



Heavy duty Bingo

HP INC

Hartz has a 50% off sale on bird seed. I guess that's a good thing if you are a bird or bird owner. Safeway has a buy one, get one free offer on ice cream. Now that has to be a good deal for everyone because everyone likes ice cream don't they? You don't have to go far to find a good deal but the term *good deal* may be more applicable to the seller than the buyer.

How so? Well, any good deal you don't need is a not so good a deal. A product or service that doesn't work for you is obviously a bad deal no matter what you pay for the product. Then there is the product or service that claims to be a deal but is sold at the everyday price? Ever notice the stores that are always having a sale?

You peel back the onion skin and you'll find many of the so called good deals are really no deals or even bad deals. The no deal is sometimes as simple as doubling the price and then offering a *half off* sale. That sale is often followed by the *two for one* sale. In the end the cost of the widget is same whether it is regular; doubled, half off; or doubled, two for one. Is anyone stupid

enough to fall for such tactics? Obviously the answer must be yes or the companies wouldn't continue such tactics.

Deceptions of this kind don't work as well with high-tech users. For one thing, the buyer is not likely to go for a two for one deal on say a printer or computer. Deceptive pricing is more difficult too because it is easier to shop high-tech around and determine the popular price. Clearly, if the seller is going to scam these people they need sneakier high-tech deceptions.

Discount retailing has been around long before high-tech was born. It begins with the MSRP, the Manufacturer's Suggested Retail Price. The manufacturer publishes suggested price listings for their products. All retailors sell below this artificial price and therefore all merchants can legitimately claim to sell at a discount. The buyers know the SLRP is artificial so no harm, no foul! One exception to discounting is when the manufacturer sells from their own website. They usually sell at the full MSRP to avoid competition with their own retailors. Company web buyers are frequently foreigners that don't have access to local retailers or importers.

Expendables, as the name implies, are objects that are expended as they are used. High tech *expendables* often have the high profit margins. For HT radios the batteries are expendable. For the computer business it's media, paper, ink, or toner.

The Gillette Razor company popularized the concept of selling a product at a loss or near loss to promote the sale of their connected expendables, in their case, razor blades. Razors lasted many years while blades had to be renewed every few months ensuring a returning customer.

A \$100 HT may have a \$50 battery. The radio lasts a decade or more while the battery lasts three years or less. Printers often contain ink or toner cartridges costing a third or more of the printer's MSRP. Likewise the printer lasts for a decade while the ink runs out in less than a year. Here again the manufacturer makes money on the expendables rather than the printer. To speed depletion many of the printer manufacturers now ship smaller trial sized cartridges with their printers.

The great irony here is many of the manufacturers that encourage discounting of their principle products, don't want their expendables discounted. They expect all their retailers to sell at exactly the same price. This practice is called fair trade pricing. Fair trade pricing is often facilitated by laws that favor coops or councils such as the *Milk Producers Council*. However, the courts have generally frowned upon manufacturers fair trade listing their products citing antitrust concerns.

How does a major company like HP control the sale price of expendables and stay on good terms with the law? Two ways:

1) They franchise their dealers thereby creating a dependency; and

2) They coop advertising dollars for dealers agreeing to sell expendables at the MSRP. It's a voluntary contract so once again they are within the law. Costco gets around this prohibition by combining cartridges (black and color) and offering a small discount. Again this is public knowledge so Caveat Emptor!

I have a new printer so I tested the prevailing knowledge looking to stock up on ink. I shopped Costco and other stores looking for a deal. Aside from the small discount I would get from buying the combo packages everyone is selling at the same price. Then I checked eBay and found I can get a discount until I checked the s&h (shipping and handling) and discover the bottom line is within pennies. Yet another way to be sneaky!

Just when I was ready to give up the search for a good deal I got this e-mail ad from HP. It said, Stock up on ink and save. I checked their prices and found they are exactly the same as I would pay in any store. I would get free shipping but I wouldn't drive to the store just to buy ink so this is a mote point with me. I concluded, OK HP, you have a captive customer. I will pay your price if I want genuine HP ink. Just don't pee on my leg and tell me it's raining. Caveat Emptor!

FCC: NEW RULES FOR EMPLOYEE PARTICIPATION IN DRILLS BEGIN SEPTEMBER 3

Beginning September 3, the new, revised wording of Section 97.113 (edocket.access.gpo.gov/cfr_2002/octqtr/pdf/47cfr97.117.pdf) goes into effect. As of this date, the FCC will permit government entities that sponsor disaster and emergency drills to hold these drills without applying for a waiver. Additionally, employees who wish to participate in non-government-sponsored drills and exercises may do so under certain conditions. Part 97 is the portion of the Commission's rules that govern the Amateur Radio Service. NEW YORK JUDGE DECLARES AMATEUR RADIO IS NOT A CELL PHONE

In many states and localities, it is illegal to talk on a cell phone (without a hands-free device) while behind the wheel -- doing so can result in a ticket and possibly a large fine. But on May 30, 2010, when a New York ham was talking on his mobile rig, he didn't think he was doing anything wrong. Except that the officer who pulled him over and cited him with a \$100 fine didn't quite see it that way.

Steve Bozak, WB2IQU, of Clifton Park, told the ARRL that when he was pulled over while driving to Troy -- about 16 miles away -- he assured the officer that he was not speaking on a cell phone, but on his handheld transceiver. But according to Bozak, the officer said "it was all the same to him." So Bozak decided to fight the ticket in court.

"Honestly, it's not the fine or the ticket, but that all the other hams who use mobile radios have to hide the fact we are mobile in Troy," he told the ARRL just days after he was cited. "I will do my best to settle this politely and correctly, for all of the ham community. So I will follow the course and have my day in court, to tell it to the judge. This matter affects 38,000 hams in New York State."

Unfortunately, when Bozak had his day in court for a pre-trial conference, the prosecutor refused to dismiss the case. But he didn't give up and took his case to City Court where, on September 8, where at the request of Bozak's attorney -- ARRL Volunteer Counsel (VC) Jeremy, Rase, KC2JRD -- the judge dismissed the case in Bozak's favor. Bozak argued that his use "of a handheld Amateur Radio does not fit the definition of a mobile telephone, and as such, the present charge should be dismissed." The prosecutor's office did not submit a response in opposition.

Saying that New York's Vehicle and Traffic Law defines a "Mobile Telephone" as a "device used by subscribers and other users of wireless telephone service to access such service," and that a "Wireless Telephone Service" is defined as "two-way real time voice tele-communications service that is interconnected to a public switched telephone network and is provided by a commercial mobile radio service," the judge decided that Bozak's handheld transceiver did not fit that description.

UNITED STATES SUPPORTS SECONDARY AMATEUR RADIO ALLOCATION AT 461-469 AND 471-478 kHz

The Federal Communications Commission and the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) -- the spectrum regulators for United States private sector and government users, respectively -- have agreed to support a secondary MF allocation to the Amateur Radio Service at 461-469 kHz and 471-478 kHz at the 2012 World Radiocommunication Conference (WRC-12), to be held in Geneva, Switzerland from January 23-February 17, 2012. FCC and NTIA officials formally presented the proposal at a meeting of the Second Permanent Consultative Committee (PCC.II) of the Inter-American Telecommunication Commission (CITEL), held August 30-September 3 in Fortaleza, Brazil.

According to ARRL Chief Technology Officer Brennan Price, N4QX, the proposal reconciles two widely divergent proposals for WRC-12 Agenda Item 1.23, adopted by consensus of the private sector and government users. Agenda Item 1.23 calls on WRC-12 "to consider an allocation of about 15 kHz in parts of the band 415-526.5 kHz to the amateur service on a secondary basis, taking into account the need to protect existing services." The FCC's WRC-12 Advisory Committee (WAC) had adopted a proposal for a secondary amateur allocation at 495-510 kHz, but the NTIA, acting on the advice of government maritime interests, initially supported no change from the status quo.

"I am pleased that the United States is taking an affirmative position on Agenda Item 1.23," Price said "While the proposed frequency bands differ from both what the ARRL proposed and the private sector supported by consensus during WAC deliberations, it is gratifying that government interests have backed off a no change position."

Some maritime interests, both domestically and internationally, have expressed opposition to any amateur allocation in the range 415-526.5 kHz, citing existing narrowband direct printing applications at 490 and 518 kHz, as well as future plans for the band that have yet to be fully characterized, Price explained. To the extent future maritime uses of the band have been discussed, the focus has been on the 495-505 kHz segment. Despite the lack of plans for the remainder of the range under consideration, the International Maritime Organization (IMO) has adopted a draft position of "no change" and has communicated this position to the ITU. IARU President Tim Ellam, VE6SH, has met with IMO officials in efforts to soften this position.

"The road to a favorable outcome for Agenda Item 1.23 at WRC-12 remains treacherous," Price said." The IMO is a respected organization, and their opinion carries weight. It's up to us to continue to make the case that a secondary allocation can be made while protecting existing services, both to the IMO and to the ITU Member States who will make the decisions at WRC-12."

Technical Relations Specialist Jon Siverling, WB3ERA, represented the ARRL on the United States delegation to the CITEL PCC.II meeting.
