REPEATER COMMITTEE COLUMN



I made our committee recommendations to the board of directors last Thursday evening. We are suggesting a number of different things be done to/with the current configuration of our 2m repeater. The first and foremost problem is the intermod we have. Elimination of the IM will take a combination of a band-pass cavity, crystal front-end filter for the receiver, and an amplifier which will make up for the losses of the filter. Gains and losses will be balanced so there should be no net change to the sensitivity of the machine.

This month has seen much activity in the committee regarding our repeater. At the last flea market we purchased a GE MASTER II repeater which is in YERY good condition. Trish WA6UBE and I checked it out recently and found the receiver functional and the PA capable of greater than 95 watts out with about 250 mW of drive (Note:we will be running it at less than 50 watts). New channel elements have been ordered to place the repeater on our frequency.

Another RC-B5 controller will be needed to get our station (W6UU/R) configured as two separate repeaters (2m and 440). The idea is to be able to link or separate the two bands as necessary. The current use of two bands for normal conversations on one band only is wasteful of spectrum and doesn't need to be done. A new somewhat directional antenna has been recommended. It is a quad folded—dipole array which will put some gain (2-4dB or so) towards the west. New feedline will be installed as the coax currently in place has been in service since the repeater was moved to its present location.

Please take a few minutes to answer the questionnaire and mail in the post card included. It will be useful in helping give me some idea of what problems we have in coverage and what features you want available in our repeaters. Results will be published in a future edition of the SCCARAGRAM. Any comments you may have can be directed to me or any repeater committee member listed on the last page of this newsletter.

CONVENTION NOTES

Page 6 is the standard advertising flyer that we are using for the convention. They are available in all the ham stores. Some points need clarification. We were limited in room on the flyer. Did our best with the room available, but it becomes very expensive to add the information to make it clear to everyone.

First: it is not necessary for a spouse to be registered to attend any of the outside activities, it. shopping tour, etc. Registration is also not a requirement for the banquet. Pre-registration is a requirement for all these activities except the banquet. The only way that a ticket might be available at the door is in case of a last minute cancellation that can be purchased from the original purchaser.

The youth forum is a brand new experiment. We are giving an attendance inducement prize for this. We are trying to get hams to bring a youngster with them.. The way the prize drawing works is: Each youth (18 and under) adopts a sponsor. One sponsor per youth, but not limited to one youth per sponsor. Each youth will place a ticket in the barrel with his name and his sponsor's name on it. The stub drawn will get the youth the youth prize and his sponsor the sponsor prize.


We have expanded the exhibit area. Increased the number of booths available, and added an area for non-profit special interest groups to have a table to make their pitch, whatever it may be.

DOC SEZ

An old saying goes: "Out of sight, out of mind." And that is particularly true. When we are gone, how soon people forget us.



This certainly is true in the case of the late Harry Engwicht, W6HC. Note, that's E-N-G-W-I-C-H-T and not Enright as many often mistakenly thought that it was. Harry was the first President of SCCARA according to records I obtained from ARRL Headquarters via Bill Stevens, W6ZM, some years back.

The true story of the beginnings of the club are now probably lost with the passing of Frank Quement. I don't know of anyone who was involved with the initial organization who is still living. The club was started in Harry Engwicht's barn on North 3rd street in 1921. I understand that it was first called the San Jose Radio Club but soon changed its name to reflect the fact that a large percentage of members lived outside of San Jose.

The first reference to the club at ARRL Headquarters is in the letters sent to the League requesting affiliation. These are the papers that list W6HC as President.

My first introduction to Harry was in August of 1946 when I attended my first meeting of the club and became a member. Later that fall I was invited to San Jose State for a meeting of the college radio club. I was planning to attend SJS as soon as I had enough money saved up.

Harry was a professor at San Jose State and taught the radio courses. His lecture room and laboratory were in the basement of the Science Building right across from the photography department. The club station license was and still is W6YL and they had a war surplus GP-7 on the air at the time and I believe that the receiver was a Hallicrafters.

I worked closely with Harry after he became active in the ARRL National Traffic System and later when I was one of his assistants when he was Pacific Division Director. Harry was the Chairman of the first post-war ARRL Pacific Division Convention held in 1954. He was then the Vice Director of the Pacific Division under Ray Cornell, W6JZ.

In the spring of 1955 Ray Cornell was declared

Inelligible to hold office under Article 11 of the ARRL By- Laws which prohibits anyone involved in commercial radio or electronics from holding the office of Director or Vice Director. Ray had taken a job with Eimac and was thus removed from office as the Director.

Harry automatically moved up to Director and held the office until he retired as Director in 1967. I replaced him by being elected that fall.

Unfortunately in the fall of 1969. Harry was seriously injured when his radio tower slipped and crashed down on his arm, nearly severing it. He was taken to the hospital but an embolism devolved that caused his death.

Harry should be remembered as one of our pioneer leaders in radio. He was a graduate of Stanford and one of Fred Terman's first radio students along with Hewlett, Packard and the Yarian brothers. He was also a pioneer in smateur radio, a leader in the ARRL and always a leader in SCCARA.

His widow, Olive, established a scholarship fund at San Jose State in his name. Perhaps the club should consider supporting this fund in remembrance of our first SCCARA President.


