How often we see that on catalogs from the various firms that haven't received orders from us recently. Most of the time the catalogs just keep coming . . . every week or two! But that won't happen to your club newsletter. If you haven't renewed your membership to the Radio Amateurs of Corry, you definitely will not get the next newsletter. We sure would like to send copies to each of the thousand or so hams in the local area, but we simply cannot afford to do that. Each issue you get in the mail costs the club about 73 cents. If you get your issue at the club meeting, you save us 23 cents for postage. That means that almost \$3 of your \$5 membership contribution goes for the newsletter. The remaining couple dollars is used mostly for the operation and maintenance of the two repeaters we operate.

I'm not complaining, mind you, or asking for the dues to be increased. We are doing quite well with what income we have and member contributions are fantastic when (or if) we have a crisis. I, for one, am proud that we have the lowest dues of any club around. And our two repeaters serve as well as those in high dues clubs.

But, I digress. Take a look at your mailing label. It has two important bits of additional information that may interest you. To the upper right of the label, is your membership year status. If a "97" appears here you will get the next issue. If a "96" is there you will not get the next issue. Immediately to the right of the membership year you may see the letters "ARL" or "ARLL." The first code means that you are a member of the ARRL and that helps us to qualify for the ARRL affiliated club status. The "ARLL" flag means that you are a life member of the ARRL.

If there is any information on the label that is incorrect, please let me know via the post office box or on air so that I may correct it in our database.

And finally, there are some newsletters that do not get delivered because we do not have your current address. Please remember that if your address changes, the post office may not forward your newsletter. Don't take a chance of missing anything!! Check your label now and notify us of any error you may find.



Ancient Mary, alive or dead?

You ask, who uses AM, other than CB'ers? Well there are many local hams that are still active on the "Ancient Mary" mode! It is one of those modes that is still used frequently on 160 meters and 80 meters in the HF bands. Listen in on those Bands and you may be pleasantly surprised. Hold on! What about other bands? Well, you might catch someone on 40 meters on occasion. Well, what about VHF? Ah! the secret is out! Locally there are two rather active Nets on VHF. There's the 6 Meter AM net on Wednesdays at 7:00 P.M. at 50.400 Mhz. There have been check-ins on the net as far away as Alabama! Let's not forget 2-Meters! There's an active net in the area on 144.450 Mhz. We get hams from all over the area who check into this one! They are mostly in the Erie area, however we do get check-ins from as far away as the Buffalo area, and Detroit area and many from Westfield, Ripley, and even Jamestown areas.

You ask, "What do I need to get involved with the AM mode on these frequencies?" It mostly depends on the size of your Amateur Radio funds, or "mad money"! We had a case of one ham in Erie who got on 6-meter AM using a Heathkit "lunch box", for \$2.00 from a yard sale, a borrowed crystal, and a home made Dipole antenna! With 2 to 3 watts of power, he reaches from Lake City to Westfield! The other extreme is an Icom 706 for \$1250.00 and up! Your choice!

Used Heathkit, Gonset, Hallicrafters, Polycomm, Utica, or even home made gear can be used. Check under the tables and in the boxes at hamfests. You may find a treasure for \$5.00 to \$10.00 that only needs a little TLC, a crystal, and an antenna. Tranceivers in excellent working order sell for \$30.00 to \$100.00+ depending on condition and accessories, microphone, VFO, etc. Transverters from Hamtronics, Ten-Tec, Down East Microwave, and others, can be used with HF or other gear that has AM capability. Oh, by the way, the preferred antenna polarization is Horizontal! 73, and happy AM-ing!

Francis McCray, W3BZJ

This month we feature Francis McCray, W3BZJ, as amateur operator of the month. Those of us who know Francis know him as "Mac". In fact the name "Mac" has become synonymous with Amateur Radio in Corry, Union City and the surrounding communities. There are few amateur operators who have enjoyed the hobby as much, or explored the hobby as much as Mac. Mac also believes in sharing this great hobby. He has been an excellent "Elmer". Many of us in the community owe our start in amateur Radio to Mac. In 1957 when I first met Mac, he lived with his wife Agnes and their daughter Linda Lee on a small farm in Elgin where he still lives today. That small farm never raised cattle or produced a large crop of potatoes or corn. It did, however always produce a fine crop of antennas. I was studying the code for the novice license at the time and my neighbor Al, K3ACF, took me down to meet Mac. Al said "You can always find Mac's place. Just look for the antennas."

You might say Mac graduated from High School into Ham Radio. He got his first license in 1930. At that time this part of Pennsylvania was part of the eighth call area and Mac was issued the call W8CDZ. At that time he operated a Hartley oscillator on CW and listened with a two tube regenerative receiver. Most of his contacts were with Walter Aur in Corry. Mac recalls that he did a lot more listening than transmitting at that time. There were ham's starting to use "voice modulation" instead of CW at that time. Mac equipped his Hartley with a carbon microphone connected to a few turns of wire coupled to the Hartley oscillator coil, which was how the first rigs were modulated. There was an old saying that said: "You can tell a ham radio operator by the RF burns on his lips". Mac braved the RF burns and went on the air with his "Voice modulated" rig. He finally made one contact with it in Cocranton, Pa. which at that time was pretty good DX. Anyone who knows Mac's love of talking into a microphone knows that Mac was hooked on Ham Radio right then and there. Most ham radio operation at that time was still done with CW and that just didn't suit Mac's style so he didn't renew that license.

When western Pennsylvania became part of the 3rd call area Mac again gave amateur radio a second try and was issued the call W3AFH. Again, CW was a chore and at that age, Mac could find lots of other ways to exercise his vocal chords, such as flirting with young teachers. Again he didn't renew the license.

Radio made great strides during the second world war. By the time it was over, voice communication by AM phone was a common mode of communication. Mac still remembered the time when he talked through the radio waves with a ham in Cocranton. There were also a number of other hams in the Corry area at that time. He decided to give it another try. In April, 1955 Mac was issued the call WN3BZJ. He went on the air with a Heath AT-1 with an 807 tube in the final and a National NC100 receiver. Though he was crystal controlled and on CW, The bands were full of AM voice. This inspired Mac

to keep on practicing and he finally mastered the 13 words per minute.

With a new General Class ticket in his pocket, Mac acquired a World Radio Laboratories Globe Chief 90. This rig, with its 6L6 final ran a whopping big 50 watts on AM and 90 on CW. Mac screwed the microphone connector on and threw the transmit switch... The term "Rag Chew" had come to the Corry area.

Mac's next rig was an ART-13 Military surplus transmitter with an 813 in the final and modulated with an 811A. This transmitter ran about 250 watts AM. This is the transmitter that you always see in the old movies in the back seat of a jeep behind the drivers seat. Remember, the Platoon leader always stood in the mud and leaned against the antenna on the back of the jeep to call in an artillery barrage. I always wondered how he did that without getting burned when he keyed up? Maybe Mac can tell us some time.

When the whole world shut down their AM rigs and went to Single Sideband, Mac retired the ART-13 and the old National NC100 and bought a brand new Swan 500CX which he still has today as a back up to his Kenwood TS-430. He also has an old Midland 2 meter transceiver and a new Realistic HTX-212 for the 2 meter nets.

Mac likes people, He likes to visit with them in person as well as on the air. He likes to talk about any subject they have in mind to talk about. But over the years I have noticed that if the subject is left up to Mac, it will most often gravitate toward antennas, feeding systems, and propagation. As I mentioned before, Mac always had an antenna farm, and there are few designs of antenna that have not at one time or the other



graced his back yard. I'm not sure how all of those antennas reacted with each other and the surrounding ecology, but I have noticed that woodchucks refuse to live there and deer will not take a shortcut through Mac's yard. One thing I do know is that the signals get out. There are not very many parts of the world that Mac has not worked, and with 100 watts or less. He tells of working Baffin Island near the North Pole, and of working both Australia and New Zealand. He tells of working India with an 800 foot long wire which stretched from his shack to a tree on the adjacent farm which belonged to his mother. He tells of working several Japanese stations, one after the other. Mac says his best all around antenna was a Guy Wire Pyramid Antenna which was like a bow tie with the center lifted up to 50 feet and a second one at right angles to the first except at 40 feet. His favored DX antenna however has always been the cubical Quad. Mac's present antenna farm boasts a Cubical Quad for 20, 17, 15, and 10 meters; Inverted vee's on 80 and 40; a 48 foot base loaded vertical mounted at ground level with radials 42 radials for 75, 40, and 20 meters; a Butternut HF6V-X vertical for 80, 40, 30, 20, 15, and 10 meters; an 11 element 2 meter beam. and a 2 meter J-pole antenna on the chimney.

Mac was active in MARS for a number of years, ran Phone patch traffic to Quito, Ecuador for a local minister, Kept a regular sked. with Larry, K3HJQ, when he was stationed on Grand Turk Island, operated in the Post Office Net for years, operated Boy Scout JOTA for the last three years, and is still active on the Wednesday 20 meter net to Florida, the County Hunter net and most of the local nets.

Mac was never big on certificates and wall paper but he did get a WAS award and has over 2000 counties confirmed with mobile operators, and might have the cards for a DXCC although he never checked.

W3BZJ is a Ham's Ham and an asset to the Amateur Radio community.




