri (WAIJXR) provided an introduction to QRP operating at the club's April meeting. As Greg described, the basic criteria for QRP is setting transmitter power under 5W for CW or under 10W PEP for phone. This is not necessarily an overwhelming operating challenge because the difference between the received signal strength of 5W and 100W transmissions is only about two S-units. Furthermore, many QRPers operate in modes like CW or PSK-31 that have inherently higher "power densities". In fact, taking into account the power densities for their respective frequency spectra, 5W in CW is roughly as efficient in establishing communications as 100W is in SSB. Other reasons for operating QRP include the outstand-

ing availability of commercial kits available, the great portability of QRP stations, and the wide-ranging network of hams devoted to running low power modes. Well-designed kits range in price from about \$30 for a CW-mode Rockmite to \$1K-\$2K for an Elecraft K2 with 'all the goodies'. Single band SSB kits are available for less than \$100 and the ARRL featured several low-cost, high-quality SSB designs in the May 2008 issue of QST. PSK-31 rigs and software-defined-radio systems are also gaining strong groups of supporters. Included below is a list of popular QRP calling frequencies. Turn down your power and give it a try!
