
Meetings & Gatherings

Our in-person meetings are still canceled due to the Covid-19 pandemic. There is some talk of starting them up again, perhaps at the Red Cross. The board meeting will be held verbally at the normal day and time on our 2 m repeater immediately following the Monday night net.

The electronic flea market has resumed. It's at a new location: the Sunnyvale Library, 665 W Olive Ave. And new hours: 7 am - 12 pm. See http://www.electronicsfleamarket.com/

The number of people fully vaccinated statewide is now 75.2% (74.4% last month), in Santa Clara County it's 85.6% (85.1% last month). The average number of new cases daily in Santa Clara County is going up, it's now 292 (144 last month).

The *mandatory* mask requirement has been lifted, except for certain high-risk settings. However, masks are still strongly recommended. A **second** booster is now recommended for those over 50 or who have a compromised immune system.





Super Tech

Years ago the family airplane, a 1948 Ryan NAvion, had a King Radio KX150B as its primary communication/navigation radio. It was a hybrid radio that straddled the transition to solid state printed circuit board construction and used both tubes and transistors. Being old and tired it had an annoying squeal that was brought to my attention by the tower whenever I made a transmission. Not wanting to become too well known by the FAA, I finally took it to Nystrom Aviation in Palo Alto, the nearest FAA certified radio repair station. After two weeks I got a phone call from the repair shop declaring my radio was unfixable. When I went to pick up my radio they presented me with a \$75 repair bill. That was a lot of money back then and I got in to one hell of an argument as to whether anything was repaired. We finally settled on \$35, the price of liberating my radio.

At the time I was working for Intersil semiconductor, located in Cupertino on Tantau Ave just opposite what is now the Apple space ship complex. These were the heady days of electronic startups populated with non diploma'd geniuses. One such fellow was George Cole, a super technician who was able to unglue the nastiest electronic problems that constantly presented themselves. As a side hobby, George maintained the Wurlitzer Theater Organ at Pizza and Pipes on the corner of Lawrence Expressway and Homestead road. At the time, a huge tract of farmland occupied the diagonally opposite corner, with the original farmhouse still in tact. The holdout open space is now the staggeringly huge Kaiser Hospital. So George kept the gigantic octopus like organ with all its remote instruments electronically synchronized, a thunderous imitation of a complete orchestra.

I told George about my King radio and its fatal diagnosis and he immediately wanted a chance to see what he could do. He suggested we take it into Intersil's Faraday cage, a huge 12 foot

square cube encased in heavy copper. After closing the freezer like door, we powered up the radio and were able to duplicate the annoying squeal. Can't exactly remember how we did this, but the outside world was not aware of any radiated power from our transmissions. It didn't take long for George to open up the radio and start hunting for the bad component. He used an axial lead capacitor with the leads brought close together and paralleled the capacitors in the radio. It didn't take long and George found the bad capacitor which he replaced. He also discovered that there was a bad bipolar transistor that needed replacing. The problem here was that King Radio had dipped all the transistors into black paint hiding any markings so that only they could provide replacements. At this point George suggested that what we needed was another KX-150B that worked, a radio that we could borrow this very transistor from and using a curve tracer identify it positively.

Now I need to identify yet another player in this story, namely Vaughn Lamb the owner of the airplane salvage yard on 11th street in South San Jose. Most of the world knew Vaughn as a train engineer operating steam locomotives for the Southern Pacific Railroad. But he had a second occupation as the salvager of airplane wrecks wherever they might occur. His junk yard had a huge building that contained all the recoverable parts of planes that had met violent ends. Outside were the crushed remains of who knows how many bad landings! I used to drool over a Beechcraft A36 fuselage that was sandwiched between its de-mated wings. An off runway crash landing that allowed Steve Wozniak to walk away with minor head injuries, no more. His flying days were over, sadly his wreck was worth more than I could afford to buy and restore.

We asked Vaughn if he had any examples of our radio and he immediately produced three, two badly crushed and one only moderately so. George removed our mystery transistor and back to work where the curve tracer led us to the correct spec sheet and a new replacement part. Some additional work was done and the illegal repair was reinstalled in the NAvion where it performed flawlessly for years to include a four week trip to Alaska. And what did George get for all his effort? His parents, who had been farmers all their lives, retired to Coos Bay Oregon where his father bought a small Salmon fishing trawler. We packed our bags and flew to Coos Bay were we spent a delightful weekend as guests. George had the satisfaction of knowing his repair rendered the radio squeakless.

ARRL News

From The ARRL Letter, April 1, 2021

New FCC Application Fee Will Not Apply to Amateur Radio License Upgrades

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) staff has clarified in response to an ARRL request that the new \$35 application fee will not apply to most license modifications, including those to upgrade an amateur radio licensee's operator class and changes to club station trustees. The FCC staff explained that the new fees will apply only to applications for a new license, renewal, rule waiver, or a new vanity call sign. As previously announced, the new fees take effect on April 19, 2022.

"We are pleased that the FCC will not charge licensees the FCC

application fee for license upgrade applications," said ARRL Volunteer Examiner Coordinator (VEC) Manager Maria Somma, AB1FM. "While applicants for a new license will need to pay the \$35 FCC application fee, there will be no FCC charge for future upgrades and administrative updates, such as a change of mailing or email address. Most current licensees, therefore, will not be charged the new FCC application fee until they renew their license or apply for a new vanity call sign."

ARRL previously reported that the new \$35 application fee for amateur radio licenses will become effective on April 19, 2022. Further information and instructions about the FCC Application Fee are available from the ARRL VEC at www.arrl.org/fcc-application-fee.

WSPR Beacon on the Air from Antarctica

AMSAT Argentina has assembled and delivered a permanent WSPR (Weak-Signal Propagation Reporter) beacon system to the Argentine research station at Esperanza Base on the Antarctic Peninsula. Using the call sign LU1ZV, the 200 mW beacon is presently active on 40, 20, 15, and 10 meters at 7.0386, 14.0956, 21.0946, and 28.1246 MHz, respectively, and reception has been reported by stations throughout the world.

The LU1ZV WSPR beacon is on the air from Esperanza Base, a permanent Antarctic research station.

WSPR is a digital communications protocol designed for reception at very weak-signal levels. It is part of the WSJT-X software suite. You can use <u>WSJT-X</u> to receive the LU1ZV beacon directly, or you can see reports from other stations online at http://www.wsprnet.org.
