

Early Radios Being Shown Off in Our 1925 Film



You may recognize these images from our 1925 film. That's Philip Scofield, 6JK (left) and Frank Quement, 6NX showing off the "latest and greatest" of the time. (Their calls later became W6JK and W6NX.)

What exactly are those radios? I've always wondered if those were home made or commercially manufactured. Back then the home made variety were just as good as commercial radios. Well, I kept my eyes open and it has started to pay off!



The ARRL has created a radio museum, called "Radio Alpha," <http://www.arrl.org/arrl-museum-and-research-library>.

I thought maybe that could provide some info. Alas, they don't (yet) have much prior to 1935, but it's new, they're working on it.

I sent these images to one of the people on that project, Chuck Penson WA7ZZE, and he was looking into it. He passed it to Jim Kreuzer N2GHD for comment. Jim was able to provide some info., he said:

"I took a good look at the images you sent and can tell you that they are both home brew apparatus, not manufactured and date from the 1924 - 1928 period. The unit on the left is a TPTG transmitter, while the receiver is of the regenerative variety with a 1 or 2 step audio amplifier."

The film was made in 1925, so it had to be 1924 or early 1925. That's at the early end of Jim's time estimate.

TPTG is Tuned-Plate Tuned-Grid, which was common at the time for one-tube transmitters. However, this transmitter has two tubes. It's possible the other tube is an amplifier.

Regenerative radios were common before the super heterodyne technique was invented. That's where the RF amplifier has almost enough feedback to oscillate... almost. The effect is to improve sensitivity. The receiver also has two tubes, one of which I'm guessing must be the audio amplifier.

It's possible the schematics and other info can be found in one of the radio electronics magazines published around that time. If something turns up, I'll mention it here.

It's great to get this added info and to learn a little more about what the club's forebears were doing.

FCC Allocates 60-Meter World-Wide Amateur Band Approved at WRC-15; Continues Amateur Use of Four Additional 60-Meter Channels, and Updates 420 MHz Coordination Information

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) on December 9, 2025, released a long-awaited Report and Order adopting a new amateur radio spectrum allocation in the 60-meter band that was approved for world-wide use on a secondary basis in the WRC-15 (World Radiocommunication Conference 2015) Final Acts. The Commission also agreed with a petition from ARRL The National Association for Amateur Radio® to continue to allow amateur operations on four existing 60-meter channels outside the international allocation with a full 100 watts. The new rules will go into effect 30 days after publication in the Federal Register, when amateurs may then begin using the allocation.

Specifically, the Commission allocated 5351.5 - 5366.5 kHz (60 meters) to the amateur service on a secondary basis with a permitted power of 9.15 watts ERP. The Commission also authorized amateurs to continue using four existing channels outside of the 5351.5 - 5366.5 kHz band centered on 5332, 5348, 5373, and 5405 kHz on a secondary basis with a permitted power of 100 watts ERP. There are no antenna restrictions but antenna gain must be used to calculate ERP.

The 60-meter allocation is available to amateurs holding a General Class or above license. The maximum permissible signal bandwidth is 2.8 kHz.

Amateurs are cautioned that this allocation is strictly on a secondary basis, and amateurs must avoid interfering with non-amateur stations using this spectrum. This obligation includes the responsibility to monitor for such stations using appropriate receiver bandwidths. The FCC emphasized that "allowing amateur operations in this band while fully protecting incumbent primary Federal operations is our priority, and even intermittent interference in this band could jeopardize important Federal operations."

The Commission left open ARRL's 2017 Petition for Rulemaking to implement this WRC allocation (RM-11785), stating that "we expect the Commission may address any necessary power adjustments for the new 15 kilohertz international allocation in that proceeding." ARRL will be observing operations in the new band to evaluate the effect of the 9.15-watt limit and already has been monitoring the regulations and experiences of amateurs in other countries.

Finally, in the same Report and Order, the FCC updated 420-450 MHz coordination and contact information for geographic areas where the peak envelope power (PEP) of amateur stations operating is generally limited to 50 watts. There was no substantive change to the areas covered by the power limitation.

Obsolete Part 97 Rules to be Deleted Feb. 10, 2026

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) in October 2025 adopted a Report and Order to delete almost 400 obsolete rules pertaining to its wireless services. As previously reported by ARRL, among the deletions were four in Part 97 that govern the Amateur Radio Service.

ARRL reports that the notice of the Report and Order has now been published in the Federal Register. Unless an objection is raised by January 2 that the Commission finds to deserve its consideration, the following four Part 97 provisions will be deleted as of February 10, 2026:

§ 97.27. This provision is duplicative of a statutory provision related to the FCC's right to modify station licenses.

§ 97.29. This provision specified an obsolete procedure to replace paper licenses. ARRL proposed deleting this section in comments filed earlier this year.

§ 97.315 (b)(2). This obsolete provision grandfathered HF amplifiers purchased before April 28, 1978 by an amateur radio operator for use at that operator's station, and grandfathered those manufactured before April 28, 1978, for which a marketing waiver was issued.

§ 97.521(b) and Appendix 2. This rule and appendix relate to obsolete VEC regions.

Repeater Chairman's report, Gregg KF6FNA: I called Goezt who confirmed everything is working fine.

Webmaster's report:

Old Business:

Gregg KF6FNA: We'll have to ask John what he had in mind, but he's currently in the hospital getting his heart checked out.

Gregg KF6FNA: We have a new HF beam and tower for the club station that needs to be installed. (It involves going up on the roof of the Red Cross. The roof is flat but delicate, so certain precautions must be taken with the mounting.) If anyone is interested in helping, contact me, We'll put together a work party when we have good weather.

New Business:

Gary WB6YRU: This falls under the Station Trustee's jurisdiction. The club station has needed upgrading for some time now, it can't easily handle more than one radio. As is, the one existing antenna switch is not adequate, we have to manually disconnect and reconnect coax cables to get each radio connected to the right antenna.

At the November general meeting I handed out a diagram of how the club station could have a set of antenna switches wired up for three stations and four antennas. The basic idea could be expanded for more radios and antennas. So far I haven't heard any comments about it. Antenna switches aren't cheap, but I really think it would be worth it to make operation easier and more orderly, especially during Field Day.

Houses had thatched roofs, thick straw piled high, with no wood underneath. It was the only place for animals to get warm, so all the cats and other small animals (mice, bugs) lived in the roof. When it rained it became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall off the roof. Hence the saying "It's raining cats and dogs." There was nothing to stop things from falling into the house. This posed a real problem in the bedroom, where bugs and other droppings could mess up your nice clean bed. Hence, a bed with big posts and a sheet hung over the top

afforded some protection. That's how canopy beds came into existence. The floor was dirt. Only the wealthy had something other than dirt. Hence the saying, "dirt poor." The wealthy had slate floors that would get slippery in the winter when wet, so they spread thresh (straw) on floor to help keep their footing. As the winter wore on they added more thresh until, when you opened the door, it would all start slipping outside. A piece of wood was placed in the entrance. Hence: a thresh hold. (Getting quite an education, aren't you?)

Sometimes they could obtain pork, which made them feel quite special. When visitors came over they would hang up their bacon, to show off. It was a sign of wealth that a man could, "Bring home the bacon." They would cut off a little to Share with guests and would all sit around talking and "chew the fat". ?

Those with money had plates made of pewter. Food with high acid content caused some of the lead to leach onto the food, causing lead poisoning and death. This happened most often with tomatoes, so for the next 400 years or so, tomatoes were considered poisonous.

Bread was divided according to status. Workers got the burnt bottom of the loaf, the family got the middle, and guests got the top, or "The Upper Crust".

Lead cups were used to drink ale or whisky. The combination would sometimes knock the imbibers out for a couple of days. Someone walking along the road would take them for dead and prepare them for burial. They were laid out on the kitchen table for a couple of days and the family would gather around and eat and drink and wait and see if they would wake up. Hence the custom of "Holding a Wake".

England is old and small and the local folks started running out of places to bury people, so they would dig up coffins and would take the bones to a bone-house and reuse the grave. When reopening these coffins, 1 out of 25 coffins were found to have scratch marks on the inside and they realized they had been burying people alive. So they would tie a string on the wrist of the corpse, thread it through the coffin and up through the ground and tie it to a bell. Someone would have to sit out in the graveyard all night (the graveyard shift) to listen for the bell; thus someone could be, "Saved by the Bell" or was considered a "Dead Ringer". Newsletter Notes

It been the "**SCCARA-GRAM**" for half a century!

Actually, we're not really sure when the newsletter was first called the "SCCARA-GRAM." The records are few and far between prior to 1985.

Our first known newsletter was a prototype in late 1953 called "The Junk Box." It had that name for a few years during the 1960's too but not consistently, many editions were simply called the "Bulletin." Before 1953 it seems we only sent out postcards.

We have a September 1974 edition that refers to itself as the "Bulletin." So the first SCCARA-GRAM had to be *after* that.

The earliest actual "SCCARA-GRAM" we have is September 1976. It has an article about the previous meeting where Joyce Walters was recognized for "...typing up the SCCARA-GRAM for the past several years." That's rather curious since it was called the "Bulletin" in late 1974. Most likely they meant she had typed up the *newsletter*, regardless of what it was called.

It's possible the first SCCARA-GRAM was in 1975, but there's no surviving evidence for that. At least it can't be any earlier. And it *definitely* was the SCCARA-GRAM in 1976.

So, it's been 50 years! It's the **GOLDEN** anniversary of the **SCCARA-GRAM**! 

OK, so maybe it's not *that* big of a deal, but I'm going for it anyway! 

By the way... some of you younger members may be wondering why we called it the JUNK box at first. Does that sound too much like "trash bin" or "waste basket"?

Well, back in the day, nearly all amateur radio operators were electronic experimenters. We were the only ones allowed to build or work on transmitters without a radio-telephone license. That's why we have to pass technical tests for an amateur license. In fact, an amateur radio license used to be almost as good as an electronic engineering degree.

Most of us organized our electronic parts, but we all had what was affectionately called "the junk box." It was an odds-n-ends box containing all kinds of misc. electronic parts and was one of the first places we looked when we needed something.

The upshot is: the junk box contained all sorts of good and interesting things! So that was a fitting name for an amateur radio club newsletter.


