Friends and Allies

League staffer, Bob Inderbitzen, NQ1R, made a couple of good points during his opening address to the recent Northeast HamXposition here in Marlborough. One of them seemed counter-intuitive at first but made more sense to me as I thought about it.

Bob said, "...in my experience we rush too many people into licensing. We pass "radio" and go directly to "ham". We miss the step that involves helping newcomers discover radio and radio communications." OMG. Sacrilege!

We all know radio is magic. Think of the magical power we hams have in "making" radio communications. As Steve said though, "Ham radio is the breadboard. But radio communications is the bread."

We need to communicate the fact that we are communicators, and we have a magic carpet on which we do our communicating.

Which leads me to recognition. How many times have you been in a conversation and heard, "Who needs a radio? I have a cellphone." Nowadays, the public doesn't even recognize what a radio is! (By my count, there are no fewer than four radios in a cellphone: the phone itself, the GPS, the wi-fi, and the Bluetooth. How many more can you come up with?)

Here's an example—a very local one. AARC provides the backbone communications so that the Marlborough Labor Day Parade committee can manage the parade. They know us well and appreciate our service. Do we follow the last parade element (and precede the street sweeper) with a float, or even a banner, saying "Parade communications provided by the Algonquin Amateur Radio Club?" Oh, no, we could never do that! Why not?
