15 kHz channels?

The top half of the two meter band has 15 kHz wide channels, but the bottom half has 20 kHz wide channels. There's been some talk lately about the possibility of changing the lower 2 m repeater segments to 15 kHz at least in the lower repeater segments. This would make room for the new digital repeaters, among others. One of the questions is whether this would be a problem for some radios. The problem isn't the transmitters, but the receivers.

At the recent SVECS breakfast, Lou WA6QYS asked a few of us to bring our equipment to do radio testing, like we did at a SCCARA meeting earlier this year. I brought my HP RF signal generator and did receiver evaluations. All but one HT worked fine at 15 kHz channel separation, but one with a wide receiver didn't handle it well, not even at moderate signal strength.

If you have a radio with the ability to receive aircraft or NOAA's VHF weather channel, it may have trouble with 15 kHz channels, but all other radios should handle it just fine.

If NARCC goes with the 15 kHz plan in the lower segments and coordinates repeaters on adjacent frequencies with enough physical separation, then it should work for any radio. The key is to have systems on adjacent channels far enough apart so that the adjacent channel will be weak enough.

ARRL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OKAYS FILING SYMBOL RATE RULE MODERNIZATION PETITION

The ARRL Executive Committee has authorized ARRL General Counsel Chris Imlay, W3KD, to file a Petition for Rule Making on the League's behalf calling for the deletion of symbol rate references for data emissions in the HF bands. The EC met October 5 in Aurora, Colorado.

The League's Petition, still in the final stages of preparation, would substitute an authorized bandwidth of 2.8 kHz for all data emissions in the bands below 30 MHz. Current FCC rules limit data emissions to a symbol rate of 300 band below 28 MHz and to

1200 baud on 10 meters. The current limits date to 1980, when US amateurs first were authorized to use ASCII, reflecting the state of the art back then, which, the League points out, has been overtaken by technology. After discussing alternatives to the 2.8 kHz limit, the EC okayed filing the petition as drafted, subject to any final editorial changes.

At its July meeting, the ARRL Board of Directors, on the recommendation (www.arrl.org/files/file/About%20ARRL/Committee%20Reports/2013/July/Doc_28.pdf) of the Ad Hoc Symbol Rate Rule Modernization Committee, directed Imlay to draft a Petition for Rule Making with the FCC seeking to modify \$97.307(f) of the Amateur Service rules to delete all references to symbol rate. The Petition would ask the FCC "to apply to all amateur data emissions below 29.7 MHz the existing bandwidth limit, per °97.303(h), of 2.8 kHz." In digital systems "symbol rate" refers to the number of times per second that a change of state occurs. The ARRL chose the 2.8 kHz bandwidth, since the FCC already has applied it to emissions on the channelized 60 meter band and because it's slightly wider than the data mode bandwidths currently in use by amateurs on HF.

The Ad Hoc Committee had determined that the current symbol rate restrictions in °97.307(f) "no longer reflect the state of the art of digital telecommunications technology," and that the proposed rule change would "encourage both flexibility and efficiency in the employment of digital emissions by amateur stations." ARRL Chief Executive Officer David Sumner, K1ZZ, discussed the symbol rate issue in detail in his September 2013 QST "It Seems to Us" editorial. "The guiding principle for our use of the spectrum allocations to the Amateur Radio Service is cooperation in the sharing of access to a limited resource," Sumner wrote.

On another FCC-related matter, Imlay noted that the FCC has yet to take action in ET Docket 12-338 (www.arrl.org/news/fcc-seeks-to-assign-entire-amateur-portion-of-160-meter-band-to-primary-status-to-amateur-radio-serv) to formally reflect the Final Acts of the 2007 World Radiocommunication Conference in its rules. Comment deadlines were more than 6 months ago. The Commission also has taken no action on the ARRL's November 2012 petition to implement a 472-479 kHz allocation, which stemmed from WRC 2012. Imlay said the subject may be considered in a Further Notice of Proposed Rule Making in the proceeding.

Imlay told the EC that FCC action is expected soon on WT Docket 12-283 (www.arrl.org/news/fcc-seeks-comments-on-proposed-changes-to-amateur-licensing-rules-emission-types) and WT Docket 90-209, which contain several proposals to amend rules governing the administration of Amateur Radio examinations. The League has argued against a proposal to reduce the number of volunteer examiners required at an exam session from three to two.

The EC reviewed a draft FCC filing prepared by ARRL Chief Technology Officer Brennan Price, N4QX, that supports recommendations approved last month by the FCC Advisory Committee for World Radiocommunication Conference 2015. The EC authorized Price to file the comments, subject to any final editorial changes.

ARRL SUPPORTS FCC WRC-15 ADVISORY COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS AFFECTING AMATEUR RADIO

The ARRL has expressed its support for three recommendations affecting Amateur Radio frequency allocations, which the FCC's World Radiocommunication Conference 2015 FCC Advisory

Committee (WAC) has already approved. ARRL Chief Technology Officer Brennan Price, N4QX, filed comments on behalf of the League on October 17 in IB Docket 04-286. The League has concluded that the WRC-15 Agenda Item 1.1 recommendation for 420-450 MHz "maintains a status quo that accommodates many users and works well." The Amateur Service is secondary on the 70 centimeter band in the United States. At least one administration has proposed to introduce international mobile telecommunications (IMT) -- cellular telephone and wireless broadband -- to the bottom 10 MHz of the band, but the League said it agrees with the WAC and the NTIA that things are just fine as they stand.

"The status quo is successful and represents a success story for spectrum management," the League said. "Introduction of IMT in the 420-430 segment of this band, as proposed by one administration, will most assuredly upset this status quo." The ARRL pointed out that although ham radio is secondary on the band, "radio amateurs have a vested interest in maintaining their ability to use the band," and Amateur Radio has been "a responsive and responsible sharing partner" to the band's primary users.

For its part the WAC said, "The results indicate that for most cases, sharing between IMT-2000 base/mobile stations and the various types of radars when placed in adjacent spectrum is not feasible in the absence of mitigation." Based on information at hand, the committee said, "it is logical to conclude that co-frequency sharing between IMT and the radiolocation service in the 420-450 MHz bands is not feasible."

The League also said the WAC recommendation for WRC-15 Agenda Item 1.10 regarding 22 to 26 GHz "protects the only worldwide, primary Amateur and Amateur-Satellite Service allocation between 146 MHz and 47.2 GHz."

"Sharing with incumbent services, including the Amateur and Amateur-Satellite services at 24.-24.25 GHz will require technical and operation constraints that will result in spectrum being impractical for use by the MSS [Mobile Satellite Service]," the ARRL said. The Amateur and Amateur-Satellite services are primary at 24-24.25 GHz. "Radio amateurs have been responsible stewards of a band that is difficult to use, and the WAC proposal of no change to the entire 22-26 GHz range is particularly applicable to the 24-24.25 GHz segment."

WRC-15 Agenda Item 1.18 considers a primary allocation to the radiolocation service for automotive applications in the 77.5-78.0 GHz frequency band in accordance with a resolution adopted at WRC-12. The League suggested that the FCC support the WAC recommendations "as a base for eventual reconciliation with an NTIA [National Telecommunications and Information Administration] position," or that the FCC not support any position on the agenda item, "as conducted studies to not support a position more expansive than that contained in the recommendation." The Amateur and Amateur-Satellite services are now primary in the 77.5-78 GHz band, with Radio Astronomy Service users secondary.

IARU REGION 2 PUBLISHES NEW BAND PLAN

International Amateur Radio Union (IARU) Region 2 (the Americas) has published a revised IARU Region 2 Band Plan for all allocations from 137 kHz to 250 GHz, effective September 27, 2013 (www.iaru-r2.org/documents/explorer/files/ Plan de bandas | Band-plan/R2 Band Plan 2013.pdf). The member-societies of IARU Region 2 adopted the new plan during their triennial General Assembly in Cancun, Mexico, in late September. Delegates from 18 national Amateur Radio associations attended. Representing the ARRL were President Kay Craigie, N3KN, as the voting delegate; First Vice President Rick Roderick, K5UR; Chief

Executive Officer David Sumner, K1ZZ, and Technical Relations Specialist Jonathan Siverling, WB3ERA.

"For the first time in Region 2, band plans for the VHF, UHF, and microwave bands were adopted to guide development of these bands," Sumner said. "HF band plans were reviewed with the objective of improving terminology and aligning them more closely with those of the other regions, particularly Region 1 (Europe, Africa, the Middle East, and the former Soviet Union)." The revised document earmarks a new segment for the Amateur-Satellite Service from 144,000 to 144,025 MHz.

As it states in the plan's introduction, "The IARU Region 2 has established this band plan as the way to better organize the use of our bands efficiently. To the extent possible, this band plan is harmonized with those of the other regions. It is suggested that member-societies, in coordination with the authorities, incorporate it in their regulations and promote it widely with their radio amateur communities." Meeting Minutes

General Meeting, Oct. 14, 2013

The SCCARA General Membership Meeting was called to order by Fred Townsend AE6QL at 19:31.

Members and guests introduced themselves, including Norma Chamberlain who just passed her license, Milton Brewster KK6GOK, Wei Chen AG6AQ, Phyllis Steinbach, and Bill Burns.

Announcements: Fred observed Pacificon has come and gone. Next year will be the ARRL's 100th birthday, and besides the main national convention at Hartford CT, there will be 6 mini-national conventions, one of which is Pacificon Oct 10-12 at the Mariott Santa Clara. Don AE6PM briefly described the Antenna Forum and the technical presentations. Don K6PBQ mentioned that Sheryl KJ6UXU upgraded to Extra at the testing on Saturday; 37 out of 40 passed their tech tests.

Don K6PBQ announced that the station will be open three more Saturdays this year: Oct 26th (last Saturday), and in November for the phone and CW sessions, but not the last Saturday, and not at all in December. He will put station opening information into the SCCARA-gram, as well as signups for the Christmas luncheon.

Sarla WU2SWS/VU2SWS took the floor to propose the club enter the CQ Worldwide Phone Sweepstakes. We would run single transmitter/multi-operator. Clark KE6KXO has offered his place, and John W6JPP will bring his radio and amp over. We would need 4 solid operators and other people to fill in slower periods. Sarla will be going back to India but if all QSL cards go to John, he can send them to her in India where she can mail them from India for 50 cents instead of close to a dollar from the US. Printing a special QSL card would be cheaper there too. The contest runs from Saturday 00:00 UTC to Sunday 24:00 (48 hours). It was decided to use the club call W6UW. Contact Sarla, John or Gregg KF6FNA if you're interested in operating, or drop by; everyone is welcome.

Lou WA6QYS announced the SVECS quarterly breakfast Oct 26th. Instead of a speaker, there will be radio testing for frequency, power output, deviation. It is at the Santa Clara Senior Center at the corner of Fremont and Monroe. Lou needs a head count to buy eggs. Show up at 07:30 to help cook, 09:00 for breakfast.

Fred AE6QL announced that Andy KR6DD's wife passed away last week; John W6JPP moved that SCCARA send a condolence card, Barbara KD6QEI seconded, the motion passed unanimously. Also Fred has a friend who may need help with an antenna; if interested in helping, contact Fred.

Fred announced that Election of Officers will be next month. Offices up for election are: President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, and three directors. The only incumbent officer not re-running is John W6JPP (currently vice-president). Gregg KF6FNA offerred to run for Vice President, which would open up the remainder of his director term if he were elected. Lloyd offered to run for director.

Lou announced the evening's speaker, Gene Irvine, Business Applications Director for the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission. Lou thanked Bill Burns for suggesting Gene speak to us on the Hetch-Hetchy area of the Rim Fire. Gene had been with the PUC for only 4 months when the fire happened. He described the Incident Command Center set up at Moccasin, the numerous agencies involved, and the complexity of the response. His slides gave a sense of what it was like to be there during the event. He stressed the most important thing for people at the ICS was agility: being flexible in tasks, jumping from one task to another quickly, and handling both low and high level details. Even while responding to the crisis at hand, and threats to PUC assets (like power lines, powerhouse, the reservoir), they had to follow the proper procedures to document damage and ensure later reimbursement from various government agencies and insurance companies. Being in the IT department, his team developed IT solutions to assist the response efforts: firecrews who had not used computers before took Apple iPads and tablets out to collect damage information in real time as they assessed damage. He also described how hams in Merced coordinated with the Red Cross to manage evacuation transport, food and shelter, and figured in the rescue of an injured fire crewman.

The meeting was adjourned after the presentation, and refreshments were enjoyed.

Secretary's Report: The minutes were approved as published in the SCCARAgram. Viki KI6WDS passed out new rosters and noticed an issue with one of them which she will fix. Fred gave Viki a memorial service notice for SK Kevin Gathers for the club records. Viki brought the condolence card for Andy KR6DD's wife, and the board signed it. Viki brought the election forms for review and addition.

Treasurer's Report: Goetz K6GKB handed out the balance sheet: checking=\$4491.64, savings=\$500.07, cash=\$281.28, total=\$5272.99.

Trustee's Report: Don K6PBQ will not have the station open the last Saturday of the month since people will be going to Clark's for the CQ WW DX contest. He will have it open on November 2nd and 16th for the CW and SSB Sweepstakes, respectively. He can also make arrangements to open the station at other times.

Vice President's Report: John W6JPP is waiting for confirmation that Don Anastasio AA6W will be our November speaker on satellite tracking. If he is not available, John will let Fred know by Friday so Fred can prepare a presentation.

John gave a brief description of the planned CQ WW DX contest; we will use the W6UW call sign, entering as single-transmitter-multi-operator, high power (500W). Logs will be uploaded afterwards. DECEMBER MEETING


