RAC logo license plates now collector's items (2004-04-14)

The Ontario Ministry of Transportation has informed Radio Amateurs of Canada that while it will continue to issue custom call sign license plates, due to a change in policy, it will no longer be able to issue the versions containing the RAC logo. Those of you fortunate enough to have invested the extra few dollars for RAC license plates, will now have collectors items. It might be worthwhile to add a little extra wax to the plates to keep them in good shape for the next while...

Developments in Ultra Wide band devices. (2004-04-05)

While most amateurs are focusing on the BPL threat to our HF bands, another possible threat is on the horizon at the upper UHF and microwave bands.

Ultra Wide Band (UWB) devices transmit over bandwidths as wide as 500 MHz, and occupy the same spectrum as existing licensed services in some of the microwave bands. They can be used for short range communications at very high data rates, or for short range radar. Another possible application is for RFID's or Radio Frequency Identification tags, which could, for example, be attached to products in a supermarket, and interrogated at the cash.

In general UWB devices are very low power, and their appeal is that they can be made of few components at potentially very low costs. In many ways they are similar to the spark gap transmitters used by radio amateurs nearly 100 years ago. Most will operate as license exempt emitters. Many may be built into the electrical consumer products we all use

Of course, existing spectrum users (particularly mobile cell phone providers) are concerned about the possibility of interference generated by UWB devices, and so the ITU is studying compatibility problems.

Dr Salim Hanna of Industry Canada is chairing an ITU International Task Group on UWB compatibility. Salim recently reported that:

On March 31, 2004, Industry Canada issued an approval in principle for an experimental license for Rogers Wireless Inc. in Toronto to experiment with an indoor wireless UWB device.

On April 01, 2004, the Australian Communications Authority has granted an interim license for an ultra-wideband ground penetrating radar system. This is the first time an application using UWB technology has been licensed in Australia.

In the USA, industry has been unable to agree on a proposal for a standard for UWB Wireless Personal Area networks. Two implementation proposals are on the table:

- 1. Multi-band Orthogonal Frequency Division Modulation (OFDM) (supported by the Multiband alliance including Intel, Texas Instruments, etc.), and
- 2. Direct Sequence Spread Spectrum UWB (supported by Motorola and Xtremespectrum).

Although the multi-band OFDM has more support within the UWB industry, it still failed to get a majority vote during a recent meeting of the standards committee of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers in Orlando Florida. The next meeting of Salim's ITU task group will be held in Boston USA (June 9 -18, 2004).

Ontario students talk to Antarctica via amateur radio (2004 04 02)

Congratulations to the grades 4 to 7 students in the Shortwave Listening and Amateur Radio Club, at R. Tait McKenzie Public School in Almonte Ontario, for their successful amateur radio contacts this week with scientists at the U.S. Palmer research station in Antarctica. The students in the Tuesday and Thursday groups spoke by amateur radio this week with members of the research team at Palmer Station on the Antarctic Peninsula. The contact was made using IRLP.

Although Palmer Station in Antarctica is 12,348 km from Almonte on the other side of the world, amateur radio made it possible for R. Tait students to speak directly with scientists there, and have all their questions answered. The Club members were surprised to learn that Almonte had colder temperatures this winter than Palmer Station in Antarctica. Through their amateur radio contacts this week, the students also learned what a penguin sounds like, why the Antarctic ice looks blue, and how long it takes by ship to travel all the way to Palmer Station. One of the most remarkable things the Club members learned this week is that an entirely new life form has been discovered in Antarctica by scientists at Palmer Station.

Amateur radio, like shortwave listening, is a great way to reach out and bring the world into the classroom.

More news on propagation experiments in the 2 km band

RAC Newfoundland Section Manager Joe Craig VO1NA, reports more successful transatlantic QSO's on 2200 metres with G3LDO and M0BMU.

Those of you who have been following the progress of experimentation in the 135 kHz band, will recall that amateurs have been using very slow speed CW, and sophisticated signal processing to read signals well below noise level

Joe has been experimenting with higher speed CW and during the very favorable conditions we've been experiencing lately 1.2 WPM was copied by M0BMU in the UK, and Joes call sign was identified by H. Wolff in Germany. Look for more details in a forthcoming item in TCA.

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Stranger Than Fiction

The following story was submitted to the "Blue and Gold", my old high school newsletter for publication. I wanted to share it with my fellow amateurs just to show how radio can bring people together in a rather unique way.

The following is a true story. The names are real and so are the people. No effort has been made to hide anyone's identity. Nobody could make this up.

My name is Tony Champion (1964) and for the past 11 or so years, I have been a radio amateur operator holding the call VA3QC. My dad, John, is also a ham operator and resides in Riverview, NB, just outside of Moncton. He's been an amateur since 1936, and presently has the call VE9AG.

Since I've had my license, dad and I meet pretty much every morning on the radio and have a chit chat and get caught up in each others news. At some point, another gentleman, named John (VE3EWJ), joined us on Saturday mornings and we'd yak back and forth for a bit.

One particular Saturday morning, dad and I were talking about Quebec City, when John (VE3EWJ) asked if we were from there. Of course, we both said yes, although we hadn't lived there for quite some time. He went on and said that was interesting because his wife was also from Quebec City, so I asked what school she attended. He said QHS (Quebec High School). This of course perked up my interest and I asked what her name was. He came back with Jean McGerrigle. Well, I just about fell off my chair. I remember Jean, but she was a little older than I; but I had been in the same grade as Graeme, her younger brother, so all of a sudden we had a connection and I was able to reconnect with Graeme after so many years. Another coincidence to this story was that John also worked with my next door neighbour here in Mississauga. This we discovered a little later, much to our surprise.

But wait! The story doesn't end there, and in fact, becomes even more interesting. In the Fall-Winter 2003 issue of the Blue & Gold, Veronique Jossinet had asked if anyone could pass along information on behalf of her sister, Pascale, who was wondering where some of her old friends from school had ended up. I glanced at the list of names and saw that she was looking for Jean McGerrigle amongst others. 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MAXIMUM USABLE FREQUENCY APRIL 2004

The monthly HF propagation forecast chart lists, in MHz, the MUF (Maximum Usable Frequency) for various circuits originating / terminating in Canada. The number in each cell is the frequency that will sustain communications 50% of the time during the forecast period, at a specific time and over that specific circuit.

If you prefer to use the OWF (Optimum Working Frequency) it is in theory, 80% of the MUF for the same period and on the same circuit. Multiply the value in the cell by 0.80 and you have the approximate value of the OWF. But the ALF (Absorption Lowest Frequency) might be higher than the OWF and communications might be impossible to establish on the circuit at that frequency.

If you use a frequency higher than the listed MUF, your chances of establishing and maintaining reliable communications decrease very rapidly. At MUF the chances of establishing a reliable contact or hearing clearly an international broadcaster are only about 50%.

When the ALF is higher than the MUF the table will contain an asterisk (*). This does not mean that communications are impossible but that they are highly improbable, try and use the last listed MUF or below for that specific circuit.

The notation (P) after the name of one of the terminals of a specific circuit denotes that this is a polar circuit and that you should expect poor to unreliable communications on this circuit during geomagnetic disturbances.

This notation will not appear in the circuits originating in the "Nunavut" and "West Arctic" listing, as these two terminals are normally located inside the theoretical auroral zone.

For the purpose of establishing these tables, all the circuits are assumed to be fully reciprocal, thus the listed MUF's can be used for transmission / reception from either end of the circuits. This assumption is not totally correct but the differences in frequencies are minimal

The District/NVIS (Near Vertical Incidence Skywave) forecast frequency calculated for the six areas of Canada, can be used for local communications within 300 kilometres of the station. To properly use this propagation mode it is essential that an antenna having a maximum radiation angle between 75 and 90 above the horizon be used, such as a half-wave dipole erected no higher than 1/8 to 1/4 wavelength over the ground. Most of the RF energy radiated by such an antenna and on the listed NVIS frequency will be returned to earth within 300 kilometres of your station.

NVIS propagation mode can be very useful for emergency communications when the regular VHF repeaters are out of commission. For more information on this peculiar and interesting propagation mode and its possible uses see "The NVIS Propagation Mode and the Ham" in the "ARRL Antenna Compendium, volume 5."
