Dinner meeting--lasagna with fixin's, \$5 ea, bring the family.

The United Way Building, 1922 The Alameda, San Jose, (about one mile South West from the San Jose Air Port). From 1-880: take the Alameda turn-off going South for ½ block then turn left on McKendrie. From the South: go North on the Alameda, ½ block past Hedding turn right on McKendrie.

As soon as you turn onto McKendrie (heading East), turn right into the parking lot just behind the small church on the corner. It's best to park at the far end of the parking lot. The entrance is up the steps at the South East corner of the building. There is wheelchair access at another door at the North East corner, but for security reasons, only one door is open at a time-someone will have to notify the guard if you need wheelchair access. Also, try not to be too late--the doors may be closed with

nobody around to let you in.

NEW LOCATION! The San Jose Red Cross: South-West corner of North 1st St. and Plumeria Dr., San Jose. Plumeria is two lights North of Trimble and South of Montague Expressway. From the South on I-880, take the 1st Street exit, go North. From the North on I-880, take the Montague (Trimble) exit, go West to Trimble then turn right (North) on 1st, (if you miss Trimble, just follow Montague then turn left (South) on 1st). From the South on US-101, take the Trimble (De La Cruz) exit going North, then turn left (North) on 1st. From the North on US-101, take the Montague exit going North/West, then turn right (South) on 1st.

The main entrance faces Plumeria, go straight in past the front desk. The radio room is in back of the conference room on the left just past the rest-rooms. Board meetings are open to all.

Different Field Day

1994 FIELD DAY

June is getting close and I am putting the plans for field day together. We have had many successful field days in the past, but our operation has become monotonous and we don't have a lot of new challenges. This year, I have decided to make a few changes to the operation.

First we need to work on our publicity

points. In the past we have sent publicity information to the Mercury News and they have ignored us. This year we will try for more circulation. I selected Playboy Magazine since it is widely circulated and everybody reads it for the articles.

We will be operating entirely on alternate power sources. The tower on the trailer will be modified to accommodate a windmill. (Please sign up for the midnight working party at the Altamont Pass next week.) Of course with SCCARA's luck there won't be any wind. To handle this contingency, a second trailer will contain four giant fans and a nuclear power source to run them.

The trailer will also have to be modified for the new antennas. We will not be using dipoles or long wires this year as 3 element cubical quads (2 elements on 160) will be erected for all bands.

We will be running QRP pencil sharpeners and a little more power on the transmitters borrowed from the local broadcast stations.

The contact logging program has been slightly enhanced, so this year we will be using Cray computers. I just hope they will be fast enough to record the contacts which will be occurring at a blinding rate.

In the past we have had marginal success with satellite contacts, so this year we will launch our own bird in a geosynchronous orbit over Mt. Madonna.

A new rule awards extra points for extraterrestrial contacts. NASA has agreed to lend us a few antennas for this purpose.

Erecting all this equipment on site in the time allowed would be a problem. I have arranged the use of Moffet Field to erect the equipment at our leisure and then some Marine helicopters will lift it in tact and move it to the site on Saturday morning.

Last year we noticed many more mosquitos in the park, so I have arranged for a dome to enclose the entire operating area. I couldn't get separate climate controlled zones, so we will have to compromise on a temperature.

The food will be catered by EMILES. There will be a slight increase in the price. Don't forget to tip the waiter!

The ARRL has decided that the normal

field day message is too short and too easy to get. They have also want to save printing expenses. So this year, the field day message will be the entire 1995 ARRL Handbook. I will need some volunteers to work in shifts on this one.

The size and scope of our visitors center will be increased. Busses will leave every 15 minutes from the center to tour the transmitter sites.

I think with these small changes, 1994 will be a field day to remember.

Seriously, June will be here before we know it. I hope you plan to participate in the event. Come out for the whole weekend or maybe just a few hours.

Meeting Minutes

Santa Clara County Amateur Radio Association General Membership Meeting, March 14, 1994

7:35 Doug, WN6U, opened the meeting. Self introductions followed as is our custom.

Doug, WN6U, asked for a show of hands of those who would like to have a Christmas Dinner (as opposed to some other event).

Lou, WA6QYS, asked for help for the April 9th Flea Market which SCCARA will host.

Gary, WB6YRU, Parking is still \$1.00. Rumor has it that it is due to increase to \$2.00.

Tonight's speaker is Don Ferguson, KD6IRE, and his topic is Transmitter Hunting. Don discussed many aspects of Transmitter Hunting.

One of the things discussed was Why T-Hunt? There are several reasons why people T-Hunt: 1) learn new skill, 2) understand RF propagation, 3) competitive social event, 4) locate interference, and 5) search and rescue.

Don also discussed some of the problems associated with T-Hunts. One of them is the situation where there may be more that one signal being received by the hunter. This is known as multi-path or another way of saying it is that there are many signal paths from the transmitter to the receiver. The signal is reflected by structures or hills which causes it to arrive at the receiver from more than one direction.

Don also talked about the methods used in T-Hunting. They include 1) Doppler DF System, 2) Body Blocking, 3) Directional RF strength antenna, and 4) Signal Phase Detection Antenna.

Don suggested that if you plan to go on a T-Hunt that you may want to take along these additional items: 1) attenuator, 2) maps, 3) compass, 4) lights, 5) spare equipment, 6) binoculars, and 7) survival gear.

There are several types of Hunts and they include: 1) shortest distance, 2) Earliest arrival, 3) multiple Transmitters, 4) Team Hunts, and 5) Progressive hunts

The Basic rule of T-Hunting: the signal must be reasonably receivable at the beginning of the hunt. The most important parts of the hunt is the party after the hunt.

Another tool that can be used is APRS - Amateur Packet Reporting System, which can be used for direction finding.

Business part of meeting:

Next months meeting will be a dinner meeting. The cost is \$5.00 per person. Dinner will be at 7:00. The second monday in April.

Mike, KC6LCJ, gave the treasurers report. There are 140 members.

Ed, WB6CHD, requested that any good and welfare news be given to him.

The new Red Cross radio room will be ready in two weeks.

Don, KC6WMM, The Guest Speaker for May will be Tom Server of HRO who will talk about new radio equipment.

The board approved purchase of new 55 foot rigid tower.

ARRL Pacific Division Update April 1994

Wake up call on the 13 cm. band:

As mentioned in last month's Update, NTIA (the National Telecommunications and Information Administration, a part of the executive branch of the Clinton Administration) has issued a preliminary plan which would decimate half of the 2,400 MHz. band! The content of this plan apparently ignores specific Congressional direction. The plan is to reallocate 2,390 - 2,400 and 2,402 -2,417 MHz by Aug. 1994 and 2,300 - 2,310 MHz. in A four page report from the NTIA describing their reallocation plans was released in February. The report states that it "marks the first step in a process that will lead the way to major changes in U.S. management of the radio spectrum." Drop me a note if you would like to have a copy of this important document. The ARRL Washington DC office is currently developing an action plan to attempt to turn around this proposal. See QST, the ARRL Letter, W1AW bulletins, and other sources for more information. The public comment period ends in May, 1994. We need your help! Vanity Call signs - Some New News:

The FCC has announced an extension of time for receiving comments regarding PR Docket 93-305, the vanity call sign docket. The new deadline for filing comments is April 21, 1994. The text of this docket is on page 84 in February QST.

In summary, the docket states that any ham may pay the "appropriate fee" and submit a list of up to ten call signs. The applicant would receive the first call sign on the list that's available. If none of the call signs asked for are available, the

applicant keeps the old call. A new form 610-V is being proposed to be used for the request of a specific call. Clubs and Mil-Rec stations would be issued a call in sequence but would then be eligible to request a specific call once they had obtained their first call sign. It is also expected that the new computer equipment and software will enable electronic filing of 610s. New vanity call signs will bear the original license expiration date.

The FCC, in its docket, asks for input on how to make call sign availability information on-line, whether there should be a phase-in or priority procedure and how it should be designed and implemented.

I am a member of the ad hoc committee of the board to develop the ARRL position. The ad hoc committee has delivered its draft proposal to the ARRL Executive Committee for review before the comments are submitted to the FCC by the new deadline. If you have suggestions you'd like the ad hoc committee to consider, please write as soon as possible. There's still time to influence the committee's report, but time is running short. No date has been specified for implementation, but it could be as early as late 1994.

New FCC-ARRL Amateur Auxiliary Agreement Signed:

In late February a new agreement was signed between the ARRL and the FCC Field Operations Bureau. This agreement centralizes submission of interference reporting by Amateur Auxiliary members. It requires all enforcement requests to be submitted via ARRL HQ directly to the FCC Field Operations Bureau in Washington, DC.

More information will be available soon to Section Managers and OO Coordinators. An editorial providing additional information will also be given on page 9 of April QST. Let's hope that this new program will be a step in the right direction!

New Pacific Division Assistant Director:

Dean Manley, KH6B, of Hilo, Hawaii, has been appointed Assistant Director for the Big

Island. Dean brings many years of active experience to the position. Thanks, Dean for agreeing to serve!

Antenna Ordinances:

Rusty Epps, W6OAT, Assistant Director and Volunteer Counsel, has agreed to lead a Pacific Division-wide effort to develop a database of antenna ordinances and related materials for the Pacific Division. This effort is part of a national overall program to index and catalog cases and related materials with the goal to help develop more workable antenna ordinances. Please be actively involved in this program by visiting and/or calling your town and/or county Planning Commission. We need the help of all hams in the Pacific Division on this project.

Also, please let Rusty know if there is a proposal for an antenna ordinance in your town and, if so, the contents of the proposal. Rusty would also like to know if your town does NOT have an ordinance. Rusty needs everything related to this entire field!

TELEPHONE INTERFERENCE SURVEY

The FCC has released the results of a telephone interference survey just completed. 35 FCC field offices each picked three random cases of telephone interference on record and then visited the scene. The transmitting stations included 47 citizens band, 27 amateur, 23 AM broadcast, 10 FM broadcast, and one international broadcast station.

At the location experiencing interference, the FCC's Field Operations Bureau personnel would first test the telephones on site, and then test their own "bulletproof" telephones, as well as several commercially available filters. 241 different telephones were tested.

Among the FCC's conclusions was that transmitter power did not seem to be a significant factor. They said

that 10 Watts or less caused telephone interference in onethird of the cases. The FCC also said that filters worked only one-third of the time. "Manufacturers can design telephones to be interference free," the Commission said, citing its bulletproof telephones, which were immune from interference "virtually all of the time."

The FCC said it hopes that the survey will encourage affected parties "to productively address and resolve this problem."
