

We phoned Bob, W600Y, who noted that all of above are crystal controlled, having varying numbers of paired channels from 2 to 12 depending on the model. Crystals for Motorola are complex temperature controlled units, costing about \$175 new. If the crystal is physically larger than new desired frequency, International regrinds them for around \$100. Parts for both brands are expensive, those for GE very hard to come by. The Motorola units would normally make excellent repeater units, since they are so stable. Bob may not be quoted.



OLD "CC" THE FIRST "VOICE OF AMERICA"

The first radio signal to span the Atlantic took place on December 12, 1901, when a series of telegraphic "S's", transmitted from England, were heard at Signal Hill, Newfoundland. Few know that this remarkable feat was really scheduled for America.

What was to have been the receiving site of the first trans-Atlantic wireless transmission from England by Guglielmo Marconi, is in South Wellfleet, on Cape Cod.

The timbers from the huge wooden towers are still there, protected by U.S. National Park Service in the Cape Cod National Seashore. Some are under water now since Cape Cod is slowly eroding away at the rate of three feet a year.

After Heinrich Hertz demonstrated the existance of electric and magnetic waves, Marconi began dreaming of a way to send messages from transmitter to receiver without the aid of wires. In 1894 he was able to detect an electric wave 30 ft. away; in 1895, it was one By 1901 a 200 mile range was mile. achieved. Wireless telegraphy became the rage of Europe..then America. Marconi thought magnetic waves could leap the ocean! The great American electric inventor, Thomas A. Edison, said it was impossible!

South Wellfleet, Massachusetts, was selected by Marconi as the westernmost tip of America. In 1901 Marconi had a powerful station constructed. He paid \$250 for eight acres of otherwise worthless land .. now worth millions!

The U.S. station was modeled after the one in Poldhu, England. A circular series of twenty 200 ft. high ship's masts were planted in the sandy soil about 165 ft. from the ocean. Then disaster struck! The ring of towers in both England and the U.S. blew down in storms. The Poldhu antenna was replaced with a "V"-shaped aerial between two salvaged 150-ft. masts. The western leg of the experiment was then transferred from Cape Cod to St. John's, Newfoundland. It was prearranged that the three-dot Morse code signal would be transmitted from Poldhu starting Dec. 11th, 1901. The following day it was heard!

To Marconi's dismay, a Newfoundland cable company had exclusive communications rights. Four days later, Marconi was served with a "Cease and Desist Order", and required to vacate Signal Hill. The Canadian government offered Marconi another site at Nova Scotia.

A new set of four 210-ft. high towers was constructed at Nova Scotia in 1902. On Jan. 18th, 1903, Marconi himself tapped out a telegraphic message that was to have been relayed to England through the station at Nova Scotia. All involved were stunned when the reception acknowledgment came direct from Poldhu, England!

The message was greetings on behalf of the American people from President Teddy Roosevelt to His Majesty, King Edward VII. A return message to the president from "Edward R. & I" was received.

From that day forth, European news was relayed to the New York Times thru Cape Cod. Ocean-going vessels adopted Marconi's apparatus to receive news broadcasts. Business and social messages could be sent to Europe for \$.50 a word.


Local Cape Cod residents could hear the crashing spark some four miles away. Telegraphers operating at 17 wpm manned the Cape Cod station for some 15 years when, due to erosion and threatened by collapse, the station closed, never to reopen.

A replica has been installed in the National Park Service Headquarters building at South Wellfleet of the original spark gap transmitter.



Besides an extra class ticket, Roy holds a General Commercial Radio Telephone Operator license which was required during his 35 years as an employee of "Ma-Bell". Now retired, he is a member of RACES/ARES and also spends a lot of time as a VE; both at the test sessions and in the equipment support for code testing. Roy operates mostly using SSB on his favored: 10, 20, and 160 meter bands using Drake TR-3 and RV4, Johnson Viking II, Collins R390 and Yaesu FT-757GX. These are are switched into a long-wire, an inverted-V, and a Mosley TA-33Sr. For VHF, the latter has a vertically polarized, 7-element yagi mounted above it. For local contacts Roy uses an ICOM IC-27 on 2, a Santec -440 and on 220 the Kenwood TH-31BT won at the Christmas party. His Atari computer gets occasional use on CW. RTTY and ASCII. About 10% of his air time is spent working DX. member of SCCARA for four years, A Roy boasts 32 years of ham radio experience. XYL, Virginia is K6IIU.

Wally joined SCCARA five years ago as a student in our novice class. Then using that ticket he was the second place winner for our section in the 1984 novice roundup. Now Wally holds an advanced class license and has served as an instructor for several classes himself. I got my start in one of those classes. Wally also donates time and expertise to the club repeater. His large VHF and UHF gear inventory of VHF and UHF gear includes: Yaesu FT-708, FT-208, and FT2700RH; ICOM IC271A. IC-471. IC-37A, and IC3AT. His favorite band is 2-meters, but he works voice on the other UHF and VHF bands that he is equipped for, and he also operates voice on the HF bands using a TEN-TEC OMNI-D fed into parallel dipoles for 40, 20, and 10 meters or an 80-meter long-wire. J-poles are used on the higher frequencies. Wally belongs to SVECS-RACES/ARES. He occasionally dusts off the keyboard to work some packet. He is employed by Santa Clara County
