

QSL Card Sort Report

Thank you to the Algonquin Amateur Radio Club for your contributions of time supporting the W1 QSL Bureau. We held out annual QSL sort session the evening of August 12th 2021. This was possible with lower COVID numbers in the area and keeping our group size relatively small. The group sorted over 8000 QSL cards. In the following week, Ann KA1PON sorted an additional over 8000 cards. This is a total of about 16,500 cards!

The cards we sort are DX QSL cards from all over the world. They are sent to our W1 call area QSL Bureau for distribution to the hams in our call area. These cards need to be sorted by the first letter of the call sign suffix. They are then sent to sorters for each of the 26 letters so they can deliver them to the individual hams in our area. The whole process only works because of the generous contribution of time by all our volunteers including clubs like the AARC.

Growing Up

Remember Tom Swift? Maybe, maybe not. Tom Swift was the main character in a young adult adventure series (1910-1941, with 54-71, 81-84, 94-93, 2006-07, and 2019 follow-ons). Tom Swift has been cited as an inspiration by various scientists and inventors, including aircraft designer <u>Kelly Johnson</u> who was considered among the top 100 "most important, most interesting, and most influential people" in the first century of aerospace." Volume 6 of the series was <u>Tom Swift and His Wireless Message</u> (1911), and it came out a year before the Titanic sank and wireless came to the rescue.

The Radio Boys, early 1920s young adult adventure series. Three different publishers generated 39 Radio Boys titles. There was also a related Radio Girls series, but not as much is known about the series as the Radio Boys one (see <u>Radio Boys Series Books</u>). Still, a 2016 paperback resurrected the title and format.

The key to <u>The Short-Wave Mystery</u>, Volume 24in the The Hardy Boys young adult mystery-adventure series hinges on coded messages on the ham bands <u>Nancy</u> <u>Drew</u> (first published in 1930 and continuing in various formats to the present), provided an adventure series aimed at young girls. One of the Nancy Drew's spin-off video games, "The Secret of the Scarlet Hand," even has a ham radio sub-plot.

<u>Walker Tompkins</u>, K6ATX, was the author of the late-50s, early-60s vintage K6ATX young adult adventure series. Being directed to <u>SOS at Midnight</u> at the local library cemented my, and others' interest in ham radio during what people call the "formative years." The hero, Tommy Rockford, K6ATX, was one of us! Walker's daughter, Cynthia Wall, KA7ITT, <u>expanded</u> <u>upon the series</u> in the 1980s.

And what re-read of <u>Popular Electronics magazine</u> would be complete without checking on the adventures of <u>Carl and Jerry</u> and reliving your teen years? Further, <u>Jack Troster</u>, W6ISQ, a popular and <u>recurring QST</u> <u>contributor</u> (ARRL members only link) had a lot to say about growing up in the hobby.

Why were these important and why did we read them? Peoples' imaginations and goals are formed by having role models. These books and articles were morality tales, instructing the reader on what could be a better world and how to grow into it.

Sure, we can't live in the past. Current culture insists that Tom Swift lived in a more naïve time—no crises, no fear, no texting, no video games. But Amateur Radio sub-interests have blossomed well beyond that AM rig under K6ATX's dashboard. A recent (probably incomplete) 2014 audit found 99 Amateur Radio sub-hobbies. This doesn't make prior adventure topics obsolete; it offers expansion room for a modern revival of the radio-inspirational genre.

We talk a lot about the value of Elmers. But let's not forget that our kids would benefit from some literary role models, too.

FCC License Fee Update

On December 30th, the FCC published a report and order indicating they have lowered the proposed amateur radio license fee from \$50 to \$35. The fee is not implemented yet. If your license expires soon, remember that licenses can be renewed as early as 90 days before expiration to stay ahead of the fee. The effective date of the fee schedule has not been established, but it will be announced at least 30 days in advance.

The proposed GMRS license fee was also lowered from \$50 to \$35, down from the current fee of \$70. The license term will remain unchanged at 10 years.
